I have recd your Lre & have observed y<sup>e</sup> contents w<sup>re</sup> of: [ . . . ] your Worsp: wrote me y<sup>t</sup> you desired y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup> East India Compe<sup>s</sup> trade might goe on in my Country w<sup>th</sup> out any hinderance (as also according to my promise a convenient peice of Ground fitt for y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup> Compe<sup>s</sup> Affaires w<sup>ch</sup> you say is not given as yett and w<sup>th</sup> all a small Bullwarke all w<sup>ch</sup> desire you should [be] granted because it will protect you from yo<sup>r</sup> Enemies y<sup>e</sup> Robbers & wood men & secure your P<sup>ersons</sup> & Estates from all those kind of Evill's w<sup>ch</sup> would otherwayes happen & y<sup>t</sup> you may as is Granted to y<sup>e</sup> french at Pollacherry & y<sup>e</sup> Dutch at Tevanapatam, have y<sup>e</sup> Liberty of Planting [Gunns] y<sup>r</sup> on w<sup>ch</sup> will give great encouragement to y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup> Company and cause greater trade to y<sup>r</sup> & our Satisfac<sup>tion</sup> but on y<sup>e</sup> contrary Since the french and Dutch have y<sup>e</sup> Liberty of doing [these] things and you are debarred from y<sup>m</sup> it will be a great dishonour to y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup> Compa: y<sup>e</sup> Nation and your Worsp: and y<sup>r</sup> fore you desired my Grant of it to you as well as to y<sup>e</sup> other Nations you wrote me also about 3 Elaphants w<sup>ch</sup> you Chose out of Eleven belonging to y<sup>e</sup> King of Syam & y<sup>t</sup> they w<sup>re</sup>: Judged to be very we<sup>ll</sup> worth: 1400 Pag<sup>is</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup> w<sup>th</sup> much care & payns you at Last procur'd for Eleven hundreed Pag<sup>is</sup>: & y<sup>t</sup> y<sup>re</sup>: was no doubt y<sup>t</sup> [I] should be very Well Pleas'd w<sup>th</sup> y<sup>m</sup> as soon as I saw y<sup>m</sup> all w<sup>ch</sup> I take mighty kindly your worsp was Always very Civill and Oblidging to our King & wishing great proffitt to y<sup>e</sup> Divan w<sup>ch</sup> you must still continu by eucreasing your trade and making larger Investm<sup>ts</sup> y<sup>r</sup> our Diwans Benefitt must encrease more and more for w<sup>n</sup> you first came to see me in Trinamulee I was very Sensible of your Carriage fair dealing and worthiness w<sup>r</sup>: fore I gave you liberty to settle in my Countrey & because of y<sup>e</sup> mighty Proffitt you might bring y<sup>e</sup> Divan I lade a less Custome upon you y<sup>n</sup> y<sup>e</sup> Dutch and so redounded y<sup>e</sup> Proffitt to you agayne but since have found less advantage from you to y<sup>e</sup> Divan y<sup>n</sup> from other Nations w<sup>ch</sup> made me very angrey w<sup>th</sup> Gopall Punditt So y<sup>t</sup> he went away from hence very discontented for I thinking y<sup>r</sup> People very hon<sup>ble</sup>: granted y<sup>m</sup> these s<sup>ettle</sup>m<sup>ts</sup> & Priviledges but since hath [found] y<sup>m</sup> very unprofitable, w<sup>ch</sup> is very unreasonably & bring you are a very understanding P<sup>erson</sup> must [needs] be very sensible w<sup>t</sup> proffitt y<sup>e</sup> Divan reaps from y<sup>e</sup> Dut<sup>ch</sup> w<sup>ch</sup> if you shall exceed our King & myself shall be very well pleas'd and yo<sup>r</sup> buissness will goe on very Currently y<sup>r</sup> fore Pray take these things into your serious consideration & bring a great advantage to y<sup>e</sup> divan y<sup>n</sup> oth<sup>r</sup> people I question not but y<sup>e</sup> have taken great care in y<sup>e</sup> goodness & cheapness of y<sup>e</sup> Elaphants, y<sup>e</sup> and I being great frds as for y<sup>e</sup> building you speak for y<sup>e</sup> comodiousness of your affaires I referr y<sup>e</sup> to Gopall Punditt whom I have ord<sup>ed</sup> to doe accordingly to our Crt maner and Customes [since] y<sup>e</sup> are so great a frd to us you shall not want any help & assistance and so y<sup>e</sup> may write to Gop[all] Punditt & have yo<sup>r</sup> desires effected w<sup>t</sup> fore yo<sup>r</sup> Worsp being a very ingenious understand[ing] P<sup>erson</sup> shall not need to enlarge on y<sup>e</sup> buissness y<sup>e</sup> pair of Screws & Persia Tobacco I recd from yo<sup>r</sup> [ . . . in a very] good and seasonable time I returne you thanks I desire to let me hear at yo<sup>r</sup> Worsp good health.

Captain Bromwell has been ready to oblige y<sup>e</sup> Freighters on all respects & therefore a kind recommendation of him may be very duely given him and Serve to Settle him in his employ as he deseres [*sic*].

[ . . . ] ffrom Madapollam Decemb<sup>r</sup> y<sup>e</sup> 23<sup>d</sup> 1684.

And most Esteemed ffreind y<sup>s</sup> is to give you an account of y<sup>e</sup> proceedings of your<sup>s</sup> voyage to and from y<sup>e</sup> Port Acchene Viz [y<sup>e</sup> Road] wee was y<sup>r</sup> forst to remayne at least Six or 7 dayes y<sup>n</sup> getting into y<sup>e</sup> Road [wee] began to gett out our Rice and in a month time wee Cleared our Ship and Balest her but in carrying y<sup>e</sup> Rice out the best part of our men fell sick viz: our Chief Mate & Second & third & severall Midship men and at least 60 or 70 of our fore mast men y<sup>e</sup>: Rice sold y<sup>r</sup> very well & I suppose M<sup>r</sup> Ord has given you an acco<sup>t</sup>: [y<sup>re</sup>] of in his Life y<sup>r</sup> is Arrived safe y<sup>e</sup>: Trivetore who will be ready to Saile in a very few days after us he being allmost [ready] w<sup>n</sup> we cameaway & likewise y<sup>r</sup> was arrived y<sup>e</sup> Madrass Pinck Captayn Tayler who came from Cuda & they being y<sup>r</sup> at wars he come away to Atcheene in her Balest by w<sup>ch</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Ord doth intend to come over in or Elce in y<sup>e</sup> Trivetore we had our Dispatch y<sup>r</sup> on y<sup>e</sup> eight of Decemb<sup>r</sup>: and we sayl'd y<sup>t</sup> night and since we have very bad weath<sup>r</sup> & very hard Gusts so y<sup>e</sup> wee had not an observation in eight or ten dayes so y<sup>t</sup> it has hindred some time and with all hearing of severall Ships lost on y<sup>r</sup> Coasts but being by Gods help Safe arrived on y<sup>s</sup> Coast & at Maddapollam I thought it convenient to give yo<sup>r</sup> Wofsp: an Acco<sup>t</sup>: of and w<sup>th</sup> all to desire you y<sup>t</sup> if you can conveniently Omitt our Going into Pettipolle Bay it will be a great forwarding in our voyage we shall be forced at least to hyer 40 or 50 Larscars to help lade our Ship (our men being downe most of y<sup>m</sup> w<sup>ch</sup> is al at Present from your Ever faithfull Friend and Servant to Comm<sup>d</sup>:

of y<sup>e</sup> 22<sup>th</sup> 9ber to both w<sup>ch</sup> reply first y<sup>t</sup> wee heartily pray for his Hono<sup>rs</sup>: Safe

his Hono<sup>r</sup>: will bring up occasioned by y<sup>e</sup> [troubles] & ill State of affairs in y<sup>e</sup> Bay  
w<sup>ch</sup> God in his due time rectify to w<sup>ch</sup>: they promise & will use y<sup>r</sup> best Endeavours  
to supply w<sup>th</sup> w<sup>t</sup> goods these parts will afford in Season and propper for our use.

Wee herew<sup>th</sup> send you our Generall bookes 2 paire one for England y<sup>e</sup> other  
to remaine w<sup>th</sup> you Copies of our Consultation and L<sup>res</sup> shall follow after y<sup>e</sup> Expira-

DATED Y<sup>r</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup> 1684.

I enjoy good health and hope to hear y<sup>e</sup> Like y<sup>r</sup> from yo<sup>r</sup> Hono<sup>r</sup>: I shall now acquaint your Hono<sup>r</sup>: of a disord<sup>r</sup>: y<sup>t</sup> hapned in Cudda by y<sup>e</sup> Arrivall of an English Ship y<sup>r</sup> from Hughly w<sup>h</sup> the Ships Company made great disputes: about y<sup>e</sup> Giving Presents & caused Small differences between our people & y<sup>m</sup>: but at last came to a Compliance & giveing w<sup>t</sup> was Customary went to Anchor at y<sup>e</sup> Barrsmouth w<sup>t</sup> a boat belonging to the king from Pollo com<sup>ing</sup> by your Ship Sett upon y<sup>m</sup> fired at y<sup>m</sup> killed four men plunder'd them of all they had to y<sup>e</sup> Vallue of one thousand Dollars and tooke two of y<sup>e</sup> King's Slaves alive and So went y<sup>r</sup> way but weather we know not w<sup>ch</sup> wee desire your Hono<sup>r</sup>: to take care and Soe after y<sup>m</sup> y<sup>t</sup> they may restore y<sup>e</sup> loss & make recompence for y<sup>e</sup> Dammage they have done & I must tell you moreovor y<sup>t</sup> y<sup>r</sup> is another Ship belonging to y<sup>e</sup> English came from Surrat thither w<sup>t</sup> about thirteene Candy of Tinns w<sup>ch</sup> they now they Stop upon y<sup>e</sup> Same forementioned Acco<sup>t</sup>: w<sup>t</sup> fore I humbly desire your Hono<sup>r</sup>: to take care y<sup>t</sup> Satisfac<sup>tion</sup> be made on both Sides and y<sup>t</sup> our Friendship may Remayn firm as before y<sup>r</sup> is one M<sup>r</sup> [George] E[mson] to whom I sold a Elaphant for 50 Slaves from whom I have not heard a word Since wherefore I desired your hono<sup>r</sup>: to S[ee] I have my retournes Sent me [Back] agayne [ . . . PORT OF MERGY READY TO SAILE XBER 17<sup>th</sup> 1684.

Right Hon<sup>ble</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: Councel:

Gentlemen, duty obligeth me to advice Golden Fleece proceeding from y<sup>e</sup> Bay of Bengall w<sup>ch</sup> departed [Ballasore] road the 18 of augu<sup>r</sup>: last past in Ord<sup>r</sup>: to her proceeding home for England using al endeavour accordingly insomuch y<sup>t</sup> by the help of the Streames and very fine weather we had gayned in y<sup>e</sup> Latitude of 12<sup>d</sup>: 30 north and about 50 Leaugs to y<sup>e</sup> eastwards of Fort S<sup>t</sup> George where haveing fresh winds in different faire: durst not make use of them by reason of a defect in y<sup>e</sup> fore part of our ship on w<sup>ch</sup>: we considered w<sup>n</sup> we might best secure our lives the ship and Cargo allso to repair the defect and make our ship in a Condiçon of getting home w<sup>ch</sup> we would willingly should have been y<sup>e</sup> mourushes [mauritius] but y<sup>t</sup> we had little probabillty to gain that Place being not able to carry any Saile against the Sea on w<sup>ch</sup> we entertained for the Port of Mergy w<sup>ch</sup> we might goe to before the wind and accordingly bore away and directed our course for y<sup>e</sup> attaining the said Port: on y<sup>e</sup> 6<sup>th</sup>: of Sept<sup>br</sup>: being in the afore<sup>s</sup>d: Latitude & Distance from Fort S<sup>t</sup> George and by Gods P<sup>r</sup>omission aft<sup>r</sup>: great troubles we arriv'd y<sup>e</sup> Sd Port of Mergy one the 29 of the Same mo<sup>th</sup>: w<sup>t</sup>: we unladed our Ship I hope very effectually and have again Laden our Ship being this God willing to depart w<sup>ch</sup>: God in mercy give us a safe Arrivall after So troublesome a voyage.

I am also Oblidged to acquaint you that my coming from Bengall that by ord<sup>r</sup>: of the Agent and Councell of that place one John Whatley formerly boat swaines mate to Cap<sup>t</sup>: Will<sup>m</sup>: Wildy who had runn from him in Bengall to Serve in an Interloper who aft<sup>r</sup>: [our] arrivall got on Shore, and had so Privately Secured himself y<sup>t</sup> we could by no means find him during our Stay not w<sup>th</sup>: standing all the assistance the Govern<sup>r</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Burnybee & M<sup>r</sup>: Sam<sup>l</sup> [White] could give me who on promis have engaged to send y<sup>e</sup> Sd: by the next ship that shall come to the Coast [in] Irons to justifie their Discourageing any P<sup>r</sup>son to leave any of the Compa Shipping or oth<sup>rs</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup> if it Should fall out I humbly Intreat he may be sent home in the Compa: Shipping as an example to all run-aways for that he hath created me much trouble allready and that I am also und<sup>r</sup>: the Sence of the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Compa: displeasure in not bringing him home w<sup>th</sup> me not w<sup>th</sup>: standing all my Endeavours.

Being for recruiting my wants obleidged, to touch at this place in my passage to Bengala I take this oportunity to pay my respects to yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: and give you a concille acc<sup>t</sup>: of our voyadge because its somew<sup>t</sup>: singular, be pleased to know y<sup>n</sup>:; y<sup>t</sup>: we left y<sup>e</sup>: dounes y<sup>e</sup>: 23<sup>d</sup>: of March 1684 and with a faire wind gott cleare of England but about 120 leagues to y<sup>e</sup> west ward of y<sup>e</sup> lands end we wer arested by a Storme w<sup>ch</sup>: after it had blown away our maine mast at last in fine forced us back againe to Plymouth from w<sup>ch</sup>: place we could not gett loose till on thursday y<sup>e</sup>. 8<sup>th</sup>: May at w<sup>ch</sup>: time our Ship being refitted we put to sea w<sup>th</sup>: a wind w<sup>ch</sup>: served us only to put w<sup>th</sup>: out y<sup>e</sup>: maisstone of Plymouth sound we were then taken short w<sup>th</sup>: a S: West wind but being Summer tyme and well knowing y<sup>e</sup>: inconveniencies of a port in regard of our men I kept y<sup>e</sup> Sea and after we had plyed to wind ward till y<sup>e</sup>: 13<sup>th</sup>: instant had a wind w<sup>ch</sup>: put us cleare of the channell and on y<sup>e</sup>: 17<sup>th</sup>: instant mett w<sup>th</sup>: a Pincke from [B]arbadoes bound for London by whom I sent letters y<sup>e</sup>: 20<sup>th</sup>: instant fell in company w<sup>th</sup>: a Dutch Ship bound for Surana[m] and y<sup>e</sup>: next day w<sup>th</sup>: a small Plymouth Vessell bound for Cape de Verdes w<sup>ch</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: next day parted with us againe the 30<sup>th</sup>: I putt my letters on board y<sup>e</sup>: Dutch Ship & y<sup>n</sup> parted.

June 1684 y<sup>e</sup>: last month we sailed along w<sup>th</sup>: some satisfaction finding our Ship to sayle well enough w<sup>th</sup>: other ships y<sup>t</sup>: wear in our company and w<sup>th</sup>: hopes of arriveing India tyme enough to be dispatch'd for Europe as Cap<sup>t</sup>: Gayer was but this month no sooner began but our people begane lykwayes to complaine of y<sup>e</sup>: scurvy w<sup>ch</sup>: was a great surprise and disapointment to me in regard we came so lately from a port and though I had taken all y<sup>e</sup> care imaginable to provide against y<sup>e</sup>: distemper for having bought a greater quantity of casques att Plymouth I fil'd y<sup>m</sup>. w<sup>th</sup> water [y<sup>t</sup>] there might be no want of y<sup>t</sup>: in y<sup>e</sup>: Voyadgie y<sup>e</sup>: want of w<sup>ch</sup>: we generally conceave is a great abetter to y<sup>e</sup> disease but now we had three or fouer P<sup>ersons</sup> doune and fearing y<sup>e</sup>: others we thought to touch at S<sup>r</sup>: Jago for a day or two this being a very good season of y<sup>e</sup> year for fruite att y<sup>t</sup> [Island at y<sup>t</sup> ...] quantity of the refreshm<sup>t</sup>: we could buy there w<sup>ch</sup>: will keep severall days and by replenishing our water we might some [w<sup>t</sup>:] alter y<sup>e</sup> gross humour of our Syllers bodyes and at least kept them from Sickning soe soone but w<sup>n</sup>: we came into y<sup>e</sup>: lattitude of S<sup>r</sup>: Jago and thought to have borne down to y<sup>e</sup> Island (as if Providence had designed all y<sup>t</sup>: should befall us) we were disapointed by a contrary wiad y<sup>e</sup> course of nature was inverted at y<sup>t</sup>: wind w<sup>ch</sup>: used constantly in those parts to blow Northerlv we found w<sup>t</sup>: and w<sup>t</sup>: by No: right in our teeth is I thought at first only a frolicke of nature for y<sup>t</sup>: we used to have sea breezes sometimes in y<sup>e</sup> road w<sup>ch</sup> last not long, but after I spent a day and a halfe busking too and fro not being in circumstances to loose tyme I steered away to prosecute my Voyage the 6<sup>th</sup>: instant I left endeavouring for S<sup>r</sup>: Jago from whence to y<sup>e</sup>: lyne: our passage was extreame tedious having very small winds and those scantt for us.

July it was y<sup>e</sup>: 8<sup>th</sup>: of this month before we could cross the Equinoctiall w<sup>ch</sup> we did about 14d<sup>eg</sup> to y<sup>e</sup>: west ward of Ramhead all this month we had small winds and those very scantt w<sup>ch</sup>: made me almost fear y<sup>e</sup> shoals of Brazeell our passage was tedious and our Ship Sickly though I did what I could keep up there spirrits by encouradgeing there playes and diversions by using a familliar and mild command those y<sup>t</sup>: were sicke we used our utmost endeavour to recover, wine and brandie, w<sup>th</sup>: lime watter they had a compitent quantitie constantly allowed them but this distemper is of a nature that hardly admitts of cure on board of Ship out of Port for all y<sup>e</sup> P<sup>ersons</sup> that sickned soe soon as this dyed before we could reach Maritius this month was spent though we naid no progress answeareable to the tyme.

A'gust all this month likewayes was spent before we could come up w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Cape and each day added to y<sup>e</sup>: number of y<sup>e</sup>: sick by y<sup>e</sup>: 30<sup>th</sup> this month we had buried 5 P<sup>ersons</sup> and had Sick about 30 of my best seamen y<sup>e</sup>: last of this month I

call'd my officers to resolve w<sup>t</sup>: to doe in y<sup>e</sup>: miserable circumstances we war under, we wer thinking to goe to the Cape but y<sup>t</sup>: night it blew such a violent storme at y<sup>e</sup>: west side y<sup>t</sup>: we being obliged to goe before it, soon putt us past y<sup>e</sup>: Port y<sup>e</sup>: wind continued Wstly : for severall days afterwards.

Sep<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: 1<sup>st</sup>: we [sounded] and had ground and y<sup>e</sup> same day buried an other Seaman, y<sup>e</sup> 6<sup>th</sup> Instant we met [w<sup>th</sup>] Cap<sup>t</sup>: Hadding in y<sup>e</sup>: Caralino w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Laurell in his Company, y<sup>e</sup>: weather being moderate he was so kind to come and board me, w<sup>n</sup>: he might well admire as he did to find so few People on y<sup>e</sup>: deck of so large a Ship, I writt your worship y<sup>n</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: circumstances we were in as well as y<sup>e</sup>: tyme and place would admitt, Cape Bona Esperanza being an ill place for Ships to stay long together as soon as Capt Harden had my letters we parted, and y<sup>e</sup>: next day we encountred Cap<sup>t</sup>: Ravans in y<sup>e</sup>: Coast who was very ill then but y<sup>e</sup>: weather being bad could venture noe nearer y<sup>n</sup> to satisfie him, all was at peace at home and soe left him.

To this tyme we had a fair fresh gale, w<sup>ch</sup>: gave us hopes of a speedy passage Mauritius, for by the dayley increase of our sickmen, we found it absolute necessary to touch at some place for y<sup>e</sup> saving of our lives, y<sup>t</sup>: we might be able to mannage our Ship but y<sup>e</sup>: next day being y<sup>e</sup>: 8<sup>th</sup>: Instant proved ca[1] me and a contrary wind succeeded itt w<sup>ch</sup>: cruelly dashed all our hopes and soe discouraged all our sick people y<sup>t</sup> their spirit drooping they began to dye apace all y<sup>e</sup> remaining part of this month, we had but small winds, and by the last day of it we had buried 14 men and those y<sup>t</sup>: were sick were about 45 I cant represent y<sup>e</sup> unhappiness we were in at this tyme, we had to doe w<sup>th</sup> contrary winds, and was obliged to tack of as occasion required, we had a great deale of worke to goe through a few hands and my comand was chainged from [doe this] or y<sup>t</sup> to come let us doe it, for there was hardly any worke but I layed my hands to, y<sup>t</sup>: I might oblige my officers to doe the like, and encourage y<sup>e</sup> Poor remaining part of my men, that were yett well but almost tired out w<sup>th</sup> continuall duty y<sup>e</sup>: Passengers were oblidging, and w<sup>n</sup> I watched did keep me Company, and helped upon any occasion.

Octob<sup>r</sup>: from y<sup>e</sup> beginning of this till our arrivall to Mauritius every other day dyed a man and sickned two. We arrived y<sup>e</sup>: 16<sup>th</sup>: sufficiently satisfied y<sup>t</sup>: we could get well into Port and make our Ship fast.

I wrote you from this place by a conveyance w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Govern<sup>r</sup>: of this Island, tho gave noe hopes of y<sup>e</sup>: condition we were in but doubting whether you may have y<sup>e</sup> good fortune of its coming to your hands, I have inverted y<sup>e</sup> same here w<sup>ch</sup>: I doe to no other purpose, but to P<sup>s</sup>wade yo<sup>r</sup>: Worsp: I should not betray your Interest to such manifest disadvantage, as y<sup>e</sup>: loss of my passage, w<sup>th</sup>: out an unavoyable necessity, for certainly had we not touched we had not been in being at y<sup>e</sup>: time, or if any of the healthiest might be alive, would have been driving too and froo y<sup>e</sup> sea unable to manage y<sup>e</sup> Ship and should have only prolong inevertable [*sic*] fate.

When we anchored in Carpenters Bay of Mauritius, we buried 22 P<sup>s</sup>ons, and came soe miserably weake y<sup>t</sup>: we had much adoe to gett our boats out, tho w<sup>th</sup>: our Capsterne, we brought in w<sup>th</sup>: us fifty one sicke, Judge I pray you w<sup>t</sup>: a condition I must be in, not having above 35 sound P<sup>s</sup>ons of men & boyes, we put all our men y<sup>t</sup> were sicke ashore and disposed y<sup>m</sup> under four tents where such as were able cooke'd such provisions as we could gett y<sup>m</sup>: on shoar for those y<sup>t</sup>: where helpless, in y<sup>e</sup>: carrying of y<sup>m</sup>: on shoar y<sup>e</sup>: weakest fainted away frequently, w<sup>n</sup>: they came to be exposed to y<sup>e</sup>: Aire, and some y<sup>t</sup>: were past recovery soon dyed, my first care was to contrive some way to let y<sup>e</sup> Govern<sup>r</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: Country, w<sup>th</sup>: whome in my former voyadges, I contracted a friendship know I was here, and by his means procure all y<sup>e</sup>: refreshments y<sup>e</sup>: Island could afford, but as we were a hunting in the woods, y<sup>e</sup>: third day after we came in, we mett with a Dutch man who oblidged to carry my letters to y<sup>e</sup>: Govern<sup>r</sup>: in y<sup>e</sup>: mean tyme myself and y<sup>e</sup>: most healthy and vigorous of my companions chose to hunt, having but very [few?] hands to doe y<sup>e</sup> worke of y<sup>e</sup>: Ship, y<sup>e</sup> [masteiff dog w<sup>ch</sup>: Captain]

Harding very kindly spared us did us a great deal of service my owne doggs y<sup>t</sup>: were Greyhounds, being [barely] able to run upon such a cruell rocky country, Mauritius is a very plentiful place for provision, and w<sup>a</sup>: a Ships Company is in health, tis a very easy matter for a few to mentain y<sup>e</sup>: Rest, because they take there turnes, both Cap<sup>t</sup>: Harding and that fleet being soe lately here, had invaded the Goats, they and we were oblidged to goe far in y<sup>e</sup>: Country w<sup>ch</sup>: was tedious, and hard to bring y<sup>e</sup>: Goats soe far on our backs; but in eight days time y<sup>e</sup>: Govern<sup>r</sup>: sent us downe huntsmen and dogs, w<sup>ch</sup>: eased us of y<sup>t</sup>: trouble, and then we applyed our selves to wood and water y<sup>e</sup>: Ship, and in a little time more y<sup>e</sup>: Govern<sup>r</sup>: came downe w<sup>th</sup>: both his Sloops, and brought w<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: season afforded, w<sup>ch</sup>: was a few lemons, (y<sup>n</sup>: [Peeared] several [Sucks] and potatoes, abundance of Coconuts and Pumkins, onions, buttermilke, new milke, and butter we were forced to lye here a month and dearst not saile, unless I would carry my People sicke as yett, and in y<sup>t</sup>: tyme buried seven men, whereof my Boatswaine was one, soe y<sup>t</sup>: before I left y<sup>e</sup> Island I had buried twenty nine P<sup>ersons</sup>.

The 11<sup>th</sup>: November left Mauritius, w<sup>th</sup>: all my remaining men indifferently well, and brought out w<sup>th</sup>: me, besides some of y<sup>e</sup> refreshments y<sup>t</sup>: was left sea turtle enough for 14 days, w<sup>th</sup>: good dyett confirmed their recovery, and kept them from any relap<sup>ses</sup>, after we had left the land, & gott up into our latitude 1<sup>degree</sup>: againe, we made it our business to gett well to y<sup>e</sup>: Eastward, y<sup>t</sup>: as we thought w<sup>th</sup>: a frank wind, we might run downe to our Port, but w<sup>n</sup>: we came near y<sup>e</sup>: Line, we were miserably arrested, by a Northerly wind, we might stand to y<sup>e</sup> Eastward, or take to y<sup>e</sup> Westward, but to y<sup>e</sup>: Northward we could hardly goe, we were 3 or four days gaining a degree, we mett w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Rains and turned before we came neer y<sup>e</sup>: Line, w<sup>ch</sup>: put us to a world of trouble, in regard they were immoderate and we crossed y<sup>e</sup>: Equinoctiall the 2<sup>d</sup>: January and soon after, met w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Nor<sup>thly</sup> winds we were 3 dayes in [3<sup>d</sup>:00] Lat<sup>1</sup>: and four likewise in 8<sup>d</sup> [00], after we had tried so long and found y<sup>e</sup> wind constant at N N E<sup>t</sup>: on this Coast near y<sup>e</sup>: Nicobar we considered we were much later y<sup>n</sup>: Cap<sup>t</sup>: Gayer and y<sup>t</sup>: tho he had y<sup>e</sup> winds Easterly, yett we must not expect soe, having expected them allready 16: days in vaine I likewise call to minde my Voyage w<sup>th</sup>: Capt: Horsman, w<sup>n</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: westerly winds on y<sup>e</sup>: Coast of Chormandell were sett in, by y<sup>e</sup>: 10<sup>th</sup>: January by reason of Westerly winds by w<sup>ch</sup>: I conjectured we should sooner gaine our passage to Bengall along y<sup>e</sup> Coast of Chormandell then otherwayes accordingly y<sup>e</sup>: wind continuing at N N E<sup>t</sup>: we went away N W<sup>t</sup>: and as we came neerer y<sup>e</sup>: land, we had y<sup>e</sup> wind fairer for us, though but small Gales, our assimuth Compasses making high Variation, made us conjecture we had mett w<sup>th</sup>: a great western streem and soe we might fall in w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: land sooner then we expected soe y<sup>t</sup>: we kept very good looking out, and frequent sounding for Ground and on Tuesday y<sup>e</sup> 27 of January 1684/5 we saw y<sup>e</sup>: land of Chormandell y<sup>e</sup>: place we sett in w<sup>th</sup>: was near Armagon, This was a joyfull news and sight to us all, espetially to our seamen in regard y<sup>t</sup>: our Bear and [Peas] hath been spent a long time, y<sup>e</sup> want of w<sup>ch</sup>: hath made think our ordinary allowance very hard, w<sup>ch</sup>: accompanied w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: tediousness of our Passage, and all other misfortunes, and sickness they have suffered hath rendered them somew<sup>t</sup>: discontented, I am forced in some measure for want of men i[n] this my extremity to be complacent for fear they should run away from me, w<sup>n</sup>: they come to Port, this morning Anchored in Metchlep<sup>m</sup>: road, and having positive orders for Bengalla, as soon as ever I gett my provisions shall weigh for the Port.

I enjoy good health and shall be very glad to hear the like from your Hon<sup>r</sup> :, I heard yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: lately arrived from y<sup>e</sup>: Bay att w<sup>ch</sup> good news I heartily rejoyce, I have been w<sup>th</sup>: his Excellency Podala Lingapa and lately returned to Pollyacatt, and he hath wrote a letter to yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: and returned yo<sup>r</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>:

A Ship belonging to y<sup>e</sup>: Divan is going to Muscatt, & hath Occation for 4: Anchours, and two gunns, About w<sup>ch</sup>: I have now sent Mahamadoo Cassim to yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup> :, and desire you would please to hear him in my behalfe, and he will pay for them, I Desire yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: to assist me in this business, w<sup>ch</sup>: will be esteemed a great kindness by Madana Accana, and Lingapah, and is not desired for nothing, by one means or other I desire yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: to see to furnish y<sup>e</sup> Ship w<sup>th</sup> these things, that she may proceed on her voyage, yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: having much dealing in shiping makes me trouble you to procure me y<sup>e</sup>: Necessarys above mentioned.

Yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: by yo<sup>r</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: 15<sup>th</sup>: hath respect to y<sup>e</sup>: cases of M<sup>r</sup>: Threddar,  
w<sup>th</sup>: drawing of y<sup>e</sup> ffactories at Pattana, and Dacca, Mony at Interest,

Mr: Gough, and w<sup>t</sup>: we should doe in case of their prosecuting y<sup>e</sup>: Nabobs order touching y<sup>e</sup>: affairs at Cassimbazar, & we give you our thanks for your arguing y<sup>e</sup>: Matter relating to y<sup>e</sup>: Severall particulars mentioned and giving us yo<sup>r</sup>: opinion thereon.

Mr: Thredar who designed at his first comeing downe from Cassumbazar to goe w<sup>th</sup>: Agent Hedges, hath we know not for w<sup>t</sup>: reason of himselfe declined that way [he] is now in y<sup>e</sup>: ffactory, and hath not made any application to us for his goeing home, or upon any other acc<sup>t</sup>: w<sup>n</sup>: [he] doth we shall act as is adviseable [on] Mature [consideration].

Wee see yet more & more reason to take into consideration the w<sup>th</sup>: drawing y<sup>e</sup> ffactory<sup>s</sup>: of Pattana & Dacca we have been soe abused in both at P<sup>s</sup>ent Mr: [Pownset] cant by any means obtaine a Dastic for y<sup>e</sup>: goods ready there, to bring y<sup>m</sup>: downe and goeing for it lately, & pressing hard, instead of having it granted, was told y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Nabob would turne our ffactoryes out of Bengall but till we have mony to pay our debts at Interest at neither place can it be done, as yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: under the Sence thereof [urgues] well, If we could take up mony there to pay off y<sup>e</sup>: debt there we [wd] certainly doe it. But y<sup>t</sup>: cant be, mony being exceeding Scarce here & people dissatisfyd w<sup>ch</sup>: dissatisfaction Seems to abate for Sence we have [p<sup>d</sup>] one parson y<sup>t</sup>: was most Sellicitious, we have not had any further demand.

It hath allways been the Custome of y<sup>e</sup>: place to give our Notes for Mony at interest, to pay at demand and otherwise they will not lett it, but Seldom or ever aske there mony under six or twelve Months, or till we please, and formerly twas a thing as much desired by us, as y<sup>m</sup>: we using to take mony for a P<sup>s</sup>ent occasion, & w<sup>n</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: was over to send for y<sup>e</sup>: P<sup>s</sup> sons concerned to take their mony, here are few if any, y<sup>t</sup>: offer us mony at Interest, and tis hard (w<sup>n</sup>: we need it) to procure it, Soe y<sup>t</sup>: w<sup>n</sup>: we need we cant pick & Choose for w<sup>ch</sup>: reason we cant make our owne terms but are glad to take it at theires.

Mr: Gough, for some time after yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: departed from this place, lodged in y<sup>e</sup> ffactory, & came to y<sup>e</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: table but after a while w<sup>th</sup>: dr[e]w, to Agent Hedges, While here he used to speake of his goeing w<sup>th</sup>: Cap<sup>t</sup>: Browne & comeing for an order of y<sup>e</sup>: Cap<sup>ts</sup>: to receive him w<sup>ch</sup>: was one of his usuall tricks, upon y<sup>e</sup>: 26<sup>th</sup>: December Agent Hedges of a Suddain, as if he was affrighted (whether reall or pretended we cant learne) but he gives out twas occasioned by advice he recd: y<sup>t</sup> y<sup>e</sup> Nabob had ordered y<sup>e</sup>: Phousdar to seize him and sent him to Dacca about Haggerstones buisness, went aboard his Ship and such was his fear, y<sup>t</sup>: he sent to y<sup>e</sup>: Dutch derectore for one of his boats & fflagg to carry him downe, but was denyd, w<sup>th</sup>: him went Mr: Gough and hath kept aboard ever since w<sup>th</sup>: Agent Hedges, Mr: Dowglass and his Lady went hence y<sup>e</sup>: 31<sup>st</sup>: December and tis said they are gone and no doubt but y<sup>t</sup> Mr: Gough is gone w<sup>th</sup>: them, soe y<sup>t</sup>: there is no preventing his going but by fetching him by force from aboard y<sup>e</sup> Ship but we are of yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>rs</sup>: opinion (especially considering our P<sup>s</sup>ent circumstances) to let him goe.

The trouble [sat] Cassimbazar are great y<sup>e</sup> Phousdar hath sent one Bonadas formerly Gun-officer under Balchand w<sup>th</sup>: Horse and foote, who lay seige to y<sup>e</sup> ffactory firing some gunns, and have besett y<sup>e</sup> Passages, y<sup>t</sup> they can neither gett goods off nor come themselves.

We have wrote to Mr: Pownsett as effectually as we can to Sollicitt y<sup>e</sup>: accommodating y<sup>e</sup> Matters, it being his apprehension, as well as Mr: Charnock's, y<sup>t</sup> the not giving a P<sup>s</sup>ent upon yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>rs</sup>: comeing, and y<sup>e</sup>: chang of y<sup>e</sup>: Agent hath been y<sup>e</sup>: occation y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Nabob receives soe eisily y<sup>e</sup>: report against us, w<sup>ch</sup>: from this place, Ballasore, and Cassambazar are gone up to y<sup>e</sup> Phousdar of this place being greatly incensed at y<sup>e</sup>: accidentall Killing y<sup>e</sup>: man & boy, and since y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: royatt at Ballasore, hath write to y<sup>e</sup>: Nabob & Duan, y<sup>t</sup>: we grow rich & proud, and have brought gunns at Souldiers & many more English then

usuall into the country &c<sup>a</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Nabob hath caus'd to be write in their Wackee or news book to y<sup>e</sup> King, we have ordered a present to y<sup>e</sup> am<sup>t</sup>: of w<sup>t</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Pownsett advised, w<sup>a</sup>: yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: was here, was necessary & y<sup>e</sup> Agent hath written an Arsdust to y<sup>e</sup> Nabob (y<sup>e</sup> Copping whereof we send you) w<sup>ch</sup>: Order and Arsdust was sent y<sup>e</sup> 19<sup>th</sup>: December but yet have not answered from thence.

We have improved w<sup>t</sup>: time more urgent occasions for present getting ready goods for y<sup>e</sup>: Ann, would admitte, in translateing w<sup>t</sup>: needfull for y<sup>e</sup>: dispatch of y<sup>e</sup> Veckull to Court, who in few days will be going on her way.

The Coppie Books and the papers refered to in o<sup>r</sup> generall to y<sup>e</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: are gone home by y<sup>e</sup> Henry and W<sup>m</sup>., all but y<sup>e</sup> 9ber Consultacon at Cassimbazar, & M<sup>r</sup>: Carnocke, derrection about makeing Saltpetre, w<sup>ch</sup>: [came] not to our hands, till after she was gone, but will be sent by y<sup>e</sup> Ann.

Wee are of y<sup>e</sup> same opinion, concerning the affaires att Cassimbazar w<sup>ch</sup> yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: gives us in yo<sup>re</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: 16<sup>th</sup>: past in answer to ours of y<sup>e</sup>: 10<sup>th</sup>: ditto, and are glad y<sup>t</sup>: you confirme us therein, haveing before we recd it given order y<sup>t</sup>: w<sup>t</sup>: ever y<sup>e</sup>: event was they should not yeild to M<sup>r</sup>: Charnocks, goeing to Dacca, or y<sup>e</sup>: payment of y<sup>e</sup>: 43000 Ru: most unjustly adjudged by y<sup>e</sup> Cozzee and Confirmed by y<sup>e</sup>: Nabob, nor Comply w<sup>th</sup>: any other overtures y<sup>a</sup>: decideing the defference between y<sup>m</sup> & y<sup>e</sup> Pieazes: by Merch<sup>ts</sup>., & ordered if nothing we could doe would prevent what they atte<sup>mt</sup>: (Viz to have M<sup>r</sup>: Charnocke up & us to pay that mony) y<sup>t</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Carnock Should come away w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> rest of y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: Servants, leaving on y<sup>e</sup> doors a List of y<sup>e</sup>: Countreys debt in English Perca and Hindoostan, soe farr we have gone agreeing w<sup>th</sup>: yo<sup>r</sup>: opinion we had advice, pri<sup>o</sup> present, that they attempting to send of goods by stealth were discovered and all was stop<sup>d</sup>., and they prevented in their design, Benedas Lying in Cassimbazar w<sup>th</sup>: his horse and foot to watch y<sup>m</sup>., soe y<sup>t</sup> they have done nothing since this astool came down have not had any silke come in, or people to pack up w<sup>t</sup>: they have prized Suffer'd to come near y<sup>m</sup>., soe y<sup>t</sup>: we cant see how we shall send away y<sup>e</sup> Ann Laden y<sup>e</sup>: goods at Dacca & Maulda being stop'd also and will till the Nabob be appeased.

As occasions offer, we shall consider yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>re</sup>: advice about w<sup>th</sup>: drawing to Ballasore w<sup>th</sup>: w<sup>t</sup>: relates thereunto w<sup>th</sup>: res<sup>pects</sup> also to our former determinations in Councell, nothing but extremity shall induice us to doe anything contra<sup>r</sup>: thereunto.

Your Hon<sup>re</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: 18<sup>th</sup>: December in answer to o<sup>r</sup>: of 13<sup>th</sup>: ditto gives us yo<sup>r</sup>: opinion about the dispatch of y<sup>e</sup> [Defence] and concern[ing] y<sup>e</sup> Petre & Termerick is come downe shall not trouble yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: w<sup>th</sup>: debating w<sup>th</sup> you y<sup>e</sup> usefulness of her stay as we apprehend, having determin'd [She] shall goe w<sup>th</sup>: w<sup>t</sup>. Petre and Turmerick we can gett a board by y<sup>e</sup> 10<sup>th</sup> & 15<sup>th</sup>: inst: at farthest y<sup>e</sup> Pattana Boats arrived w<sup>th</sup>: us y<sup>e</sup> 31<sup>st</sup>: past in y<sup>e</sup> Evening, but we are at a loss for Sloops to carry it downe y<sup>e</sup> Pilot of y<sup>e</sup> good hope & Madapollam are gone to y<sup>e</sup>: Road w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Ann & Henry & W<sup>m</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> letter we dispatch y<sup>e</sup> 23<sup>th</sup>: Ult: the good hope went w<sup>th</sup>: 1000 bags sugar to y<sup>e</sup> Bengall Merch<sup>ts</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Master of w<sup>ch</sup> Pilotted y<sup>e</sup>: Ann downe y<sup>e</sup>: River y<sup>e</sup> master of y<sup>e</sup> Madap<sup>m</sup>: they tooke aboard (as he was coming up) to Pilote y<sup>e</sup> Henry & W<sup>m</sup>: and left y<sup>e</sup>: Sloop to be brought up by his mate, who cast her aground upon a sand over against Balchunes house a little below y<sup>e</sup> Dutch factory, upon y<sup>e</sup> 8<sup>th</sup>: past w<sup>h</sup>ere she was like to be lost; but have hopes to save her, but cant gett her of till next spring tide, But y<sup>e</sup>: Arrival being ready to goe downe w<sup>th</sup>: 1000 Bags of Sugar, we stay'd her till his hon<sup>rs</sup>: ship was ready, and in y<sup>e</sup> mean time y<sup>e</sup> Petre boats come, w<sup>ch</sup>: laden to y<sup>e</sup>: consideration, y<sup>t</sup>: we having stayd Sherman to Pilot your Ship, some days (there being not another expecte till y<sup>e</sup>: 8<sup>th</sup>: inst: at soonest) yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: would not be displeased if we had stayd yo<sup>r</sup>: ship 2 days to take in some Bags of Petre, and goe downe w<sup>th</sup>, Sherman w<sup>ch</sup>: would countervaille y<sup>e</sup>: want of y<sup>e</sup>: Madapollams time lost by y<sup>e</sup> ill accident aforesaid, we have p<sup>d</sup> y<sup>e</sup>: usuall freight for y<sup>e</sup>: carrying of the Petre, of 20 Rup<sup>s</sup>: for a 100 Maund, w<sup>ch</sup>: will make up y<sup>e</sup> loss of that little time and doe y<sup>e</sup>: Company good service w<sup>ch</sup>: wee doubt not yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: will be pleased w<sup>th</sup>:

We shall continue our advices as there is occasion, as knowing twill be of more concernment then the little Charge twill put y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: to.

The Remain of yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>rs</sup>: letter relates to the Cassimbazars affaire, to w<sup>ch</sup>: we cant say more y<sup>n</sup>: we have said & concur w<sup>th</sup>: you in every point.

The Bengall Merch<sup>t</sup>: is not yet dispatched nor like to be this eight or ten days, and w<sup>n</sup>: she is we shall not be able to send in her above 360 Tonns of Sugar being not to be had of any sort, four ships from Suratt and he[two] Large Dutch Ships, Lading Sugars, have had occasion for soe much that y<sup>e</sup>: demand hath out done, whatever used [to] be made in y<sup>e</sup>: Country by farr, and we never thinking that a Ship bigger y<sup>n</sup>: of 300 or 330 Tons to come up to this place, & take y<sup>m</sup>: in here, could ever be designed for Persia made provision for noe more in time soe y<sup>n</sup>: this disapoyntm<sup>t</sup>: could not be avoy[d]ed.

We shall be very glad to here, y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Syam Merch<sup>t</sup>: did arrive in time at Metchlep<sup>n</sup>: for y<sup>e</sup>: Persia ffreight agreed for by M<sup>r</sup>: Freeman.

Your Hon<sup>rs</sup>: last letter of y<sup>e</sup>: 22<sup>d</sup>: from on board y<sup>e</sup>: Resolution y<sup>e</sup>: purport of w<sup>ch</sup>: being y<sup>e</sup> agreem<sup>t</sup>: made w<sup>th</sup> y<sup>e</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>: of Ballasore, according to y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: order & yo<sup>r</sup>: example at Madras w<sup>ch</sup>: we are huge glad you have accomplished hopeing it may be a presid<sup>t</sup>: to lead others on (if we hereafter see better times) towards w<sup>ch</sup>: we shall use our utmost endeavours.

We are glad also to here y<sup>t</sup>: there is more goods to come in att Ballasore up: there investm<sup>t</sup>: & others y<sup>t</sup>: may be bought of y<sup>e</sup> Merch<sup>ts</sup>: so stay for their mony till some come but y<sup>t</sup> they should come be sorted and sent aboard [y<sup>e</sup>:] defence, by y<sup>e</sup>: 10<sup>th</sup>: or 15<sup>th</sup>: inst: seem to us improbable but if they should be ready and sent abard y<sup>e</sup> defence, y<sup>n</sup>: we doe not yett se y<sup>e</sup>: Ann can goe to save her passage this year, for y<sup>e</sup>: Cassimbazar, Dacca, & Maulda goods come not in time it cant possibly be done we have but little hopes to see an end of these troubles, and o<sup>r</sup>: goods be admitted to come downe in time soe y<sup>t</sup>: we have [no] dependence on any goods but at Ballasore & here to load y<sup>e</sup>: Ann, who yett wants 1500 Bales to Compleat her Tufage.

JANUARY THE 6<sup>th</sup> 1684.

Your Hon<sup>rs</sup>: Ship being not yet ready, and seeing her goeing into Ballasore will caus some Stop, we have thought best to send this by a ffrench Sloop y<sup>t</sup>: goes immediatly to ffort, and y<sup>e</sup>: rather because we have hopes y<sup>e</sup>: said Sloop may arrive before Agent Hedges (who went hence last weeke, but was to stay some time below to [cut] wood and in Ballasore Road) w<sup>ch</sup>: we shall be very glad if soe fall out, M<sup>r</sup>: Rob<sup>t</sup>: Hedges being run away from us, w<sup>th</sup>: out making up his acc<sup>ts</sup>:; giveing noe notice to the Agent or any other in y<sup>e</sup> ffactorye, and it was soe long before we had any notice, y<sup>t</sup>: we could not fetch him up, before he gott a board y<sup>e</sup>: recovery who was falan down as low as Kedgerree staying there for M<sup>r</sup>: Letton who was left behind to finish Agent Hedges buisineses, w<sup>th</sup>: whome upon y<sup>e</sup>: 2<sup>d</sup>: inst: M<sup>r</sup>: Rob<sup>t</sup> Hedges went we hear downe.

M<sup>r</sup>: Robt Hedges had applyed himselfe to y<sup>e</sup> Agent for leave to goe w<sup>th</sup>: his Unckle, but was denyed, after w<sup>ch</sup>: he asked to be admitted to go to Persia on y<sup>e</sup>: Bengall Merch<sup>t</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup>: was also denyed he seemed not to be concerned, but sett about making up his acco<sup>ts</sup>:; and he having kept noe books, y<sup>e</sup>: Agent appointed M<sup>r</sup>: Stafford to assist him in framing out his papers, as a Journall & Leiger, w<sup>ch</sup>: he attended upon 3 or 4 days, seeming to be well contentd that he was not admitted to goe home, soe y<sup>t</sup>: there was noe suspicion of y<sup>e</sup>: design w<sup>ch</sup>: was for his running away.

As soon as we found it probable y<sup>t</sup>: w<sup>t</sup>: we heard was true we drew up y<sup>e</sup>: inclosed protest declared it in the ffactorye, and send it to Ballasore, to be delivered with directions about it, but we doubt whether it may re[a]ch him, we have therefore sent another to you to P<sup>s</sup>ent (if it be not thought adviseable to stop y<sup>e</sup> Ship) which will be necessary some y<sup>t</sup>: are to goe home to England, see y<sup>e</sup> delivery of, M<sup>r</sup> Robert Hedges is gone away a great debter to y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: as we perceive by w<sup>t</sup>: we have already come to y<sup>e</sup>: knowledge of altho: his acc<sup>ts</sup>: are



not made up yet wherefore tis of great necessity y<sup>t</sup>: either y<sup>e</sup>: Ship be Stop'd :  
(if they refuse to deliver him) or to serve y<sup>e</sup> Protest upon y<sup>e</sup> persons concernd in  
y<sup>e</sup>: carrying him away, We are

cass] in y<sup>e</sup>: Debekmundun, his exacting mony from your Gomosticks, all other  
greivances you think of for as yett we cannot open our mouths about any thing  
w<sup>t</sup>: soever, we have 74 Bales & Chests of Cloth layen ready packed severall  
[days] by us, but cannot gett admittance to pass them, tho we have proffered  
Cossidas 500<sup>rup</sup>: and Diaram his kinsman 200<sup>rup</sup>: to give up [dusticks] to  
pass our Cloth, never were we in such a condition Since any of us know y<sup>e</sup>:  
Country, we are forced to buy dusticks for peons, and come in Merch<sup>ts</sup>: names  
and not our own.

We hope you have written Sufficiently to Surat concerning Haggerstone so  
y<sup>t</sup>: Caaz Jullb a Cawn y<sup>e</sup>: Suba there will gett a mahazars of y<sup>e</sup>: s<sup>d</sup>: Haggerstons  
actings, we have a translate of y<sup>e</sup>: acc<sup>t</sup>: but are sorry y<sup>e</sup> Surat Ships are gone,

For my owne part I might have done here as well as any body, & recovered if not full satisfaction at least a good compensation for 7500 doll<sup>s</sup>: I lost by y<sup>e</sup>: Kings Service, but sensible y<sup>s</sup>: Prince loves Carrion, y<sup>t</sup>: knows best how to flatter and cheat as may prove fatal to him at last, and p<sup>r</sup>ceiveing nothing was to be done, w<sup>th</sup>: out coperateing and combineing w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Greeks villany so detestable, y<sup>t</sup>: an honest man should not for lucre of gaine expose his cred<sup>t</sup>: and wound his consience, I chose rather to be patient for y<sup>e</sup>: obtaineing of my due, y<sup>n</sup>: to make my selfe voluntary a Slave to infidelity and Companie to vice, all Proffitts & advantages notw<sup>th</sup>: standing, and to depart hence for Bantam.

And w<sup>th</sup>: all we entreat, y<sup>t</sup>: you would by the kind advice and assistance of y<sup>m</sup>: in their affairs, further manifest your fidellity and Friendship to our Mast<sup>rs</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup>: we doubt not.

the most profitable and Secure managem<sup>t</sup>: of our Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Masters affaires, under y<sup>e</sup>: Conduct y<sup>n</sup>: by reason of want of Such advice theire last Ship had.

The Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: ffactory is w<sup>th</sup>: drawne more by reason of Constant Phaulkons mallice y<sup>n</sup>: for y<sup>e</sup> barrenness of the Place, w<sup>ch</sup>: the Comp<sup>a</sup>: proposed as the cause of their small proffitt, obtained by its trade but I think had more rightly lade the fault on their Servants y<sup>s</sup>: mans promoted Viz<sup>t</sup>: Geo: White and M<sup>r</sup>: Barnaby, togeather w<sup>th</sup> the private mallice and treachery of y<sup>s</sup>: their fosterling.

We often tould our Merch<sup>ts</sup>: that they were not so oblig'd to y<sup>e</sup> number of peices as they were to y<sup>e</sup>: bringing in of goods to y<sup>e</sup>: amount of their contract and that their Cloth wa[s] to be as good as the[y] had Muster, w<sup>t</sup>: brought in Short was of noe use to y<sup>e</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: but a hindrance of their business.

There is come upon y<sup>e</sup>: S<sup>d</sup>: Ship but twenty one Chests of Ryalls, & one Chest of Gold, w<sup>ch</sup>: will not amount to So much as we sent in Gold to the Fort, by y<sup>e</sup>: Resolution, So y<sup>t</sup>: this mony will but pay for w<sup>t</sup>: goods were sent upon y<sup>e</sup>: Ann, and Henry & W<sup>m</sup>: and those y<sup>t</sup>: came from Dacca & Maulda, w<sup>ch</sup>: are about 180 Chest, & came too late from those places to be Ship'd this Monsoon.

3. Wee perceive, by a letter from S<sup>r</sup>: Josiah Child to y<sup>e</sup>: Agent, that y<sup>e</sup>: Eagle departed not from England till May last, being driven back to Plimouth. We have a short letter from y<sup>e</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Govern<sup>r</sup>: & <sup>ca</sup>: a Coppie of w<sup>ch</sup>: we herew<sup>th</sup>: Send, together w<sup>th</sup>: w<sup>t</sup> letters came for yo<sup>r</sup>: parts.

4. Wee shall give yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: & <sup>ca</sup>: a briefe acc<sup>t</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: present state of y<sup>e</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: affaires here with respect to y<sup>e</sup>: next Moonsoon.

The November Bund for Silk is lost for want of Mony to give out this is y<sup>e</sup>: time to give out for March Bund, w<sup>ch</sup>: also will be lost for y<sup>e</sup> same Reason.

5. Besides, at this time of y<sup>e</sup>: year, there use to be Mony given out in all factories, for Cloth to come in, in 9ber, to be sorted & embaled, for w<sup>ch</sup>: we have not any mony now to give out.

Soe y<sup>t</sup>: there being three large Ships, Viz<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Defence, Resolution & y<sup>e</sup>: Eagle, to be provided for, w<sup>ch</sup>: can't be till mony arrive by y<sup>e</sup>: next Shipping, w<sup>ch</sup>: 'tis probable will be soe late, y<sup>t</sup>: it can't be coyn'd in time to give out for goods, for besides y<sup>e</sup>: continuall troubles & Stopps on y<sup>e</sup>: Mint, the [y] are such a delotary People, y<sup>t</sup>: w<sup>n</sup>: they have our treasure in itt allways comes to [slowly] out, y<sup>t</sup>: we can have noe certain dependance upon them, and Sell y<sup>e</sup>: Treasure we sent w<sup>th</sup>: out great losse. Our troubles hath another ill effect, under w<sup>ch</sup>: we labour, Viz<sup>t</sup>: our Creditors at Cassimbuzar, & other Factories importuning for their Mony, w<sup>ch</sup>: is near six Lack of Rup<sup>s</sup>: without payment of w<sup>ch</sup>: 'tis Impossible we can withdraw our Factories aloft, & are more and more confirmed, y<sup>t</sup>: its not to be done att

all, w<sup>th</sup>: out y<sup>e</sup>: leave & assistance of y<sup>e</sup>: Governors and their People, as they by experience now find, y<sup>t</sup>: made it an easy mater in the discourse on that Subject. Before we can withdraw we must pay all our debts, and sett things right w<sup>t</sup>: ever it cost, & if w<sup>th</sup>: draw, w<sup>t</sup>: ever it cost must be putt to acc<sup>t</sup>: of oppression & wrong, and they must be reckoned w<sup>th</sup>: for it hereafter.

11. If these pittifull Mercenary men have not their wills in every thing, 'tis presently, they will doe our buisnes at home, we are in fine case, if every Capt<sup>n</sup>: [y<sup>t</sup>: is ignorant enough except in his own conceit] shall take upon him to judge of y<sup>e</sup>: Actions, and y<sup>e</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: affairs under y<sup>e</sup>: Conduct of their Servant here, But to y<sup>t</sup>: height are y<sup>e</sup>: grown, y<sup>t</sup>: they doe not onely censure their Serv<sup>ts</sup>: in India at their pleasure, but reflect upon y<sup>e</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Govern<sup>r</sup>: & Comp<sup>a</sup>: and their management of Affairs, of which sort you have some w<sup>th</sup>: you, which wee shall not name.

It is very true, you were pleas'd to acquainte M<sup>r</sup>: Davis y<sup>t</sup>: you were not in a Condition to Satisfie w<sup>t</sup>: we Should be indebted to y<sup>e</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>: and order'd him to oblige y<sup>m</sup>: w<sup>t</sup>: possible to Stay till you Should, w<sup>ch</sup>: we did, but they were Soe importunate w<sup>th</sup>: us for wrighting for Pag<sup>s</sup> 5000 to satisfie their constant dunners, y<sup>t</sup>: we could not possibly avoid w<sup>ch</sup>: wee had not otherwise done; being very Sensible how straitn'd you are for Mony, and we have not been wanting to y<sup>e</sup>: utmost of our powers to maintaine y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Interest in giving y<sup>e</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>: the pro[s]pect of a very Speedy and considerable Supply of mony.

Wee have long since proceeded for Porto Novo, had not M<sup>r</sup>: Davis his indisposition of a feaver & cold hindred itt, who now thanks be to God is pretty well, and hope will not be long before we goe, w<sup>t</sup>: we shall oblige y<sup>e</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>: w<sup>t</sup>: possible to take of y<sup>e</sup>: Europe goods, w<sup>ch</sup>: we fear will be a difficult business, M<sup>r</sup>: Davis having wrote to y<sup>m</sup>: concerning it, upon his arrivall, that they well knew they had obliged y<sup>m</sup> Selves for w<sup>t</sup>: Soever Investm<sup>t</sup>: Should be made w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>m</sup>: to take of Europe goods proportionable as our Merch<sup>ts</sup>: here had done, and therefore why they should scruple y<sup>e</sup>: doing of it, now he knew not. To w<sup>ch</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: returned this answere, y<sup>t</sup>: 'twas very true they had made him Such a promise, but Since had agreed w<sup>th</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Ord on other termes, w<sup>ch</sup>: made their former promise void, & that they were not by contract w<sup>th</sup>: him obliged to take any part of y<sup>e</sup>: Investment in Europe goods.

Wee also desire you will please to receive of M<sup>r</sup>: Ord y<sup>s</sup>: ballance of his account, being Pag<sup>r</sup>: 207 : 7 fa : w<sup>ch</sup>: please to Creditt us for.

You were formerly advised of a mistake in Shipping of from Porto Novo a Bale of fine Neckcloths N<sup>o</sup> 40 † Invoiced to you to containe 160 peeces, w<sup>ch</sup>: contain'd but 120: there is also come since to o<sup>r</sup>: knowledge a Bale of Bettillae

1. Our last to yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: &<sup>ca</sup>: was y<sup>e</sup>: 12<sup>th</sup>: Ult: by y<sup>e</sup>: Defence, a Coppy of w<sup>ch</sup>: goes herew<sup>th</sup>:

Wee writt you y<sup>n</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: we had Ship'd aboard y<sup>e</sup>: Defence, 4,000 bags of Petre, & 4,000 bags of Turmeric, w<sup>ch</sup>: went upon Purgoes & Boraes a little before, presumeing they would goe safe, it being y<sup>n</sup>: fair whether & at such time y<sup>t</sup>: we did not expect Southerly winds, and had no other way to send itt down, our Sloops being all imploy'd in carrying down Sugar & Bale goods, & would bee to little for y<sup>e</sup>: carrying down y<sup>e</sup>: Bale goods y<sup>e</sup>: next turne to the Ship Ann.

2. It so fell out y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Purgoes (y<sup>t</sup>: went y<sup>e</sup>: 9<sup>th</sup>: & 10<sup>th</sup>: of Jan<sup>ry</sup>) after a long Passage down y<sup>e</sup>: River, being stop'd Some time att Tanna by the Choukye there, & y<sup>e</sup>: Southerly winds setting in, Soe early, w<sup>ch</sup>: was more y<sup>n</sup>: usuall, & w<sup>n</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: came into y<sup>e</sup>: Road, y<sup>e</sup>: winds continuing in y<sup>e</sup>: quarter, blew So hard, y<sup>t</sup>: it brought in a very great Sea, and continuing to blow, forc'd some of y<sup>e</sup>: Purgoes upon y<sup>e</sup>: Lee Shoar, & beat y<sup>m</sup>: in peeces, others foundred in y<sup>e</sup>: Road, & most of y<sup>e</sup>: men lost we have notice of [six] were lost, and w<sup>th</sup> them 1,900 bags of Petre, and 1,075 bags of Turmeric, w<sup>t</sup>: more we yett have no Account.

3. Upon the first notice we order'd y<sup>t</sup>: Cap<sup>t</sup>: Heath should be dispatch'd, having noe way to send down more in time, & y<sup>e</sup>: Cap<sup>t</sup>: being impatient for fear he should not gett out of y<sup>e</sup>: Road.

4. There went in a Purgoe 614 Baggs of Sugar, for y<sup>e</sup>: Bengall Merch<sup>t</sup>: under y<sup>e</sup>: Care of y<sup>e</sup>: Ship Thō: but it proving calme about Kedgerree, y<sup>e</sup>: Purgoe rowed away, and in y<sup>e</sup>: Road mett w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Southerly winds, and Since hath not been heard of. We writt to M<sup>r</sup>: Safford (who went down in y<sup>e</sup>: Sloop Tho: to dispatch all the Ships in y<sup>e</sup>: Road) giveing him Order, to dispatch y<sup>e</sup>: Bengall Merch<sup>t</sup>: forthw<sup>th</sup>: but his stay for y<sup>e</sup>: Purgoe might cause him to loose his Voyage, being Soe late.

5. Wee having not recd one Peece of goods from Dacca & Cassimbuzar towards y<sup>e</sup>: Lading of y<sup>e</sup>: Ship Ann, did w<sup>t</sup>: we could to [gett] in goods here, and so succeeded, Setting all hands to Sort, y<sup>t</sup>: by y<sup>e</sup>: 30<sup>th</sup> of January we had Sorted, embaled, and laden on y<sup>e</sup>: last sloops, goods to y<sup>e</sup>: amo<sup>t</sup> of Rs. [5] 20126 : 2 A : 6 P. Besides w<sup>ch</sup>: they have laden upon said Ship, between two & three hundred Bales of Cloth from Ballasore, and 300 bags of Cowries. On y<sup>e</sup> 3<sup>d</sup>: Inst: , y<sup>e</sup>: dispatch w<sup>th</sup>: Pacquet for Engl<sup>d</sup> went down w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: last goods, to Ballasore Road, w<sup>th</sup>: orders to give a Speedy dispatch to y<sup>e</sup>: S<sup>d</sup>: Ship, M<sup>r</sup>: Safford being in y<sup>e</sup>: Road to y<sup>t</sup>: end.

6. Now are come down 39 Bales & Chests of goods from Dacca M<sup>r</sup>: Pownsett having att last obtain'd a distick for their coming away. Wee should have Ship'd, on y<sup>e</sup>: Sloop Thomas as many as she would hold of said Bales & Chests, & Sent y<sup>m</sup>: to you but we were of Opinion, 'twould be so great a Hazard, to send near a Lack of Rs: upon Such a Vessell, at this time of y<sup>e</sup>: year, y<sup>e</sup>: Master being a Stranger in these parts, and must goe so farr off to sea, to reach y<sup>e</sup>: ffort, y<sup>t</sup>: twas doubtfull but y<sup>t</sup>: he would meet w<sup>th</sup>: bād weather, & besides, he hath not any body w<sup>th</sup> him y<sup>t</sup>: is capable to manage y<sup>e</sup>: Navigable part of y<sup>e</sup>: Voyage, we have therefore sent him away w<sup>th</sup>: Petre and Turmericke, Bill of Lading and Invoice come here w<sup>th</sup>: , amo<sup>t</sup>: to Rs. 923 : 0<sup>t</sup>: 6<sup>r</sup>

7. Wee have not been able w<sup>th</sup>: all Indeavours to accommodate y<sup>e</sup>: difference at Cassimbuzar, or to take y<sup>e</sup>: Nabob off from his demand of M<sup>r</sup>: Charnock, or y<sup>e</sup>: paym<sup>t</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: 43000 Rs: After two months, y<sup>t</sup>: they have been baseiged

as 'twere y<sup>e</sup>: Assoal, or Messenger, is gone to make his complaint, and hath carryed w<sup>th</sup>: him to Dacca Attestations against us. Coppy of y<sup>e</sup>: last letter from thence wee send your Hon<sup>r</sup>: & c<sup>a</sup>:

8. Wee cant yield y<sup>m</sup>: any releife, all y<sup>e</sup> Ships gone the Sloops gone to y<sup>e</sup>: Road, except y<sup>e</sup>: small Sloops that is going to y<sup>e</sup>: Fort, on w<sup>ch</sup>: is but two Englishmen besides y<sup>e</sup>: Master, by w<sup>ch</sup>: yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: & c<sup>a</sup>: may see, its not Soe easy a matter, to w<sup>th</sup>: draw, as it hath been made and indeed our People can't w<sup>th</sup>: draw from any ffactory in y<sup>e</sup>: Country w<sup>th</sup>: out y<sup>e</sup>: Govern<sup>rs</sup>: leave & tis now beyond all question, for they cannot come w<sup>th</sup>: out y<sup>e</sup>: Countreys help, and if proclamation be made, y<sup>t</sup>: no one shall serve us, they dare not doe it.

9. Wee hear y<sup>e</sup>: Nabob is promis'd one third of w<sup>t</sup>: they gett of us, by his giving y<sup>e</sup>: cause against us, w<sup>ch</sup> is y<sup>e</sup>: main reason y<sup>t</sup>: he So stiffly adhears to those Villains, & y<sup>e</sup>: Phusdar, Cozsee & [Mutsuddyes, & are] promised another, Third, upon w<sup>ch</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: are all sett against us & make use of every petty thing to incense the Nabob, adding and aggravateing things to y<sup>t</sup>: end.

10. And very unhappily did y<sup>e</sup>: Ryott at Ballasore fall out, at about y<sup>e</sup>: same time, w<sup>ch</sup>: was writt immediatly to y<sup>e</sup> Phousdar of this Place (who is also Phousdar & Droga of y<sup>e</sup>: Customs at Ballasore) and aggravated to him by his deputy, y<sup>t</sup>: Soe intraged y<sup>e</sup>: Phousdar (being under apprehension y<sup>t</sup>: he was neglect'd, it readily took w<sup>th</sup>: him) y<sup>t</sup>: he wrote to y<sup>e</sup>: Nabob, & aggravated y<sup>e</sup>: matter, in Such manner, y<sup>t</sup>: all our friends became o<sup>r</sup>: Enemies, & continue so to bee, Saying w<sup>t</sup>: will y<sup>e</sup>: English take Prisoner y<sup>e</sup>: Kings Standerd, y<sup>e</sup>: Ensigne of his power & authority? w<sup>t</sup>: will they doe next? The Nabob writes this to y<sup>e</sup>: King & himselfe is enrag'd at y<sup>e</sup>: Information. The Captains make light of these things, nay, rather abett, y<sup>n</sup> hinder their Men, and are ready to revenge themselves, as we here some were going to doe att y<sup>e</sup>: time w<sup>n</sup>: this happen'd, We never hear of any Complaints against y<sup>e</sup>: Dutch of y<sup>e</sup>: nature, their men never give y<sup>e</sup>: least occasion of trouble to y<sup>e</sup>: Director & c<sup>a</sup>: they always sending an officer ashoar w<sup>th</sup>: their men, who is to give acco<sup>t</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: Crew w<sup>th</sup>: him, being exceeding cautious : in all respects of giving any offences to y<sup>e</sup>: Countrey.

11. Wee have w<sup>th</sup>: all diligence apply'd o<sup>r</sup>: selves to y<sup>e</sup>: taking off y<sup>e</sup>: Phousdar, hee says he can't be friends, having writt against us to y<sup>e</sup>: Nabob, and our offence is so great, y<sup>t</sup>: he shall be brought under suspicion y<sup>t</sup>: he is an Enemy to y<sup>e</sup>: King, or y<sup>t</sup>: he hath taken a bribe of us.

12. Wee looke in a litle time to be putt to a great dilemma whether to Stay, or betake ourselves, to o<sup>r</sup> Sloops, both being of great difficulty to resolve about.

13. Wee have Sign'd all Papers in order to Mahmood Hunifi's going to y<sup>e</sup> King, but he is not yett gone, after we had gott all translated (w<sup>ch</sup>: was some time delay'd by our want of time, being imploy'd in getting goods ready for y<sup>e</sup>: Ann) The Vaqueels going [was] detarded by y<sup>e</sup>: objections he made against y<sup>e</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Presidents letter to y<sup>e</sup>: King. Two things he stuck att, w<sup>ch</sup>: cost us Some time to gett over, (sending to M<sup>r</sup>: Charnock for his opinion therein, (Viz<sup>t</sup>:

First he objected against w<sup>t</sup>: was s<sup>d</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: we had y<sup>e</sup>: Kings gracious Phirmaund; not to pay Custom & c<sup>a</sup>: Alledging we have no such Phirmand. The Phirmaund being not directed to Nabob of Bengalla but to y<sup>e</sup>: Govern<sup>r</sup>: at Surratt, & y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Letter would doe us great hurt if itt should bee deliver'd, & himselfe brought under disgrace & c<sup>a</sup>:

The Second thing he objected against was y<sup>e</sup>: Complaint against y<sup>e</sup>: Govern<sup>rs</sup>: here, alledging, y<sup>t</sup>: no Complaints are there rec'd w<sup>th</sup>: out Mahuzzars or Attestations from credible Persons, and they are onely Mussulmen (or true Believers) and y<sup>e</sup>: most was, to have an Ameen (or Examiner) to come down att our Charge, to examine y<sup>e</sup>: matter of Complaints, w<sup>ch</sup>: would soe incense all y<sup>e</sup> Govern<sup>rs</sup>:; y<sup>t</sup>: they would bend all their Power & Interest ag<sup>t</sup>: us, & would be beleived in w<sup>t</sup>: they Said, and would not want Attestations against us, w<sup>n</sup> we Should not bee able to make any Proofs against them.

Wee at last gott him over all these Objections. And Since our troubles w<sup>th</sup>: o<sup>r</sup>: Govern<sup>rs</sup>: a new govern<sup>r</sup>: being come, in y<sup>e</sup>: Room of Arerbeig deceased, who is a parson of y<sup>e</sup>: Kings Duanat [Duna's] Cast, that will take no gift, and is

prying into all matters, & calling for an exact acc<sup>t</sup>: of goods we Ship off &<sup>ca</sup>: about w<sup>ch</sup>: we are feign to imploy Mahmood Hu[n]life to make friends, w<sup>ch</sup>: his duan and Serv<sup>ts</sup>: w<sup>th</sup>: whose eyes he must See, or be blinded, hee intends now in few days to depart.

14. Our Protest did reach Agent Hedges &<sup>ca</sup>: in y<sup>e</sup>: Road, & was delivered y<sup>m</sup>: by M<sup>r</sup>: Fitzhugh, in P<sup>s</sup>ence of three Wittnesses, who have attested a Coppy, w<sup>ch</sup>: we have Sent to y<sup>e</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Ag<sup>t</sup> Hedges Said, he would answer it, M<sup>r</sup>: Gough Said (as M<sup>r</sup>: Fitzhugh writes, y<sup>t</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup>: was not seemly for him to write us. M<sup>r</sup>: Dowglass said nothing at all to itt.

THE 10<sup>TH</sup> OF FEBRU<sup>RY</sup>: 1684.

15. Since y<sup>e</sup>: above, things looke w<sup>th</sup>: a more hopefull aspect. The Nabob hath acceptd of o<sup>r</sup>: Present, w<sup>ch</sup>: he hath w<sup>th</sup>: difficulty been brought too, & is soe pleas'd w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Horse, & fine Guns, w<sup>th</sup>: some other things, y<sup>t</sup>: he hath Sent y<sup>e</sup>: Agent a Seerpaw, w<sup>ch</sup>: was yesterday recd, M<sup>r</sup>: Pownsett writes, y<sup>t</sup>: he would, y<sup>e</sup>: next day after y<sup>e</sup>: Present was deliver'd, make his Complaint, we have great hopes to hear y<sup>t</sup>: he will interpose in y<sup>e</sup>: business of Cassimbuzar. This day from Cassimbuzar we have advice, y<sup>t</sup>: they applyed y<sup>m</sup>selves to one Bansduray Congo of y<sup>t</sup>: place, & a very considerable person, who had been w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Phousdar, Cremalmulbeck, & had given him to understand, y<sup>t</sup>: he had unjustly disobliged y<sup>e</sup>: English, who have severall years been great Traders, to y<sup>e</sup>: great improving of y<sup>e</sup>: Kings Rents, & y<sup>t</sup>: now they had given out no mony w<sup>ch</sup>: had caus'd: a great Clamor in y<sup>e</sup>: Country, & y<sup>t</sup>: they have hopes by y<sup>e</sup> means, to make an end of their business.

16. Wee find we have been to blame in sending away so much Cloth from hence, y<sup>t</sup>: wee have not left any for presents, either here or in other places, w<sup>ch</sup>: was a great failing in y<sup>e</sup>: Warehouse keeper, we therefore desire yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: to send us, by y<sup>e</sup> first Ship y<sup>t</sup>: comes this way (if it be not disposed of before y<sup>e</sup>: comes to hand) about thirty or forty Peices Viz<sup>t</sup>: 15 p<sup>cs</sup> fine Red, & Green, y<sup>e</sup>: rest ordinary Red & Green.

17. Wee are advis'd, y<sup>e</sup>: Dutch, upon y<sup>e</sup>: comeing of a new Director, have sent up for a P<sup>s</sup>ent to y<sup>e</sup>: Nabob, Elephants, Horses, Broadcloth, Flintware, Lookeing Glasses, Spice of all Sorts, Scimiter Blades Japan Screens & Scretiores, to a great value we have not yett y<sup>e</sup>: acc<sup>t</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: am<sup>t</sup>: but shall have in a little time.

18. Herew<sup>th</sup>: goes an Acc<sup>t</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: Stores belonging to y<sup>e</sup>: Sloop Thomas, w<sup>th</sup>: w<sup>t</sup>: mony we have p<sup>d</sup>: to y<sup>e</sup>: Men belonging to her. Wee have advice y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Sloop Ganges is Sunke comeing downe Ballasore River, and y<sup>e</sup>: Madapollam is Soe disabled, by her being cast on y<sup>e</sup>: Sand, and lying there 12 or 14 days, that Shee will hardly be repaired. Wee Wordanane Gruapah, Pynde Cundana Bawloo, Gubba Lingapa, Conda Shamboondoo, Nagoola Cunda Jagana, Angode Zogee &<sup>ca</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>: desire our humble Sallams to yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: &<sup>ca</sup>: . 1st. His advising and Importuning Cap<sup>t</sup> : Bybee [to miss Syllibarr or over Shute it, but Cap<sup>t</sup> : Bybee] would not, fearing it would damnifie him, his orders from his Worsp<sup>t</sup> : & Councill being to y<sup>e</sup> Contrary.



2d. His denying our Cape Merch<sup>ts</sup> : men att severall times to doe y<sup>e</sup> : Hon<sup>ble</sup> : Comp<sup>as</sup> business, telling Cap<sup>t</sup> : Bybee y<sup>t</sup> : they were to mind the Shipp's business first.

3d. His arguing in y<sup>e</sup> Presence of our Cape Merch<sup>ts</sup> & Cap<sup>t</sup> Bybee and in y<sup>e</sup> : hearing of o<sup>r</sup> : Seamen, y<sup>t</sup> : they were obliged to worke noe farther than [our] Take Reach<sup>t</sup>, w<sup>ch</sup> : occasioned severall animosity's betwixt o<sup>r</sup> Cape Merch<sup>ts</sup> & Cap<sup>t</sup> Bybee w<sup>ch</sup> : was of ill Consequence.

4th. His Employing our Carpenters and Severall of our Men dayley in y<sup>e</sup> : woods, Cutting downe great Trees and Sawing y<sup>m</sup> : into Plank, w<sup>n</sup> : our Cape Merch<sup>ts</sup> wanted men to doe y<sup>e</sup> : Hon<sup>ble</sup> : Comp<sup>as</sup> : business, dayley Complaining of M<sup>r</sup> Spencer sending y<sup>e</sup> Carpenters and Seamen into the woods, on purpose to hinder y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup> Comp<sup>as</sup> dispatch, severall times telling Cap<sup>t</sup> : Bybee y<sup>t</sup> : he had noe Occasion for soe much Plank, y<sup>t</sup> he might be asham'd to suffer his Mate Spencer to act so against the Hon<sup>ble</sup> : Comp<sup>as</sup> : Interest, y<sup>e</sup> : S<sup>d</sup> Plank in 3<sup>d</sup> : part is not, or will be used y<sup>e</sup> Voyage, part of it being I suppose sold here, y<sup>e</sup> Rest of it being on board wanting an Opertunity to be sold M<sup>r</sup> : Spencer severall times telling Cap<sup>t</sup> : Bybee it would yeald good moneys att Madrass or else where, and y<sup>t</sup> : in labouring in y<sup>e</sup> : woods in y<sup>e</sup> : heat of y<sup>e</sup> day & other Inconveniences Caused severall of our Men to be sick whereof some dyed.

5th. His calling M<sup>r</sup> : Jardin severall names Challenged him out of y<sup>e</sup> ffactory telling him y<sup>t</sup> : his severity in England was better than his in India, & y<sup>t</sup> he vallu'd no such pittifull fellows or to that effect, M<sup>r</sup> : Goddard being then absent, but coming and being told of M<sup>r</sup> : Spencers abusing of M<sup>r</sup> : Jardin at y<sup>t</sup> : severe Rate, Protested if he had been there he would have taught him, if not done him a mischeife, and went Imediatly on Board Ship to know y<sup>e</sup> : Reason Cap<sup>t</sup> : Bybee suffer'd such things, Cap<sup>t</sup> Bybee tooke M<sup>r</sup> Goddard into his Round house and us'd his endeavours to satisfie him and for Quietness sake our Cape Merch<sup>ts</sup> Stird noe farther in it, M<sup>r</sup> : Spencer Refraining to Come into y<sup>e</sup> Factory, and they not takeing any notice of him at any time whilst we Remain'd at Syllibarr.

7th. Omitting all Consultations w<sup>th</sup> : those P<sup>so</sup>ns desired and Impowred by M<sup>r</sup> : Goddards last will and Testament, Commanding y<sup>m</sup> : not to Concern themselves in or w<sup>th</sup> : y<sup>e</sup> : Hon<sup>ble</sup> : Comp<sup>as</sup> : affair's, for he would act in every Respect as he pleas'd and he would be answerable for all y<sup>t</sup> : he should doe, notwithstanding M<sup>r</sup> : Goddards possitive words and will to the Contrary.

8th. His refusing to Stay till we had answers of o<sup>r</sup> : Letters from M<sup>r</sup> Jardin w<sup>ch</sup> : we expected every day we having sent Messengers over Land and to returne w<sup>th</sup> : expedition and had bin gon 15 days, but he being Suspicious M<sup>r</sup> : Jardin would have sent an order to have stopt him, or order'd him to Indipoora w<sup>th</sup> y<sup>e</sup> Ship as he [wrote] at first, but it is & was Certainly his desire and designe, y<sup>t</sup> he might never be troubled w<sup>th</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Jardin to call him to an acc<sup>t</sup> : or his Journall to declare his former Transactions, his not goeing to Indipoora w<sup>th</sup> : y<sup>e</sup> Ship notwithstanding M<sup>r</sup> : Jardins possitive order, direct'd to Cap<sup>t</sup> : Bybee & M<sup>r</sup> : Goddard for by Consequence y<sup>e</sup> Sloop going thither, There was noe Impossibility of y<sup>e</sup> Ships goeing though it may be nott in soe short a time as the Sloop did, His Apology being y<sup>t</sup> o<sup>r</sup> : men was sick and not Capable of working y<sup>e</sup> Ship, (w<sup>ch</sup> : was frivolous) for o<sup>r</sup> : men dayly recovr'd after they were taken from theire hard labour, & goeing in boats night & day, wett & dry, but Cap<sup>t</sup> : Spencer never did Soe much as [putt] forth notwithstanding M<sup>r</sup> : Goffe askt him why he would not goe to Indapoora or how he would answer, leiving M<sup>r</sup> : Jardin & soe many men behind, but he answerd w<sup>th</sup> : soe much passion & prejudice y<sup>t</sup> : none darst mention it any more y<sup>e</sup> wind being sometimes of y<sup>e</sup> Shoar and other times out of y<sup>e</sup> Sea & a day or two before we sayld it happined to be large, & we might have made some hand of it towards Indipoora but not soe much as one attempt was made.

upon which wee sent y<sup>e</sup> cloath ashore to our house M<sup>r</sup>: Clement du Jardin had hired for y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: and y<sup>e</sup> two Rantakers that M<sup>r</sup>: Clem<sup>t</sup>: du Jardin promis'd him when y<sup>e</sup> ship was Laden, now we having almost all our pepper aboard expecting to Cleare o<sup>r</sup>: selves of this place in 2 dayes, the King of Bencoolen set our house on fire, and had much to doe to save our lives with y<sup>t</sup>: little goods wee did save, and att Intrim had 3 prowes laden in the River with pepper Intending for y<sup>e</sup> ship y<sup>e</sup> next morning, but cannot pass one great danger wee went through, with our long boat being deep laden with pepper and having put all the Cloath &c<sup>a</sup>: goods of y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: into her, when wee put from the shoar, wee found her soe deep y<sup>t</sup>: wee were forst to Leave most of y<sup>e</sup> pepper overboard and nevertheless without much Difficulty could hardly reach the ship, afterwards having gott our ship wee there remain'd the next day expecting some of y<sup>e</sup> natives to come off to us, and give us tidings what became of the rest of our goods, and y<sup>e</sup> next day (being sabbath day) thought it not convenient to doe anything still expecting somebody from the shoar, but finding none to come, the next morning wee thought fitt y<sup>t</sup>: Cap<sup>t</sup>: John Spencer might goe in with the boate, where he found two prowes and he supposing y<sup>t</sup>: they might have some of y<sup>e</sup>: Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: goods in them he went on board of one in which he found four Mallay men, of which he took one out of her and disarming all the rest Put two of our men into her ordering them for y<sup>e</sup> ship, then rowing after y<sup>e</sup> other she being neare the shoare rowed on shore so that I could not come to her, then seing of another prow coming from the [Kisna-River] he made to her and tooke her [ . . . ] found 12 men and shee being laden with pepper wee [took] on board and weighed it in the meane time Cap<sup>t</sup> John Spencer was gone to look after the Prow with our two English men but before he could come to them they were put ashore and gon to the towne then y<sup>e</sup> Cap<sup>t</sup>: Came on board and afternoon wee [thought] fitt he might goe ashore againe and send for Orangkey and other of y<sup>e</sup> Inhabitants of that Place and discourse them that wee might understand how y<sup>e</sup> Comp<sup>a</sup>: affaires on shore stood affected y<sup>e</sup> which he did and carryed one of their men ashore along with him and sent him to the King, desiring that he might treat with him and likewise sent his Linguister to Orangkey and he came Immediately, but y<sup>e</sup> King did not the Cap<sup>t</sup>: askt orankey what became of the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: goods, that was left on shore after the Dreadfull fire, he made Answer that the King had seized upon them & said they were his & that belonged to him.

Now wee seing that the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: having sustained many damages by this King would doe our best endeavours to gett restitution but finding ourselves to weak not having men enough well to man both boats & having two of our men under this Kings Custody on shoar & y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> sloop Rochester w<sup>th</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Clement du Jardin is not come back from Indeaoura, and expecting shee may come here after wee are gone wee thinke it not Convenient to use violence but y<sup>t</sup>: Cap<sup>t</sup>: John Spencer goes ashoar with his boat & use his uttmost endeavours to treat with y<sup>e</sup> King & come to some fair Composition with them both for effecting y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Affairs and releasing our two men which is all wee think fitt to propose untill wee see y<sup>e</sup> event of Cap<sup>t</sup>: John Spencers Entreaty

fullness too and upright Zeale for y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Interest with honour to youre nation and benefit to them; wish becoming frugallity in all youre Expences which is both youre duties & Interest; motives sufficient for men of any Ingenuity and wee cannot think but y<sup>t</sup>: you will behave youre selves soe as may be to youre Reputations and future Advantage which wee heartily wish, and heartily begg Gods blessing<sup>t</sup>: you may meet w<sup>th</sup>: good success y<sup>e</sup> Cargo wee send on y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Acco<sup>t</sup>: is not soe large nor soe good as wee could wish, but such as our Conditions att present will p<sup>r</sup>mitt; wee appoint you M<sup>r</sup>: Rob<sup>t</sup>: Harbin Cheife and doe Expect y<sup>t</sup>: all pay you Respects Accordingly; M<sup>r</sup>: Daniel Gyfford Second, & M<sup>r</sup>: Thomas Yale Third, recommending effectually to you to unanimously hold together love one another and advance y<sup>e</sup> publike Interest what you can it Highly Import the R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: you settle at Syam, therefore use all possible meanes to Effect it, and lett not any little Punctillio cause any difference between you or any att Syam y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: have suffered by the folly of some of their servants y<sup>t</sup>: have been there Cheifly from peavishness & c<sup>a</sup>: giving dislike to M<sup>r</sup>: Constant Faulkon thinking meane of him, because he came out in one of y<sup>e</sup> Comp<sup>as</sup>: ships in a meane Employment but it's knowne, quite otherwise; and he by his Ingenuity, worthly to be commended and Esteemed: hath raised himselfe high in y<sup>e</sup> King of Syams favour and trust wee would have you give him all fitting respect and treat him with all Handsomeness; y<sup>t</sup>: gaining on him, wee doe understand y<sup>e</sup> onylst way to secure a settlement at Syam, and wee have [ . . . . . Ingenious Enough] and understands soe well his owne Interest, and y<sup>e</sup> Interest of the King he serves; as y<sup>t</sup>: he will be ready Entertaine you; with all suitable respect and undoubtedly he must have more love for us: then for y<sup>e</sup> Dutch or French, y<sup>t</sup>: wee have almost assurance you will settle; presumeing on which wee direct y<sup>t</sup>: with as much hast as may be convenient you land all goods, for what consigned you for y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: take youre time to dispose of it, as may be most Advantageous; it matters not whether you make us Returnes or no, but if it cou'd Conveniently be, would have some returnes but leave y<sup>t</sup>: to you, but doe effectually Recommend to you, to hasten y<sup>e</sup> disposure what you can of the goods [on] ffreight and clap the returnes of y<sup>m</sup>: on board ship getting what other ffreight you can y<sup>t</sup>: if possible shee may be filled up att Syam, if soe send her away directly to us for wee would very faine have her here in such time y<sup>t</sup>: shee may be dispatched hence for England some time in January next; y<sup>t</sup>: shee may goe home a summer ship but if it should be soe y<sup>t</sup>: you cannot gett her a full ship att Syam, then lett her call att Queda to take in some goods there that wee have Agreed with Abdull Grophee about unto whose vakeele wee give you two letters, one seal'd y<sup>t</sup>: wee would have you send to Queda from Achein or Mallacca and y<sup>e</sup> other y<sup>t</sup>: is open give y<sup>e</sup> Command with him directing him to come to an Anchor att y<sup>e</sup> Barrs foot of Queda River, and send y<sup>e</sup>: letter up in his boate, our Agreement is y<sup>t</sup>: he should stopp there but 4 dayes and y<sup>e</sup> goods by y<sup>t</sup>: time be sent downe to him in hired boats, but to further his dispatch would have [s]end him his long boate if occasion: and be not precize to a day if he sees by stopping 2 or 3 dayes more may gett a good large Pcell of goods, on ffreight: and if there his ship be fully laden then to come away thence directly to us, but if not full, then to call att Achein, where wee have directed the 2 Banians wee send to put on shore there to provide pepper & c<sup>a</sup>: ready to put on board y<sup>e</sup> ship taken in which, and then lett him be directed to come away directly to us; losing as little time as may be now if it should soe fall out y<sup>t</sup>: you cannot procure a settlement at Syam then dispose of all the goods with you at prime cost in Invoice rather then bring them back, and there proceed Invest in Copper or Toothanegg & c<sup>a</sup>: but buy not lead, and bring with you, observing to governe youre selves in youre passage hither, as wee have directed you to order the Cap<sup>t</sup>.

returned us, but if not, when youre business is done, and all on board ship to come away contrive it soe y<sup>t</sup>: it may be deliver'd into y<sup>e</sup> Kings owne hands and lye on youre guard in a defencesable posture, to see for an Answer which if you have not in a Reasonable time as may be Expected y<sup>n</sup>: come away, but whatever you doe use all fair mean's first for A settlement which if cannot be effected wee shall hereafter see to lett y<sup>t</sup>: King and his ministers know y<sup>t</sup>: wee will not be Abused and y<sup>t</sup>: wee have power and force enough to Right our Masters but keep this private to yourselves wee Adjure you, and indeed wee are very desirous to have a settlem<sup>t</sup>: friendly in some measure out of Respect to M<sup>r</sup>: Phaulkon who hath been very Ingenious and Industrious, and it's ten thousand pittys he should not ~~be~~ serve y<sup>t</sup>: honour he hath gained and should Wee be forced to use force, will be his certaine overthrow which wee hope by youre prudence, and his Ingenuity will be prevented.

Wee know it's Customary to present y<sup>e</sup> King, Barcalong &c<sup>a</sup>: att first coming which wee leave to youre discretions, advising in it with M<sup>r</sup>: Faulkon, it's usuall with y<sup>t</sup>: King to make returnes of all presents, to their full Vallue which you must give y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Credit for, as ever was observed.

Wee would have you keep a Diary of all Materiall Passages in y<sup>e</sup> whole voyage, and whils't att Syam, in it lett all Consultations sales of goods &c<sup>a</sup>: be Incerted signed and a discourse of the trade too, & from Syam y<sup>e</sup> time of y<sup>e</sup> Junkes going thence for Japan, their Cargoes out with y<sup>e</sup> time of their returne, and usuall Cargoes but one of these Diarys send us.

Wee understand from Achein y<sup>t</sup>: there was there a new Interloping ship called y<sup>e</sup> Barcalong bound for Syam stir what you can against them, in prudence not to hinder youre settling shee is a ship of 400 Tons, as wee are Informed wholly consigned to M<sup>r</sup>: Phaulkon which makes us soe cautious concerning her; and if you cannot prevaile with him to disowne her, yett if you settle may hereafter gett him, to wholly refuse all Interlopers coming to Syam which is what wee very Effectually recommend to yo<sup>r</sup>: best Endeavours as a most Acceptable peece of service.

The Cheif wee direct keep y<sup>e</sup> Cash, and are possitive to have it ballanced every month, when y<sup>e</sup> second and third is to see y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Cash agrees with y<sup>e</sup> Ballance, y<sup>e</sup> Cheif signe, y<sup>e</sup> monthly Acco<sup>ts</sup>: Cash-keep in a book for y<sup>e</sup> purpose and y<sup>e</sup> second and third Wittness it.

Wee Require you to entertaine noe Interlopers nor stragling English men in y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Factory to Avoyd unnecessary Expences, and future great troubles and Inconveniencys y<sup>t</sup>: may happen on y<sup>e</sup> Irregular & unwarrantable Actions of such people. The second wee would have keep the bookes [of Accompts] of the ffactory or voyage, & y<sup>e</sup> third y<sup>e</sup> warehouse keep [ . . . ] Expences. With these wee give you An Accompt ffreight of what goods on board y<sup>e</sup> ship by which you will see who they belong to unto whome consigned and att what place to be landed may be carefull in y<sup>e</sup> Delivery of y<sup>m</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: there be noe complaints.

In youre Invoice you will find a present for y<sup>e</sup> Queen of Achein &c<sup>a</sup>: which wee would have you diliver with all usuall Ceremony's & respect, together with y<sup>e</sup> President[s] Letter to her, and recommend to the Queen &c<sup>a</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> two Banians y<sup>t</sup>: goes on y<sup>e</sup> ship who are Intrusted to Receive y<sup>r</sup>: freight of y<sup>e</sup> goods landed there, & wee have directed y<sup>m</sup>: two to dispose of it, at Achein wee understand is M<sup>r</sup>: Rich<sup>d</sup>: Mohun a Gentlem[an] y<sup>t</sup>: wee thinke very ready to serve y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: in what he can he lives in y<sup>e</sup> Companys house, pray make all nimble dispatch there and away for Syam.

On board y<sup>e</sup> Ship is 100 Baggs of Wheat and 5 Chests of Syraz wine for Bombay which wee would have you put ashore there & y<sup>e</sup> Callecutt Eight baggs Gold that was put on board from y<sup>e</sup> Williamson y<sup>t</sup>: you must be shure to put ashore att Callecutt with our letter for y<sup>e</sup> Cheife &c<sup>a</sup>: there, which wee would have you doe without making any more stay y<sup>n</sup>: an Absolute necessity may require and in Case you cannot land y<sup>e</sup>: wheat and wine att Bombay without making loss of time carry it with you and make the most of it att Mallacca giving us Credit for it, wee have a Young man for Carwarr; but it's soe late in y<sup>e</sup> yeare as dare not

In primis : That y<sup>e</sup> Govern<sup>r</sup>: and persons afores<sup>d</sup>: & every of them their heires Executo<sup>rs</sup>: Administrato<sup>rs</sup>: be for ever Indemnified for all and all man<sup>r</sup>: of mutinees and all Acts whatsoever relating to the late Revolu<sup>c</sup>on made on y<sup>e</sup> Island on y<sup>e</sup>: 27<sup>th</sup>: Xb<sup>er</sup> 1683 or att any time since until y<sup>e</sup>: surrend<sup>r</sup>: of s<sup>d</sup>: Island unto S<sup>r</sup>: Thomas Grantham and y<sup>t</sup>: Action so done on y<sup>e</sup>: 27<sup>th</sup>: day of Xb<sup>er</sup> as afores<sup>d</sup>: though it shall bee deemed Treason or otherwise yet notwithstanding y<sup>t</sup> it be wholly pardoned to y<sup>m</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: S<sup>d</sup>: Governour & their Heir's Executo<sup>rs</sup>: Administrators, and y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: s<sup>d</sup>: Action be forgiven and buried in oblivion and never to be prosecuted by y<sup>e</sup>: Hono<sup>ble</sup>: English East India Comp<sup>ts</sup>: their successors or servants whatsoever.

3<sup>d</sup>: That neither M<sup>r</sup>: Charles Ward, nor any of his y<sup>n</sup>: Councill or any other person in y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: service y<sup>t</sup>: may pretend falce Imprisonm<sup>t</sup>: or any other force whatsoever, shall sue, molest, Trouble, or have any benefit of the lawes

Wee have Rec<sup>d</sup> youres of the 18<sup>th</sup>: June wherein you are pleas'd to acquaint us that by p<sup>ar</sup>ticular advice you understood y<sup>t</sup>: Merch<sup>ts</sup>: att Porto Novo are desirous to freight [one] of our Europe ships for Acheen, and y<sup>t</sup>: youre Intentions were to dispatch Ship Kempthorn towards us to proceed on y<sup>t</sup>: voyage and to y<sup>e</sup> west Coast of Sumatra, wee have therefore propos'd it to Our Merch<sup>ts</sup>: and allsoe wrote to M<sup>r</sup>: Cawley to propose it to y<sup>e</sup> Merch<sup>ts</sup>: of Porto Novo to freight on her, but wee find our Merch<sup>ts</sup>: not to be obliged thereto having formerly laden on y<sup>e</sup> Amoy Merch<sup>t</sup>:; for which they have yett Rec<sup>d</sup>: noe Returnes which hath soe farr discouraged them as not to Adventure further till they have.

M<sup>r</sup>: Cawley Advises from Porto Novo y<sup>t</sup> hee is in Expecta<sup>ti</sup>on of some quantity of goods y<sup>t</sup>: was bail'd there, but that the Merchants have not yett subscribed to what number, but this day expects they will, which you shall be Advised of as soon as wee heare from him.

Wee have for Encourgement of y<sup>e</sup> Merch<sup>ts</sup>: to lade bale goods ordered M<sup>r</sup>: Cawley to p<sup>ro</sup>mitt y<sup>m</sup>: to lade a proportionable quantity of Rice thereto reserving roome for y<sup>e</sup> laden [ . . . ] to be provided for y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Acco<sup>t</sup>: for provision [of] which have remitted Pago<sup>s</sup>: 500 to M<sup>r</sup>: Cawley who advises part thereof to be remitted to Corracoll and his Intentions of sending the rest as soon as he shall have an Acco<sup>t</sup>: thereof w<sup>ch</sup>: wee hope may be invested in good time, and y<sup>e</sup> Rice come out as Reasonable as last yeare.

The Merch<sup>ts</sup>: Required of us before they would enter into obliga<sup>ti</sup>on to freight on the ship that wee doe oblige ourselves that shee shall sayle for y<sup>e</sup> coast of Acheen in one months time after y<sup>e</sup> signing their obligations, and in default thereof that wee make good to them the price of Atcheene for their goods which wee have ordered M<sup>r</sup>: Cawley in behalfe of y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: to doe provided the Merchants on their parts oblige themselves to make good the Amount of y<sup>e</sup> freights of their goods shall not be laden by the aforesaid time.

Wee desire you will please to supply us with medecines of which wee have none for the use of y<sup>e</sup> factory upon whatever occasion should happen.

Wee desire you if y<sup>e</sup> ship be not already dispatched [y<sup>t</sup>:] you will please to doe it [as] soon as possible the Arrival of whome tis very probable [may] oblige more merchants to lade which is what offers att present from

Our last to youre Hono<sup>r</sup>: & C<sup>a</sup>: was 25<sup>th</sup>: Feb<sup>r</sup>: 1684 by Pattamer overland, Advising y<sup>e</sup> Arrivall of ship Loyall Eagle w<sup>th</sup>: coppie of y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Generall to y<sup>e</sup> Bay and what letters came to y<sup>e</sup> ffort by s<sup>d</sup>: ship, and second bill of lading for ship Defence, since which on 5<sup>th</sup> Instant have rec<sup>d</sup>: youre Hono<sup>r</sup>: & C<sup>a</sup>: of 5<sup>th</sup>: March last in Answer to ours of 1<sup>st</sup>: & 6 Jan<sup>r</sup>: to which shall now Reply.

Wee are much Troubled y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: protest against Agent Hedges &c<sup>a</sup>: for carrying away Robert Hedges (greatly a Debtor to y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>:) came to late, which was by y<sup>e</sup> unfaithfulness of the Frenchman who gave us great Assurances y<sup>t</sup>: he would not pass by without delivering y<sup>e</sup> pacquett to the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Presid<sup>t</sup>: with his own hand who wee feare was Induc'd thereunto by some y<sup>t</sup>: gott y<sup>e</sup> knowledge of what was in the Pacquett after it was out of our hands.

To withdraw o<sup>r</sup> Factories of Pattana and Dacca whatever good effect it might have wee find Impossible to be done without y<sup>e</sup> Respective Nabobs of each place their Dustick which wee are now concerned and certain that as they will not doe it till all our debts are payd soe without it our people cannot come away and to pay our debts wee have been noe way capable to this Day tis true wee have come by y<sup>e</sup> Eagle [20] Chests of silver, but y<sup>e</sup> southerly monsoon held [our Vesselle in] Ballasore so [long] before they could have slatch to gett out, y<sup>t</sup>: tis but lately y<sup>t</sup>: our Treasure came up, and such are y<sup>e</sup>: Horrible abuses of the Mint, y<sup>e</sup> troubles at Cassimbuzar (and Ballasore [at] which [none], after reply to youre letter) y<sup>t</sup>: wee have not sent up [our] treasure to y<sup>e</sup> Mint; and sell it wee can't for ready mony at any reasonable rate yett notwithstanding wee have not faild to Insist upon demanding of [our rights?], but all to noe purpose, for they Increase their wrongs and Injuries.

Wee have great demands upon us for money at Interest at Casimbuzar but have not had money to satisfie y<sup>m</sup>: but wee hope M<sup>r</sup>: Charnocke &c<sup>a</sup> will pay of the most urgent, with y<sup>e</sup>: money that could be spared them of y<sup>e</sup> Remains of y<sup>e</sup>: Mint.

Att Cassimbuzar, after all Endeavours used att Dacca, and with the Goven<sup>r</sup>: att Muxadavad, to have y<sup>t</sup>: business Arbitrated by Merchants, wee cannot yett bring it to any Issue they Insisting upon our paying y<sup>e</sup> Picars y<sup>e</sup> 43000 Rup<sup>s</sup>: as wee have in our former Advised though wee have been put upon it; to make Tryall of coming away yet wee find it cannot be done without y<sup>e</sup> Countreys leave, and though wee have twenty souldiers there they signifie nothing, for wee must neither shoot nor cutt except wee would endanger all the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Estate, and ourselves both aloft and there to be cutt of.

The Present wee gave y<sup>e</sup> Nabob, it being handsome and of good vallue, was kindly Accepted, after wa[rd] made which cost some time, yett y<sup>e</sup> Picars, makeing [an] offer to him of soe great a part of what he would now soe unjustly force from us, wee can expect noe Justice from him unless wee offer him a greater sune.

Wee are glad to heare the Syam Merch<sup>t</sup>: did not miss of y<sup>e</sup> Persia voiage. It being soe late before wee could gett in y<sup>e</sup> sugars for y<sup>e</sup> Bengall Merch<sup>ts</sup>: togeather with y<sup>e</sup> necessity wee were put to of sending part of her Lading downe by Purgoes, which had a long passage down, it was to [ . . . ] for her to call att Metchlepatam, and save her voiage as formerly Advised, shee being dispatched not till 1<sup>st</sup>: of February.

The Countrey vessell upon which M<sup>r</sup>: Griffith came, made soe bad weather in the [Ro]ad, y<sup>t</sup>: he went on board y<sup>e</sup> Eagle, and not having an opportunity for getting a Pillott off. The Master ventur'd up, and came safe hither, M<sup>r</sup>: Griffith is since gon to Ballasore, whence wee Expected him by y<sup>e</sup> first opportunity when he comes will be very wellcome to us att a time when wee want not only Councell but strength, the Agent having been under great Indisposition these eight or ten dayes M<sup>r</sup>: Ley continues a living man to Admiration being soe worne away and soe weake with his flux & feavour (still continuing) that he can't help himselfe y<sup>t</sup>: of his Recovery wee have little hopes.

As wee have Indeavoured to keep y<sup>e</sup> Merch<sup>ts</sup>: up to their Musters, being sensible y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: have been wronged therin, soe wee shall Endeavour to put off what Europe goods wee have being principally lead, of which wee have great quantity and it is of little or noe demand in the Countrey and therefore of low price the truth is wee have noe People here for trade they knowing little or nothing but the takeing of the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: money and therewith picking up Cloth amonge the Weavers.



Wee are exceeding glad to heare y<sup>e</sup>: Beaufort and Rochester [were] only dispatched in time, but with soe Considerable Cargoes and pray [ . . . ] you, they may safely arrive with our Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Masters and are noe less glad you have found an Im[pedy]ment for the Resolution [and] Defence to soe hopefull a purpose, for y<sup>e</sup>: time to come, and hope allsoe for y<sup>e</sup> present, soe as y<sup>t</sup>: it may Answer their stay by finding a Considerable part of their lading att Priaman, where wee shall be glad to heare; y<sup>t</sup>: youre Intended settlement may succeed and y<sup>t</sup>: our people have soe much health as may Incourage to a fixing there, The long stay of y<sup>e</sup> John and Mary makes y<sup>e</sup> Issue doubtfull pray God shee [come] safe att last, wee hope y<sup>e</sup> Amoy Merch<sup>t</sup>: from Syllabarr will returne in due time, the Persia Merch<sup>t</sup>: one of the two early ships you mention is arrived safe in y<sup>e</sup>[Ro]ad on y<sup>e</sup> second Instant having made her voiage in 5 month & 16 dayes, and hope y<sup>e</sup> other did Arrive with you as soon the Coppie of y<sup>e</sup> Generalls wee Rec<sup>d</sup>: from y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: List of Goods and List of Shipping wee send you though doubt not but you have Rec<sup>d</sup>: Coppies thereof by said other early ship.

Wee are sorry to heare soe many Interlopers have escaped, one of which Viz<sup>t</sup>: the Barkeloan, having been att Acheen, and soe to Syam wee doubt not but tis M<sup>r</sup>: Whites designe, and feare the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Const<sup>t</sup>: Fa[l]kon may be too much concerned, to doe the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup> any service therein.

The Vaqueel[1] did not depart hence till 24<sup>th</sup> March last besides some business of his own (as wee belive) which made him willing to linger away y<sup>e</sup> time, y<sup>t</sup>: unhappy Accident att Ballasore of y<sup>e</sup> seamen's taking downe the Kings standard &c<sup>a</sup>: (which how light soever any may make of it, yett wee had Reason to feare might have brough[t] all into Extreem danger) layd us under a necessity of using all meanes to make ffrinds with y<sup>e</sup> Phousdar of that place who is allsoe Phousdar of Hugly, and resides here to whom the Cognizance of y<sup>t</sup>: Action did Immediately belong, Mamood hu[ni]fwa y<sup>e</sup> only man y<sup>t</sup>: could doe it, and y<sup>e</sup> matter was (or was made by him) of soe great difficulty y<sup>t</sup>: wee were att last forced to send him a way before twas made up.

Wee Rec<sup>d</sup>: a Letter from y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: President of Suratt in Answer to the Letter of y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Presid<sup>t</sup>: and Councill here of 27<sup>th</sup>: Sep<sup>r</sup>: last being duplicate of y<sup>t</sup>: whereof you sent us Coppy and had Return'd him Answer before wee read your's Coppy whereof wee herewith send you.

When wee Receive y<sup>e</sup>: Muster of Cotten yarne by M<sup>r</sup>: Griffith from the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: wee shall Indeavour to Imitate and procure what quantity possible.

That there should be soe great an Error in y<sup>e</sup> Invoice of Gold is matter of wonder to us, tis true there was cutt of of every Ingott for Essay's part of which is deducted from y<sup>e</sup>: foot of the weight in the Invoice Viz<sup>t</sup>: what was melted downe for Essaies, Amo<sup>ts</sup>: to 2<sup>Dwt</sup>: 2<sup>oz</sup>: 13<sup>gr</sup>: 0<sup>er</sup>: the Remainder was in a bagg, which the Agent forgetting to put up in the Chest with the gold put it up in A Chest belonging to the Presid<sup>t</sup>: [ . . . ] stables not[hing] thereof att the Dutch garden, of which he took a memorandum however making noe doubt but what you write is y<sup>e</sup>: truth wee must give Acco<sup>ts</sup>: Curr<sup>t</sup>: London Credit for y<sup>e</sup> same and Debt [Rajamahel] which will add to y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Losse by M<sup>r</sup>: Robert Hedges who putt y<sup>e</sup> Ingotts up, neither were they weighed by any body else, nor were in any ones hand but y<sup>e</sup> Agents who opened y<sup>e</sup> chest to find out Ingotts y<sup>t</sup> might amou<sup>t</sup>: to y<sup>e</sup> weight of what money y<sup>e</sup> Presid<sup>t</sup>: could spare us and wee then needed for which he was pleas'd to lett us have silver.

The Error in y<sup>e</sup> Invoice by y<sup>e</sup> Eagle wee find and shall give Acco<sup>t</sup>: Curr<sup>t</sup>: London true Credit.

Wee are satisfied y<sup>t</sup>: you had occasion enough, for y<sup>e</sup> silver by the Syam Merch<sup>t</sup>: and have noe Reason to grudge it, youre Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: being Capable of Improving it much better y<sup>n</sup> wee could in [our] Circumstances.

It was an Ignorance y<sup>t</sup>: Coppies of what Letters went hence Immediately for England were Required by youre Hono<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: otherwise should certainly have sent them but now wee know it is our duty wee shall noe more omitt it, and

herewith wee send Copies of what wrote by y<sup>e</sup> Henry and William, and allsoe by y<sup>e</sup> Ann, and if wee send any to the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: by way of y<sup>e</sup> Fort wee shall send y<sup>m</sup>: open, as wee proposed to doe, if god grant us life and health, y<sup>e</sup> beginning of y<sup>e</sup> next month, to goe by y<sup>e</sup> Bengalla Merchant or some other ship; wee hope you may send in August.

That there was great want of goods according to y<sup>e</sup>: Invoice and Bill of laden by y<sup>e</sup> Defence, wee know, but could not Advise thereof wee making Invoice and Bill of lading here for what sent hence which wee were necessitated to Load upon Purgoes [the Sloop] being Employed in carrying bale goods for y<sup>e</sup> Ann & c<sup>a</sup>: as formerly Advised soe y<sup>t</sup> Cap<sup>t</sup>: Heath might Justly make Exception to the Bill of Lading, and for y<sup>e</sup> loss wee must give an Acco<sup>t</sup>: Curr<sup>t</sup>: London Cr<sup>ts</sup>: by Proffitt and loss, it being Cast away to prevent such losses for y<sup>e</sup> future wee Agreeing with youre Hono<sup>r</sup>: & c<sup>a</sup>: shall (besides what formerly wrote) give [our] further opinions to the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: & c<sup>a</sup>: about the smaller ships coming up into y<sup>e</sup> Rivers and y<sup>e</sup> bigger to Kedgerie & c<sup>a</sup>: but wee are at a loss for Pillotts it being soe difficulty to gett sober men and y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: sending none out, and those that stay behind their ships, w<sup>ch</sup>: wee are forced to make use of, are usually the worst of men.

And now having given Replies to youre Hon<sup>rs</sup>: & c<sup>a</sup>: in Answer to ours of 1<sup>st</sup>: & 6<sup>th</sup>: January, wee shall proceed to give a brief Acc<sup>t</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup>: state of Affaires here att present.

Att Cassimbuzar (as wee have Already hinted) it is noe better then 'twas when y<sup>e</sup> hon<sup>ble</sup>: President [went] hence, about which time they are blocked up, tho' sometimes their Restraint is less being not put so hard to it for provisions & c<sup>a</sup>: as att other times and wee having Inde[ed] noe Cash to give out on Impress (as was usual, in March and April wee were tempted to make a virtue of our necessity, and gave out y<sup>t</sup>: it might be [ . . . ] more money till y<sup>t</sup>: Controversie was desided y<sup>e</sup> noise of wha[t] made y<sup>e</sup> poor people to clamour, and complaine, y<sup>t</sup> if y<sup>e</sup> English gave out no money they could not pay there rents nor Pellmony upon which y<sup>e</sup> Congo [Corr] gather[er] of y<sup>e</sup> people or [...] was soe farr sensible y<sup>t</sup>: he became a mediator with the Phousdar of Muxadavad and wee had thereupon great hopes to have had the business Issued a month agoe, but y<sup>t</sup>: wretched and covetous Phousdar, having great promises made him by y<sup>e</sup> Picars besides what they have promised the Nabob, is att last come to noe other Resolution y<sup>n</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: wee must pay According to y<sup>e</sup> Cozzee's Arbitrament, and y<sup>e</sup> last letter from Cassumbazar dated 3<sup>d</sup> Instant tells us he threatned to send horse and foot to y<sup>e</sup> Factory next day to force from them 45,000 R<sup>s</sup>: so that wee Expected y<sup>t</sup>: would be y<sup>e</sup> Issue, though two or 3 dayes since, Mr: Charnock, in a p<sup>ar</sup>ticular to y<sup>e</sup> Agent, hinted y<sup>t</sup>: they had better hopes of having things fairly Accommodated but wee have been to often deceived to place any dependance upon such uncertainties, tho' hope for the best.

From Dacca wee are advised y<sup>t</sup>: Haggerston by his Impudent lyes and Insinuating carriage to some great men there, to whom he has been very acceptable, has obtained a Perwanna from the Nabob (translate whereof wee herewith send you) and with it an Assoal (or Messengers from y<sup>e</sup> Nabob) to see it Executed upon Rec<sup>ts</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup> Coppie of y<sup>e</sup> said Perwanna, wee have a just and true Acco<sup>t</sup>: of the Case to [Abduli Gunny] (Governor: here) on whom the Perwanna is, and when Haggerston comes wee shall either demand him to be delivered to us, as a subject of y<sup>e</sup> King of England, and therefore not to be Admitted to a tryall of their Durbarrs against us who are allsoe subjects to y<sup>e</sup> same King y<sup>t</sup>: may send him to Suratt to Answer for his Crimes, or otherwise shall use noe utmost endeavours to detect his villanies and Forgeries, by proving it was not possible for him to have such an Estate, and therefore wee could not Rob him, as hee Alledges, and shall Act According to y<sup>e</sup> best of our Judgements as Occasion Requires, to secure y<sup>e</sup>: Hono<sup>ble</sup>: [Comp<sup>a</sup>] from Damage.

Wee had noe sooner made up y<sup>e</sup> Difference with y<sup>e</sup> Phousdar about y<sup>e</sup> riott att Ballasore (which was done with great Expence and trouble) and had made what

provision wee could against the like disorder for y<sup>e</sup> future, by draught of Letters to be delivered to Commanders of ships (Coppie whereof goes herew<sup>th</sup>;) but there came Advice to us from Ballasore y<sup>t</sup>: on y<sup>e</sup> 10 Aprill att night there was a murther Comitted upon a Peon belonging to y<sup>e</sup> Catwalls watch and some others wounded the body of w<sup>ch</sup>: murther'd person being carried to the Phousdar and Inquiry made; they fix it on the English which wee feare has so much Truth though wee doe [ . . . ] wee can with the Govenours to keep them off with too narrow a search, For should it be proved upon us wee are not able to compute what their demands may be which has caused their being blocked up, and all business whatsoever stoped ever since y<sup>t</sup>: time, Cap<sup>t</sup>: Bonnell was here, and some of his men were ashore there, but wee have Advice they were all in his house and asleep when this was done, there are other English, as severall Runawayes, and others ashore, who are guilty of great disorders, wee are struggling hard with it but cannot guess what will be y<sup>e</sup> issue, this is y<sup>e</sup> worst of our troubles, this (if proved soe) giving y<sup>m</sup>: Just occasion to say and doe y<sup>t</sup>: against us, which they have used to doe, when noe occasion, soe y<sup>t</sup>: wee lye att the mercy of every Rogue and villain to ruin the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Affaires such are our circumstances in this place.

This is to Acquaint your Hon<sup>r</sup> : and the worship<sup>l</sup> : Councill y<sup>t</sup> : yesterday wee fell downe to y<sup>e</sup> : Barrs mouth and thought to have gon over this morning but when wee sounded y<sup>e</sup> Barr wee found soe little water that wee dare not ventur over without doing y<sup>e</sup> ship some harm wherfore thought it Convenient to Acquaint youre Hono<sup>r</sup> : w<sup>th</sup> : it and likewise I have sent the 2 pilotts which doe belonge to y<sup>e</sup> : Barr which may be more satisfaction to youre Hono<sup>r</sup> : if youre Hono<sup>r</sup> : be pleased to Inquire of them they can satisfie youre Hono<sup>r</sup> : how much water there is upon y<sup>e</sup> : Barr, this being from youre.

Our last to your Hon<sup>r</sup> : & C<sup>a</sup> : was y<sup>e</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> : & 15<sup>th</sup> past overland Copy whereof goes herewith, since which (viz<sup>t</sup> : on the 13<sup>th</sup> : Ins<sup>t</sup> : wee have received two from your Hono<sup>r</sup> : & C<sup>a</sup> : dat : 20<sup>th</sup> & 28<sup>th</sup> : Aprill last by y<sup>e</sup> : hands of M<sup>r</sup> : Edw : Littleton, To which wee shall now very briefly reply, they being answers to our former, and what is needfull therein shall give due observance.

Wee us'd our Endeavours to perswaide Cap<sup>t</sup> : Bonnell to come up y<sup>e</sup> River but having no power to order him after a Councill he held with his officers, they were all against it, she being a ship of two great a Draught and it being to great a hazard for him to Run.

Wee are glad to hear the Amoy Merchant is Arrived full Laden from the West Coast of Sumatra, but can't but be sensible that the happy success Accompanied with y<sup>e</sup> loss of 3 of those in Commission and y<sup>t</sup> : tis doubtfull whether M<sup>r</sup> : du Jardin be dead or alive, and are glad you have found others y<sup>t</sup> : notwithstanding such discouragment have put on Resolution with chearfullness to undertake it, & heartily wish wee may hear of their wellfair, and y<sup>t</sup> : y<sup>e</sup> : Resolution & Defence may have like success in their Loading there, which will y<sup>e</sup> better Enable you to send them Immediately away upon their Arrivall.

Wee are sorry to hear you Designe y<sup>e</sup> Syam Merch<sup>t</sup> : hither, the [rea]son you will [see<sup>2</sup>] in the Acc<sup>t</sup> : wee give of our Affaires after wee have Reply[ed] to your Letter.



Two ships to fetch Petre or what else you think fitt, to lye y<sup>e</sup> Moonsoon here, wee shall take care to dispatch you with all possible Expedition, shall follow y<sup>e</sup> Further orders wee shall receive from your Hon<sup>r</sup> &c<sup>a</sup>: there.

Att Cassimbuzar they are in y<sup>e</sup> same Circumstances as when wee wrote you last wee having refused to pay the 43,000 Rup<sup>a</sup>: which is now come up to 45,000 R<sup>a</sup>: upon which allsoe the 150000 R<sup>a</sup>: depends and shall continue our Resolution not to yeild in y<sup>t</sup>: case, tho' it has brought many ill Consequencys upon y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Affaires, yett wee think them not so bad, as to ye[i]ld to such a President, and are glad wee have youre positive order not to yeild to it.

As to y<sup>e</sup>: withdrawing of our Factories when our Debts are paid, whether they will give us leave or noe'tis doubtfull to us they seeming to be Apprehensive, y<sup>t</sup>: if wee goe away wee will right our selves of our Injur[ey] one way or other of which more after our Reply.

The Troubles at Ballasore were not soe easily Accomodated but y<sup>t</sup>: 'tis brought in upon all occasions to Justifie their Insolencies against us, as allsoe y<sup>e</sup> latter (mençoned in our last) which was of a higher nature.

To your Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: of 28<sup>th</sup>: Aprill. Wee are glad the sloop Thomas is come safe soe farr, tho: not Arrived with you and that you Received ours, sent by her.

Touching y<sup>e</sup> Loss of Petre and Turmerick, wee have made Acco<sup>t</sup>: Curr<sup>tt</sup>: London D<sup>r</sup>: for y<sup>e</sup> whole, & C<sup>r</sup>: by Profit and Loss, for what Lost.

Mahmoodhu[n]jiffe o<sup>r</sup> (Vaqueel to Court) by reason of bad weather had a tedious passage as he gives us Account, and departed nott from Pattana, till 17<sup>th</sup>: past when he began his Journey for the Kings Camp.

Wee are convinced more and more y<sup>t</sup>: wee have Reason to complain to y<sup>e</sup> King against these Governours but the Complaints wee make will signify nothing wee fear unless wee had some great men att Court that are Enemies to these persons, and whom wee could make our Friends.

Wee Desire Broadcloth may be sent us accordingly as is Expressed in A paper Inclosed.

Wee give our Advices to Cassimbuzar in Conformity to your Hon<sup>rs</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: Order, y<sup>t</sup>: care may be taken for giving out money to Responsible persons, Except where it may fetch in good part of their old Debts.

After a Tedious and Troublesome passage M<sup>r</sup>: Griffith Arrived here The second Instant being forced att last to come [in] land from Ballasore who is very wellcome to us, he Arriving y<sup>e</sup> very day preceeding our great distress of which now wee shall give you on Account.

The matter of y<sup>e</sup> Pretended murther att Ballasore (mençoned in our last) tho' lay hard upon us, how to prevent their Wacka's & Mahuzars from going to Dacca, yett att last was Accomodated att Ballasore, upon y<sup>e</sup> best termes wee could, though w<sup>th</sup>: great charges to y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Company.

Att the same time there was Trouble coming upon us here, w<sup>ch</sup>: wee then hoped to worke off, the Govern<sup>r</sup>: Requiring our Merc<sup>ts</sup>: to sign a writing, Translate whereof wee send herewith, wee struggled with it some time, att last the Govern<sup>r</sup>: sent out his Peons fetched in our Merchants, and by beating them with Bamboes forced thirteen of them to signe s<sup>d</sup>: writing: whilst wee were contending with them, and Indeavouring to gett this matter off.

Three ships Arrived here from Suratt, and from some persons y<sup>t</sup>: came upon them, the Govern<sup>r</sup>: had Intimation that the ships belonged to moodies Banians &c<sup>a</sup>: and had only an English Master, and some few men who Acts by Commission for them, only the Master, having some small Interest in y<sup>e</sup> ship, wee having att first owned the s<sup>d</sup>: ships, as the Comp<sup>as</sup>: (as wee Esteeme all that Trade by their permission, wee thought not fitt to Enquire too str[i]ctly into the truth, having reason to fear the worst, our Contending w<sup>th</sup> them herin caused them to put a stop upon our landing goods Provisions, or any thing whatsoever, Att which time wee had to contend with them allsoe in y<sup>e</sup> case of Haggerston, who Arriv'd 17 of May last, with a dozen Peons & Horsmen & an Asaal (or messenger) to see his Perwauna Executed, upon his Arrivall, he Apply's himselfe to y<sup>e</sup> Govern<sup>rs</sup>: and y<sup>e</sup> Assoal

demands Justice when y<sup>e</sup> Parwana was read in y<sup>e</sup> open court, they sent one to us for vaqueel: to Answer for us, and they made known to him w<sup>t</sup>: had passed, and required y<sup>t</sup>: wee should Appoint a sherah vaqueel, and wee to give a writing to stand to what he should doe wee sent y<sup>m</sup> word y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> English Company had been here 55 yeares and never had any case brought into the Adollat, especially between English and English, and y<sup>t</sup> in y<sup>e</sup>: first Perwana wee had for trading here provision was made y<sup>t</sup>: all causes between one Englishman and Another should be determined by the Chief that wee were unacquainted with y<sup>e</sup> lawes, and could not Instruct A Vaqueel &c<sup>a</sup>: and told y<sup>m</sup>: wee had given in a just & true Acco<sup>t</sup>: of what Agent Hedges had seized on, and sent to Suratt, That Agent Hedges was gon home for England who by the Perwana was to be Examined ther in that matter. That the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: was no wayes concerned, nor y<sup>e</sup> present Agent further then to be a witness to y<sup>e</sup> truth of y<sup>e</sup> Account wee had given in, wherin he with others of y<sup>e</sup> Comp<sup>as</sup>: Serv<sup>ts</sup>: were ready to give them any satisfaction in a private way, and moreover y<sup>t</sup>: wee were ready by severall persons y<sup>t</sup>: were now Arrived from Surat to give them clear proof 1<sup>st</sup>: of Haggerstons Poverty, 2<sup>d</sup>: of his Roguery in Running away with the Merchants Estates, and that he had Forged an Accompt, and raised many lies upon the English to keep himselfe from Justice, but all signified nothing, they [sayes] these persons are [alsoe] parties, and their Evidence not to be Allowed with much more too tedious to give Acco<sup>t</sup>: of; But by such matter as wee had, wee held [y<sup>m</sup>:] in hand, hoping by some means or other, to prevail with them [to] have the matter Issued otherwise then in their Adollat, [where] wee were sure to be cast, att last it grew soe high, that y<sup>e</sup> Govern<sup>r</sup>: threatened to shutt us up, not allowing us provisions, wood, nor water, and would write to y<sup>e</sup> Nabob, and when should receive his order; would force y<sup>e</sup> Factory, but tho' wee Absolutely refused to give our hands for a Vaqueel (as opening a door for Ruin to y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Affaire for whoever wrongs The Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: to prevent his being Punished may but pretend a Debt due to him, and promise money to the Govern<sup>r</sup>: as Haggerston have don (& soe by degrees eat up the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Esta[te]) yett they delayed to execute their Threa[t]ning till they had another pretence which they took from what happened y<sup>e</sup> 2<sup>d</sup>: Inst<sup>t</sup> at Mid-night there being a Lewd person, one Bushell, Command<sup>r</sup>: of a Surat ship and a master of a small Ketch, M<sup>r</sup>: Griffith came in from the coast, who having been att a Punch house, and going halfe drunk aboard quarrell'd with the Governo<sup>r</sup>: Peons, placed upon A watch boat, broke their heads and carried away their Boat with their clothes and Armes which they complained of to the Governo<sup>r</sup>: shewing their wounds, next morning Early the Factory was besett with Horse and foot (till which wee had noe notice of the matter, permitting none to goe out or In) nor any provision to be brought to us they allsoe sett Peons upon the private houses and upon the water side to prevent any persons coming asho<sup>r</sup>: or going aboard, or any provisions to be sent them, Thus they Continued three dayes & three nights, wherin wee had noe Provisions, wood, fire, or water, permitted to come to us, our Vaqueel Banyans & servants restrained from coming to us, whereby wee had noe meanes of Address to the Governo<sup>r</sup>: to know what was the matter, The second Evening of our Restraint, wee sent over the wall in the night one of our servants to carry some Letters to the King's Buxee, and the Jimdar to which wee had Answer y<sup>e</sup> 4<sup>th</sup> of our Restraint, from the Jimdar, y<sup>t</sup>: wee had wounded two men, & two men are missing which wee had murth<sup>d</sup>, and Reconed up all our faults formerly done, p<sup>t</sup>icularly y<sup>t</sup>: att Ballasore, Notwithstanding which if wee would signe to six Articles (copy of which is herewith sent) they would give us our liberty and att the same time took of the Restraint soe farr, as to Allowe us provisions (both for the Factory & y<sup>e</sup> ships) Enough Every day as would serve the day.

Wee have not (nor shall yeild to signing such Articles of Trade here, but have writt to M<sup>r</sup>: Pownsett to try what can be done with the Nabob, meantime putting them of here as well as wee can with the Agents Illness, that he can't consider of matters of soe great weight &c<sup>a</sup>:

These six Articles are Haggerstons Advices who sits in Council with them in all matters Relating to the English And by M<sup>r</sup>: Davis, who is Extreem busy att this time, the seamen aboard the ships have been Influenced to fall upon the Governo<sup>rs</sup>: people on the water side, and they had certainly done it, had it not been prevented in the nick of time, there being 20 (the whole number of English aboard the ships) resolved to come ashore which had they done, wee in the Factory must Immediately have left the Factory, and fought our way to the ships to Escape with our lives, which would have given them occasion to proclaym open Warr, and to seize upon all the Factories by way of Reprizeall, and all the persons had been In their hands, for wee are beyond all doubt y<sup>t</sup>: noe person can come out of the Country without y<sup>e</sup> leave and help of the Countrey, where they double the number they are.

Apprehending there would some Trouble break out wee had two or three dayes before this sent George Herron downe to Ballasore to Pilott up the Persia Merchant which they having notice of sent 500 men down to Tanna to stop her, w<sup>ch</sup>: wee were not much concerned att, knowing they could not give her noe stop, nor need shee make Resistance to what shee could meet with, But it soe fell out (which noe man can Remember att this time of the yeare) that for tenn dayes Together, y<sup>e</sup> wind was att North, & N E<sup>t</sup>.; soe y<sup>t</sup>: shee came not up till 14 Instant finding us under Restraint they att Tanna, not firing a Gun, nor shooting an Arrowe, only making a great noise, and bid them stop in the Kings name, which the ship took noe notice of but gave them a Huzzah and came on.

The Govern<sup>r</sup>: have sent a Mahuzar or Certificate against us to Dacca Chopt with all the Principall officers & Mogull Merch<sup>ts</sup>: of this place, That wee have wounded two Peons, and Framing a Lye, y<sup>t</sup>: two men are missing and y<sup>t</sup>: wee refuse to appoint Sharrah Vaqueel In their Adollot. Wee have allsoe writt to Dacca our Arsdust or Petition of Complaint to the Nabob, & Instructions to M<sup>r</sup>: PownA[ett] & c<sup>s</sup>: as large as wee could, to take up differences there being of Opinion wee had better give money there for our Relief, then here, wee are now waiting for an Answer but are not without o<sup>r</sup> feares least y<sup>e</sup> Nabob should give Ear to their complaints against us he beleiving whatever Abdulgunny says, and y<sup>t</sup>: he will stick to this desire of theirs looking for great benefitt thereby.

One Sied Amud (a great Mogull and held in great Esteem of the people, and of y<sup>e</sup> Governo<sup>rs</sup>: themselves, being of the line of Mahomett, and seeming to favour our cause & allmost the only person y<sup>t</sup>: can come to the Govern<sup>r</sup>: , he not Admitting our Vaqueels nor any of our selves) whome the Govern<sup>r</sup>: have sent to us with some other Merchants & officers, to know our positive Answer, doe undertake y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Govern<sup>r</sup>: would Relax the severity of the six Articles if wee would comply in declaring A certain person for our Vaqueel in the Adollat, and in signing A writing: 1<sup>st</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: wee would punish our seamen for misdemeanours 2<sup>d</sup>: that wee would Entertain but 5 or 6 Gomastahs 3<sup>d</sup>: [that] wee will be Answerable for what Damage our ships doe to Country ships att sea, 4 y<sup>t</sup>: wee will bring up noe more Guns (but for y<sup>e</sup> use of the ships) then what wee will sell when demanded.

The main of which is our giving a Bond for not seizing their ships but to be lyable to make satisfaction here by which wee Apprehend they think that if wee withdraw, wee will make our selves satisfaction, and that they will therefore never lett us goe without y<sup>t</sup>: point, there being a Report amonge them not only when Agent Hedges was here, but since, that 'twas the Intention of the English to write themselves for all the wrongs Injuries they have sustained, so that wee are cast upon such A Dilemma, y<sup>t</sup>: wee know not what Course to take.

For on one side (if wee give them not satisfaction in what they demand) there Appears a probability of y<sup>e</sup> suddain Ruin of the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: affaires here, which wee know not how farr may Influence their Affaires att home.

1<sup>st</sup>. Wee are Assured .y<sup>t</sup>: if wee possitively refuse to Comply they will strictly confine us to our Factory, without affording us any provisions, and wee should not be able to hold out, above A fortnight, having noe liberty now to bring in any more then from day to Day, y<sup>t</sup>: wee can lay in noe great store, and if wee

could hold out soe long, there are three Suratt ships, two other Vessells and the Persia Merchant In the Hole who are in y<sup>e</sup> same case and will be as strictly kept from provisions as wee, and they will break out in violence for supplying themselves with provisions as the men of the Surat ships wrote us word they must unless they had speedy Redress, being allsoe Incited thereunto by Davis (as before) And Dayly provoked by the Affronts offer'd to Englishmen by peons &c<sup>t</sup>: on purpose as wee Apprehend, to force some of our men to comitt some Act of Hostility whereby they will gain a great Advantage which if they should doe as wee Expect they will (and wee Can not prevent it) wee shall be sett upon on a sudden, and all cutt off Except with the loss of some wee can Escape by force with our lives onely to the ships leaving all the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Treasure, goods, Books &c<sup>t</sup>: behind us and if wee doe gett Aboard the ships wee shall have noe provisions but what we fight for) being a small number in Comparison with their Forces. And it being A southerly Monzoon we cannot gett away soe y<sup>t</sup>: wee can Expect nothing but to perish for want of Relife, There manner being here to drive away all Provisions with their women and Children.

2<sup>d</sup>. Our thus Escaping in a Hostile way cannot be done w<sup>th</sup>: out fighting and killing some of the countrey people w<sup>ch</sup>: will make an Irreparable breach, and be proclaimed an Open Warr, whereupon the Factories aloft will be all seiz'd with y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: servants who are more then wee are here, And there will lye att their mercy in dead & quick stock 20 Lack of Rup<sup>t</sup>: in all places.

3. Wee shall have noe way to send notice of their Eruption to Suratt soe y<sup>t</sup>: within a moneth, by the quick carriage of Letters to the King (who is near that place) they will be all surprized there.

On the other side To signe any Conditions of Trade in this place, is y<sup>t</sup>: which was never done nor could wee have thought would have been putt upon us, nor have wee any power to doe soe; other then as an honest man to save his life, gives his purse to a Robber, and if it be once done 'twill give the Governo<sup>r</sup>: an Advantage for Employing more and more upon us in the like nature for the Future.

Now the Question before is, whether wee should Hazard y<sup>e</sup> Ruin of the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Affaires by a positive Refusall to signe anything, or should signe such a writing as before menconed in hopes of Retriving it by some meanes hereafter. But there are soe many Ill Consequences which arise to our thoughts, whether Inclining to a Refusall or Compliance y<sup>t</sup>: wee cannot with satisfaction to our own minds come to any determination therein for the present further then to putt off giving a positive Answer as long as wee can to gain time; Expecting y<sup>t</sup>: upon the Arrivall of the Nabobs orders wee shall be putt to a necessity either of Refusing or Complying, In the mean time it is a matter of a most Depressing and Confounding consideracon to us y<sup>t</sup>: wee are brought into such a streight that wee know not what to doe.

Now having Represent[ed] our case to you which is darke Enough, and wee want a great deale of Councill & advice about it and no hopes of orders or Relife from your Hono<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>t</sup>., before the matter will be Determined one way or other (wee have only to look up to God in whom wee desire his direction on y<sup>e</sup>: use of all Consideration & Indeavours to trust, and desire your Hon<sup>r</sup> &c<sup>t</sup>: seriously to weigh our Case and give such perticular Orders to us or Generall orders under such and such supposition y<sup>t</sup> wee may know how to govern our selves under such Extreem Exigencys.

If you have A Convenient sloop, y<sup>t</sup>: you can spare to bring us Advice please to send your Letters by it, the Rainy season being come In, wee cannot Expect an Answer in a Long time by Patamar, And if you send upon youre sloop provisions, it may be of great use (not knowing what our Extremities may be) and if wee have noe need 'twill be no great Loss.

Supposing now the best of our Case y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Nabob does heare us, & setts us free from those demands wee have Expressed our feares about, Wee having already given you a large Acco<sup>t</sup>: in our last what prospect wee had for the next monsoon wee have only this to add, y<sup>t</sup>: wee cañot yett send any Treasure to the mint



where 'twill be a great while A Coining, as formerly said, mean time they have no money att Dacca nor Maulda for making an Investment, not soe much as for Charges and if they had it att Cassimbuzar, could not give it out till their Troubles were over nor can wee Expect any money here from the mint till August soe that att best wee are like to doe but little [here] Tho' if wee proceed in peace wee shall use our uttmost Endeavours to gett in the Remains, and as much goods as wee can possibly, in the mean time wee shall have to doe it in, for Loading the Eagle and Persia Merchant.

Wee have taken this Oppertunity to write to your Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: fearing least wee should be strictly Blocked up again, and having probably but a day or two, free for a Peon to pass; wee cannot now write to the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: the Agent being so Ill that he is hardly able to Dictate this to your Hono<sup>r</sup>: wee humbly Intreat that you will please to make up that Defect of ours, by sending home Coppies of our Letters to youre honour &c<sup>a</sup>: with the short letter to the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: which wee send herewith.

And wee further Request y<sup>t</sup>: you will please to write to the President of Surat y<sup>t</sup>: no ships be permitted to come hither from thence, or Bombay but what belong wholly to the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: servants it being of a most pernicious Consequence y<sup>t</sup>: any natives be concerned in shipping which is Countenanced by, or comes under the name of the English, which Indeed has been a great occasion of our present Troubles.

The ships that your Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: send hither to Lye the Monsoon, may meet with great Difficulty in getting Provisions if wee should be brought into that Extremity wee fear, it may be therefore necessary for them to come well supplied for feare of the worst, wee are

Wee forgott to Acquaint your Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: y<sup>t</sup> when the Govern<sup>r</sup>: sent Sied Amud &c<sup>a</sup>: to us to urge our signing to the Articles Wee produced the Phirmands Neshawns & perwanna's wee have, and pleaded the priveledges granted thereby, telling them it would be an high Affront to the Emperour, Princes and Nabobs, should wee renounce y<sup>e</sup>: favours wee have Rec<sup>d</sup>: from them and take new Articles of our being here from a subordinate Govern<sup>r</sup>: but all to noe Purpose.

The y<sup>r</sup> mo: May it pleased God to Arrive in safty y<sup>e</sup> Bengall Merchant Cap<sup>t</sup>: John Goldsborough from the Bay of Bengall laden with 5753 bales of sugar, y<sup>e</sup> Trouble wee mett with y<sup>e</sup> Dutch, in denying us the liberty & use of these Countrey boats, to unlade her you may partly understand from the Inclosed to the Agent &c<sup>a</sup>: which wee send open for your Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: perusal but more att large, from Cap<sup>t</sup>: Goldsborough, who has perfect knowledg of the whole business, from the beginning to the End, whose Assistance wee cannot but commen'd having unladen almost halfe the ship with his own boats, till such time as wee were out of necessity (tho' with scme Considerable Charge to the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>:) forced to buy up Countrey Boats for that service.

The King of Syams Embassad<sup>r</sup>: Hodgee Sellim and their Kings Mahmud Hossenbeeg have been here some months waiting a Conveyance to Siam by whom wee have been soe much Importuning as well as by the Kaune and Shawbund<sup>r</sup>: here for a ship to convey their persons & retinue to Siam, y<sup>t</sup>: without doing the Company's affairs as well here as in those parts, Considerable and Apparent Detryment wee could not Avoyd Complying with their desires in this case, but since y<sup>e</sup> place lyes soe much out of the way for the coast, and Surat ships wee could not Consent to send them directly thither, but contrived it by reason of lateness in y<sup>e</sup> yeare, they are content to be conveyed to the [F]ort, there to Expect another conveyance

The time of our being in Spahawne Hodgee [Sellim] the King of Syams Embassad<sup>r</sup>: while M<sup>r</sup>: Samuell Darnelly was yett alive and our Chief by his dayly and Incessant Importunity prevailed with us to Lend him to y<sup>e</sup> Amount 725 $\frac{1}{2}$  m<sup>ds</sup>: to serve his occasions, promising and giving us under his hand to pay us in Cheq<sup>t</sup>: here at 8 Aba each, notwithstanding which when he Arrived the place and upon demand of y<sup>e</sup> money, he was not able to procure any thing they being [sc]arce, upon which he made his proffer of payment In mamod<sup>t</sup>: which wee refused, not knowing well w<sup>t</sup>: to doe with them, att last having driven us off a Considerable time, he made his Application to us begging us to take his bill in Syam, upon which, taking into Consideration y<sup>e</sup> money wee were to send to Bengall on Acco<sup>t</sup>: of y<sup>e</sup> Henry and William, last yeares sugar found it more Advantageous farr to the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: to have his bills to be payd in Syam att 30 Rup<sup>a</sup>: the tom<sup>d</sup>: as he did not deny us, then to have sent you mamod<sup>t</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup>: wee must have done, this old money wee now send you not being then come downe, nor had wee any knowledge of it's coming so that what is done therin wee hope may meet with your Hon<sup>rs</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: liking.

own boats with great charge to the Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: as wee were unavoidably thereto Compelled to unlade the ship, all which tooke up a great deale of time, having likewise been forced to send the shipp to Ormuz for Ballast, far beyond what otherwise would have done.

Notwithstanding our uttmost Endeavours, wherein wee sollemly declare, wee have not been wanting, wee have not been able to y<sup>t</sup>: time to dispose of y<sup>e</sup>: Bengall Merchant Cargoe of sugar, how great A Dissapointment it will be to you who are sensible, tho' the witt of man, wee are p<sup>r</sup>sued in y<sup>e</sup> Extremitie could not have brought it about, wee are att soe great a nonplus in y<sup>e</sup> Affair, wee know not well which way to turne our selves, noe Merch<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: yeare come downe nor will not, till the Dutch have made peace, those y<sup>e</sup>: are here keep down the price, y<sup>e</sup> mony such as it is a shame should bare the name of money, Mamod<sup>ts</sup>: now hardly procurable Aba<sup>t</sup>: there is, but far worst then mamod<sup>ts</sup>:, all which being duely Considered, wee hope will Render us Excusable, to keep the ship longer, wee thought would not be convenient, it being late in the yeare and having but little Encouragement, for y<sup>e</sup> state of Affaires to Expect any speed & disposall of y<sup>e</sup>: yeares sugar, which besides its quantity proves Extrordinary mean, and Dirty, y<sup>e</sup> Patna sugar, without grain cost most and yeilds less then the Berboon notwithstanding its courseness, wee have noe Remedy left us but patiently wait y<sup>e</sup> Conveniency's of y<sup>e</sup> marketts and referr y<sup>[m]</sup> soe next year for Returnes, which wee hope soe to bring about one way or other, as y<sup>t</sup>: it may be all in Gold or good money, which tis our Intentions to Endeavour, being to proceed y<sup>e</sup>: yeare for Spahawn, wee may meet with oppertunities of Changing it, tho' it will be att some Considerable Allowance for Exchange.

Wee may not Omitt Advising the unsettled posture of this part of the Countrey being threatned with an Invasion of which his Excellency is very Apprehensive of & Accordingly great preparaconz are on foot to put his Countrey in a Condiçon to withstand his Armed neighbours on the Frontiers towards Bengall they having allready seized one of his Forts and put all theirin to the sword which has in soe great a measure Alarmed his Excellency y<sup>t</sup>: he has summon'd all his principall officers to Court and dayly draws what Forces he can together and is very pressing to have them take y<sup>e</sup> Feild but by what wee can understand he Intends not to proceed upon y<sup>e</sup> Expedition in person [ . . . ] Generall and other officers refuse to goe without him, unless he delivers to them the severall Rajas upon whose Accompt the quarell is grounded which his Excellency att present obstinately refuses but 'tis hoped he may be prevail'd with and the business Accomodated otherwise, he will be reduced thereto by a long and tedious warr, to the Ruin of his Countrey, and great Impediment of trade of which wee are to sensible allready, and the Dutch Merchants upon the Apprehensions thereof have returned their money Rec<sup>d</sup>: upon their Investment; yett our merchants are in a pretty good forwardness with our Investment, & Assure us that unless an Absolute Conquest succeeds by our good Agreement with his Excellency, and Principall Commanders our business will be reduced to noe very great streights, the send[ing] the powder and lead lately wrote for will very Highly oblige his Excellency, the Dutch having denied him therein and noe doubt but he will find an opportunity to Resent the unkindness and in a greater measure Esteeme our good Intentions in furnishing him in his great necessity which is the needfull from

I enjoy good health wishing to hear the same from you, I hear you and your shipp Arrived att Tringambar which I am much Rejoyced att, four yeares since your shippes came hither to settle, but upon some displeasure left us, how I am Informed from one [I]ampermaul y<sup>t</sup>: you designe a settlement in the[s]e parts, who I have Returned and would have you send 2 of your English men with him, and a Coppy of what Cowle you would have granted you, which I shall advise y<sup>e</sup> Subbadar of and gett Accordingly, the Sobadar is now upon going to y<sup>e</sup> Camp, soe I would have you send your People, with your proposalls before his Departure, for other matters, I leave you to what Iamperma[u] shall Discourse you.

Wee formerly wrote you the probability there was of the Merchants Freight- ing on the Kempthorn, which gave [you y<sup>e</sup>] Incouregm<sup>t</sup>: of sending her downe in Expectaçon thereof; wee Rec<sup>d</sup>: P<sup>r</sup>: Advice from M<sup>r</sup>: Cawley desiring that he would writ to you Immediately to dispatch y<sup>e</sup> ship towards us, upon whose Arrivall Advised him thereof, y<sup>t</sup>: soe he might make provision accordingly for her, but

fault of ours, having never given you any Encouragement for sending her, till you advised your resolucon and ordered to Endeavour y<sup>e</sup> procuring a ffreight for her, for w<sup>ch</sup>: you sayd, you had Encouragement from privat hands, who Indeed ought to have been soe cautious as not to have made greater proposalls then they have been able to perform, and ought to have taken our advice in y<sup>e</sup> matter, y<sup>t</sup>: soe if wee Could have had good security for it it might have been proposed to you for your Acceptance, but since other measures have been, & things Answer not your Expectations, those y<sup>t</sup>: gave you the Encouragement, are Justly blamable; but since you were pleased afterwards to order y<sup>e</sup> management of the business to us, wee did what lay in our power to Effect it.

Wee never designed to present y<sup>e</sup> Subidar for obtayning a ffreight and other previledges Requisite to our settlement till wee saw noe probability of obtayning them without, being sensible of the Ill President, but rather then to be disappointed thought that the best way, knowing him to be soe greedy of money, y<sup>t</sup>: it will oblige him to doe anything to his power but since you dissapprove thereof shall never more Attempt any such thing and humbly desire you will prevent the occasion, by sending us noe shipp upon any P<sup>t</sup>icular advice, but upon Assurance y<sup>t</sup>: shall be given you in Gen<sup>l</sup>: when there will be noe danger of dissatisfaction, and as opportunity shall present shall not omitt to advise, and tware much better y<sup>t</sup>: the merchants request y<sup>e</sup>: favour of us, rather y<sup>n</sup>: wee of them for y<sup>n</sup>: wee can make our Advantage accordingly otherwise, they theirs, as they have now don and twas not to be thought y<sup>t</sup>: wee could turn y<sup>e</sup> business upon them of treating with y<sup>e</sup> subidar, when they were Averse to it, which wee were forced to, to oblige them and wee have found by long Experience y<sup>t</sup>: there is noe obligation to be layed on these people by fair language and Intreating, then to be Requited in y<sup>e</sup> same strain, for all you can doe or say will never Convince y<sup>m</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: 'tis for their, but yo<sup>r</sup>: own Interest, and further y<sup>n</sup> they find it Conducing to theirs, will find a hundred Invasions not to gratify you in, for could anything be gain'd by playing y<sup>e</sup>: honest Hipocrite for y<sup>e</sup> Interest of our masters, thinke is noe sin against God Almighty being Commanded to make the greatest use wee can of our talens in an honest way.

Had y<sup>e</sup> ship been with us when your order arrived, and wee had been under noe obligacons to y<sup>e</sup> ffreighters should certainly have dispatched her towards you: you will find by y<sup>e</sup> Acco<sup>t</sup>: of Cash for the last month, y<sup>t</sup>: both the Pago<sup>e</sup>: 1000 Remitted y<sup>e</sup> [29] July and the 12000: Pago<sup>e</sup>: by M<sup>r</sup>: Pitt you have Creditted for, and tho' possibly it might slip our memory to [own] Receipt of y<sup>e</sup> former in our letters, yett did not y<sup>e</sup> latter, and shall be careful for the future to own in our letters y<sup>e</sup> Receipt of as much as you shall please to send, of which never more occasion.

According to yo<sup>r</sup>: orders have deliver'd M<sup>r</sup>: Pitt and M<sup>r</sup>: Constable their Instructions and papers for Acheen.

Our ffactory has been besieged with Souldiers & Peons to this day, tho' of late they have not used us soe hard as formerly, all trade and business continues stoped, soe as that for more then 3 months past wee have not had liberty to buy or sell, to land or ship of any thing, the Governour peremptorily Insisting upon our signing some of those Articles mençoned in our last and is Resolved in his proceedings, y<sup>t</sup>: tho' on y<sup>e</sup> 24<sup>th</sup> Instant wee Rec<sup>d</sup>: a Perwanna from the Nabob for clearing our busines and on 19<sup>th</sup>: one from the Kings Duan to second the nabobs, yett the Govern<sup>r</sup>: upon the tender thereof to him Declared he would neither see nor obey them, unless wee would sign his Articles, nor would he ever Admitt either one of our selves be our Vaqueel, to discourse with him, on the 18<sup>th</sup>: Ins<sup>t</sup>: wee sent an Acco<sup>t</sup>: hereof to M<sup>r</sup>: Pownset &c<sup>a</sup>: att Dacca, and an Arsdust to the Nabob complaining of the Govern<sup>r</sup>: Refusal to obey his Perwanna, and ordered them to procure a Jessoal or messenger from the Nabob to Inforce the govern<sup>r</sup>: into obedience, But not Expecting wee could have any further Answer from thence in less then 3 weekes time, and being sensible of how great Importance for this year's Investment, twas to save so much time, and to procure the Govern<sup>r</sup>: Friendship for the future, wee willing hearkened to A proposall y<sup>t</sup>: was made by some that pretended to mediate, and offered Abdulgunny money to the vallue of 8000 Rup<sup>s</sup>: but y<sup>e</sup> Result of it was, y<sup>t</sup>: he said if wee would give him a Lack of Rup<sup>s</sup>: he would not be friends unless wee would signe his Articles, tho the pretended mediators tell us, tis only A greater sume y<sup>t</sup>: is Expected, and that 8000 Rs. will doe: Concerning which wee cannot undertake to Determine till the Agents Arrivall. They would still leade us on with dayly hopes of A speedy Accomodacou but wee see little Reason to Expect it, and Indeed (it having been publicly declared in the Durbar y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> money Expected of us is Intended for the Nabob) wee fear least the Nabob (whatever the Perwanna he sent us may say) may give the Govern<sup>r</sup>: private Encouragement and orders for these his proceedings, otherwise wee cannot think he would dare to persist in his disobedience to the Nabobs and Duan's Perwannas, nor can wee give any Judgement of what the Issue may be, till wee Receive Answer from Dacca.

Supposing y<sup>e</sup>: best, wee must be forced to buy all the goods wee provide this yeare with ready money, having yett sent up noe Treasure to the mint, and y<sup>e</sup> coining of y<sup>t</sup>: will take up soe much time, that there will not be Enough left for giving out money in any ffactory, nor are there any goods provided in any of the Factories (besides y<sup>e</sup> last yeares Remains) nor money, nor orders for buying, sent to any of them Except Ballasore (that being somew<sup>t</sup>: a distinct Governm<sup>t</sup>: and lying more conveniently for shipping off goods in case any new Troubles should arise att y<sup>e</sup> time for Laden which wee have furnished with twelve Chests of Dollers (besides goods to A considerable vallue) and ordered them to Recive five more out of the next ship, and to goe about buying up goods as fast as they can.

The Countrey wee are Informed is full of goods, and hope if the stopp upon our business do's not Continue to long and there come noe Interlopers wee shall be able, to procure as much as wee shall Have money to Invest our great Difficulty will be to gett sugars Enough for Persia y<sup>t</sup>: Commodity being much Ingrossed, as wee are Informed in the hands of such Merchants, as knowing the



R<sup>t</sup>: Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: has occasion for sugar and y<sup>t</sup>: there are allsoe 4 or five Suratt shippes to Lade with the same will sell to them y<sup>t</sup>: bid most and will know how to make their Marketts of us both.

This day wee Rec<sup>d</sup>: a Generall from Surat Dated 26<sup>th</sup> June last, via Pattana, Advising the Arrivall of his Maj<sup>ties</sup> Frigatt the [P]hænix and the Prudent Mary att Bombay. The former having taken two Interlopers in the way one of w<sup>ch</sup>: (the Bristol foundred in the sea, the men saved).

The Shrewsbury Cap<sup>t</sup>: W<sup>m</sup>: Talbott Command<sup>r</sup>: arrived in Ballasore Road the 7<sup>th</sup>: past & att Hugly the 22<sup>d</sup>: ditto who brought a short Gen<sup>l</sup>: from the R<sup>t</sup>: Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: Dated 26 Novemb<sup>r</sup>: 1684 (only giving Acco<sup>t</sup>: of severall persons sent in their service by the Chando[i]s) but noe Treasure nor goods, Cap<sup>t</sup>: Talbot Dyed here y<sup>e</sup> 5<sup>th</sup> In<sup>st</sup>.)

Wee Are heartily glad to hear the Arrivall of the shipp George, as allsoe y<sup>e</sup> Interlopers being cast in England and y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> nation is in peace and



quiett, but Condole the Death of our late King Charles the Second of blessed memory & pray for the prosperous Raigne of his Successor which is sufficient in Answer to your first.

In Divers of [our] Letter Advised you y<sup>t</sup>: the Merchants Acco<sup>ts</sup>: formerly sent you was how they stood to y<sup>t</sup>: time and when wee desired you would be pleas'd to be Referred to yo<sup>r</sup>: Acco<sup>t</sup>: Cash, Invoice of what goods sent us, and our Contract with the merchants was to sattisfie you how Acco<sup>ts</sup>: would stand with our Merchants att y<sup>e</sup> conclusion of y<sup>e</sup> Investment, and not to presume to

Direct you (as you are pleased to terme it) which cannot be thought from those y<sup>t</sup>: are still to learn, and from whome the Respect of obeying is due.

Tis strange you should not belive what wrot you concerning Mr: Cawley w<sup>ch</sup>: in time you will find to be true as you may allready, all y<sup>e</sup> Acco<sup>ts</sup>: and business of Porto Novo being undone which must be done by those Intended thither, and 'tis not to be thought he should discover his own weakness soe farr as to Acquaint you therewith.

As formerly wrote you, Doctor Grudgfeild hath as often as wee have been Acquainted with their occasions been sent to Conimeer, and 'twas soe farr from any thing of danger of y<sup>e</sup> persons miscar[r]ying for want of him, that twas a meer fiction, for he was soon after sent and found the patient soe well as to have noe Occasion for him, Soe Returned as he went, and had the person miscarried (w<sup>ch</sup>: God forbiding should for want of any Assistance from us) it hath been noe fault of ours, but theirs y<sup>e</sup>: rather y<sup>n</sup>: they would give themselves the Trouble of a Line (w<sup>th</sup>: in Civil[li]ty they ought) they would Expose a man to the danger of loosing his life and wee must leave you to Judge on whose side punctilio an[d] Inhumanity as they Call it in their letter lay.

Not to give you the Trouble wrote to Conimeer to Advise on what price they took of the Abatement on morees N<sup>o</sup>: 7 and from what time they paid their merchants Interest for the overplus of goods brought in by them, these things being in dispute between the merchants and us, they Allleading y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Abatement on the morees is taken of on Pag<sup>s</sup>: 18 Ψ Corge there, which was never done on more then Pag<sup>s</sup>: 17 Ψ Corge here and y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Interest was Allowed y<sup>m</sup>: att Conimeer from y Commencing of the Investment to the time of making up Acco<sup>ts</sup>: w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>m</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup>: Esteem unreasonable, and y<sup>t</sup>: they ought to be Allowed Interest noe longer then for y<sup>e</sup> time y<sup>e</sup> Comp<sup>as</sup>: money was all Invested to the time of Accounting with them w<sup>ch</sup>: they have given us noe satisfaction therefore desire you will please to doe it, or order them, and how you will have the Interest Accounted for with our merchants, w<sup>ch</sup>: shall be accordingly observed. If wee may be soe bold as to offer our opinion in the matter without offence, wee well Approve yo<sup>r</sup>: Intentions of withdrawing these ffactorys Except you can be settled on better termes and have stock Enough to carry on the Trade as it ought to be, and to vye with our neighbours the Dutch, if you can be Assured our Remove would not be an Inlett to y<sup>e</sup> Interlopers, if not, y<sup>e</sup> Remidy would be worse then the disease, for certainly wee should soe much disoblige y<sup>e</sup> Government thereby, y<sup>e</sup>: they would give all Encouragem<sup>t</sup>: to y<sup>m</sup>: to settle, and the Issue of it would be bringing our Affaires into as great distraction as in the Bay but wee know yo<sup>r</sup> prudence to be such, soe well to weigh and consider things as to prevent it what possible, thô could our Remove be Effected without the Danger thereof, it would very much Conduce to the Comp<sup>as</sup>: Advantage; for 'tis certain one ffactory settled as it ought, might very well doe all the business of these parts, and the Charge of the Rest be saved.

A Coppie of y<sup>e</sup> Articles you have in the Diary Booke with Acco<sup>t</sup>: of our solemnity at our taking possession thereof; Pepper wee buy cheaper there then any where Else, and have before wee come away from thence brought y<sup>e</sup> Baharr to 500 pound weight, wee Landed 18 Gunns for the security of y<sup>e</sup> place and have Left y<sup>e</sup> Cheif strength of our Garrison there, tho att first wee Intended not soe many, but hearing of y<sup>e</sup> Dutch there great Threatning our Expulsion wee left it the stronger untill wee should see further Occasion to withdraw y<sup>m</sup>: wee stayd here about six weekes in w<sup>ch</sup>: time wee began to Fortifie y<sup>e</sup> Acco<sup>t</sup>: of its progress wee must leave to M<sup>r</sup>: Bloomee & from thence w<sup>ch</sup>: they will send by y<sup>e</sup> Resolution.

As for the place wee look upon it to be very healthfull, tho' many of our people fell sick w<sup>ch</sup> we doe Attribute to their want of Lodging, as for y<sup>e</sup> Road wee humbly Reffer yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: & C<sup>a</sup>: to the Opinions of y<sup>e</sup> Cap<sup>t</sup>: tho wee believe it neve [r] blowes hard soe as to raise any violent storme, for if y<sup>e</sup> wind be furious it is of short Continuance soe y<sup>t</sup>: before y<sup>e</sup>: sea is Raised the wind is downe, Orankey Lelly denies his Debt to the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: to be above 400 Doll<sup>rs</sup>: and sayes he paid y<sup>e</sup> Rest to M<sup>r</sup>: Clem<sup>t</sup>: du Jardin, when wee urged his Bill he sayes that Cap<sup>t</sup>: Spencer forced him to sett his hand to it therefore desire A p<sup>t</sup>icular

Acco<sup>t</sup>: to be sent us as it stand in the Journall of y<sup>t</sup>: voyage as likewise An Acco<sup>t</sup>: from M<sup>r</sup>: Jardin what money he Rec<sup>d</sup>: there Arrived att Bencoolen y<sup>e</sup> Charles Cap<sup>t</sup>: President Command<sup>r</sup>: being sent out by y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: for the procury of Pepper, he offer'd to be att our Dispose and deliver up his Cargoe to us for y<sup>e</sup> purchase of Pepper w<sup>ch</sup>: wee considering the want of Tonnage with you and but little to supply these two ships thought not fitting to Accept and not being Able to promise him any for y<sup>e</sup> present, he went for y<sup>e</sup> other places as he is ordered, but withall promis'd him if there came noe shippis from Madras this Moonsoon, y<sup>t</sup>: if he procured not his Loaden whether he now went y<sup>t</sup> wee would supply him with what Pepper wee could att his Returne, wee having settled Affaires att Bencoolen thought fitt to leave Cap<sup>t</sup>: Heath as well to Countenance the place as to Rec[e]ive w<sup>t</sup>: Pepper could be gott att Bencoolen and bring it After us to Lade on Board y<sup>e</sup> Resolution if wee could have in y<sup>e</sup> other places procured sufficient quantity with y<sup>t</sup>: to have Loaded her home, and therefore proceeded on y<sup>e</sup> Resolution with the Sloop Charles having sent y<sup>e</sup> William before, wee stay'd out about 14 dayes, and att Last were forst to put back again, y<sup>e</sup> master of y<sup>e</sup> sloop fell sick in the voyage and therefore Left the Shipp and gained her Passage to Ind[ra]poura where he since died wee were Resolved Notwithstanding this not to desist from proceeding to Ind[ra]poura, & thence to Priaman, and therefore did with all possible speed load what wee thought fitt on board the Deffence & proceed for Ind[ra]poura where wee Arrived y<sup>e</sup> 14<sup>th</sup>: of Septemb<sup>r</sup>: this Disappointment has been of great Inconvenience to us having hardly time to unlade y<sup>e</sup> ship, and to ship of a small quantity of Pepper now sent you y<sup>e</sup> year being soe much spent wee Resolve to Returne the Defence and to proceed on the sloop for Priaman After dispatch, but when wee had been here about 2 dayes Arrived A Prow from y<sup>t</sup> place and Acquainted us y<sup>t</sup>: it was delivered to y<sup>e</sup> Dutch in May and therefore wee have given up all thoughts of going there In person, while the Dutch are posest thereof y<sup>e</sup> Rajas make slight of [ . . . ] to possess us thereof if wee will goe, w<sup>ch</sup>: wee have told the [ . . . ] cannot conveniently doe in Regard y<sup>e</sup> Dutch, and wee are [ . . . ] friends but y<sup>t</sup> wee Expect they should first Expell y<sup>e</sup> Dutch and then wee are free to settle, wee will therefore for your better ordering and Instructing us in this bussiness give you an Account of these places as wee have learnt from persons Acquainted in both, Priaman is y<sup>e</sup> greatest place on this side y<sup>e</sup> Island for y<sup>e</sup> vent of goods but produces but little Pepper of it selfe, Indrapoura, and Bencoolen, and that Tract of Land betwixt y<sup>m</sup>: are y<sup>e</sup> Places where y<sup>e</sup> Pepper growes and therefore fittest in o<sup>r</sup>: Opinions for y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: Designe for it is not probable y<sup>e</sup> Dutch will suffer any Pepper to pass them if wee are not where it growes.

The Rajas of Priaman wee still keep with us and shall keep y<sup>e</sup> Bussiness in suspence untill yo<sup>r</sup>: order Intending to send one of y<sup>e</sup> sloopes to the Norward for A further Discovery of y<sup>e</sup> Trade y<sup>t</sup>: way for wee have great Reason to suspect y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Dutch have settled there not soe much for Acco<sup>t</sup>: of Pepper as for A great vent for goods in those places for which they Receive Gold att Cheap Rates for to the norward of Indrapoura there growes but little Pepper, and therefore they are creeping into all places to prevent us and are now come to [Har] ja Rajas within 4 Leagues of us.

Wee have had noe time to treat with y<sup>e</sup> Emperour yett about our settlement here, but Act only on his Cowl give[n] to M<sup>r</sup>: Jardin, nor shall conclude on none untill y<sup>e</sup> Return of his Embassadors from you unless wee can have the same as Priaman and Bencoolen, wee found here A protest from y<sup>e</sup> Gener<sup>l</sup>: of Batavia w<sup>ch</sup>: wee have now sent you as likewise his Lfe to the Emperour, and his Answer of w<sup>ch</sup>: wee desire a Coppie in English, there being none with us y<sup>t</sup>: understood Dutch, w<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Emperours Answer was Tegana y<sup>t</sup>: comes now will Informe yo<sup>r</sup>: Hono<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>t</sup>: if there being none to Read Malyes, upon the Defence Returnes M<sup>r</sup>: Jinkin Watkins whome M<sup>r</sup>: Jardin sent to the Dutch with some Letters by whome he has been kept [ . . . ] A Prisoner allmost ever since and undergon a great deal of hardship to y<sup>e</sup> hazard wee fear of his Life he carryed himselfe very handsomely there notwithstanding all their contrivances to Insnare him, and



therefore Recommend to yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: Consideration ; by y<sup>e</sup> same shipp returns two Left here by M<sup>r</sup>: Jârdin one whereof belonged to y<sup>e</sup> sloop y<sup>e</sup> other to the Amoy, whose business is to Look after their wages due from y<sup>e</sup> Amoy, wee hope your Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: will give y<sup>m</sup>: yo<sup>r</sup>: Councell: and Assistance what is to be done therein, they have Rec<sup>d</sup>: nine Dollers of us for which they are to bee Accountable.

Wee cannot sufficiently Recommend Cap<sup>t</sup>: Heaths Readiness to Assist us in all things relating to the Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: service both with his Councell, Men & Boats on all Occasions to y<sup>e</sup> great furthering y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: Affaires and our great satisfaction, notwithstanding most of his crew be very sick, and therefore Earnestly Recommend him to yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: kind Reception, and Recommendation to our Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Employers, for he has worthily deserved it These places Viz<sup>t</sup>: Bencoolen Alias York Fort & Indrapoura are scarce of all provisions wee cannot gett Rice sufficient to maintaine us two dayes togeather, and sometimes none att all for these People plant noe more y<sup>n</sup>: Just suffices their own Expence and therefore wee Earnestly desire y<sup>t</sup> A sloop may be dispatched with all speed away for this place with Rice and other Provisions Especially Live Hoggs otherwise wee shall not be Able to subsist two dayes if any Difference should happen the Natives and us, nor Indeed well withall their Assistance, wee shall supply this place and send y<sup>e</sup> Rest to Yorke Fort.

Wee have made A most sorry shift to unlade the Shipp in Little Canneus, and therefore, wee desire yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: to supply this place & Bencoolen by the first oppertunity with tenn Mussulaes each otherwise nothing can be Laded or Unladed without Infinite Hazard, Trouble and Cost with them be pleased to send two setts [of] Mussulaes men for y<sup>e</sup> Instructing and managing these people [ . . . ] mending of them, wee want much help of Factors and writers and therefore Intreat yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: Earnestly to send a Large supply of Able men; Wee have besides what came from Bencoolen sent you 122 Baharr from this place as  $\mathcal{P}$  Invoice ; wee shall make it our whole Business to have A good quantity of Pepper Allwayes ready here upon all Occasions, w<sup>t</sup>: goods are properest for our Markett shall Advise  $\mathcal{P}$  next, as likewise of y<sup>e</sup> Governm<sup>t</sup>: & policy (if any) of these countreys when wee have been Amonge them A Little Longer. Wee desire you to supply us with men, materials for the minting money as soon as may, w<sup>ch</sup>: with the Tender of o<sup>r</sup>: Respectfull service is All Att present from yo<sup>r</sup>: humble Servants

A Letter from the Emperour to the Generall of Batavia, and Another Lre: from the Dutch Govern<sup>r</sup>: of Pedang to y<sup>e</sup>: Emperour; written in Mallay, which att present cannot be Translated for want of one to read them but shall be Entred as soon as can be done.

TO THE HONO<sup>BLE</sup>: W<sup>M</sup>:

YORK FORT 28<sup>TH</sup>: 7<sup>BRE</sup>: 1685.

GYFFORD ESQR PRESIDENT

HONO<sup>BLE</sup>: S<sup>r</sup>: & C<sup>A</sup>:

After A very tedious and Troublesome Passage wee Arrived (thanks to y<sup>e</sup> Allmighty) safe in the Road y<sup>e</sup> 24 June, when as wee Immediately sent Ashore to Enquire into y<sup>e</sup> Affaires of this Countrey and to know if our coming was wellcome to y<sup>e</sup> Natives here; whereupon one of y<sup>e</sup> Inhabitants came Aboard Namely Orumkey Lilla, y<sup>e</sup> man y<sup>t</sup>: Assisted Cap<sup>t</sup>: Andrews and the Amoy Merchant, in the procury of their Pepper, much Rejoyced att our Arrivall, and in y<sup>e</sup> behalfe of y<sup>e</sup> rest desired wee would come Ashore, where wee should meet with noe obstacles to y<sup>e</sup> fullfilling of our desires but y<sup>t</sup>: all should be done to our sattisfaction, y<sup>n</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Worspi<sup>e</sup>: Chief & C<sup>A</sup>: Council finding such an Appearance of A good Reception came Ashoar, and where upon our Landing, A Gen<sup>l</sup>: Joy Appeared in y<sup>e</sup> face of all, soe that noe less then An happy Conclusion could be Expected.

Wee were no sooner come to our Lodgings but y<sup>e</sup> best of [. . .] Towne came with an unusuall Countenance to congratulate our happy Arrivall, and Letters were Immediately every where dispatcht to Acquaint y<sup>e</sup> Countrey People of our coming, y<sup>e</sup> old King being att y<sup>t</sup>: time Indisposed, sent A Messenger to Acquaint the Chief & C<sup>A</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: he was sorry, he was not in A Capacity to Rec[e]ive us him selfe into y<sup>e</sup> Countrey and therefore desired to be Excused by Reason as well of his old Age, as Indisposition, but he would very suddenly come downe and Discourse us.

On the 26<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Young King came downe to wellcome us, with whome passed little or noe materiall discourse, save only y<sup>t</sup>: he Enquired of us, whether y<sup>e</sup> Intent of our coming was to buy Pepper only, and soe to be gon, or to settle here, for if y<sup>t</sup>: our designe was to settle here, y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>n</sup>: whatever pepper was in y<sup>e</sup> Countrey, wee might Expect to have, or otherwise y<sup>e</sup> Dutch, who being so nigh y<sup>m</sup>: I mean att Syllabarr, would after y<sup>t</sup> wee were gon, prove troublesome to y<sup>m</sup>: for selling their Pepp<sup>r</sup>: to the English, and therefore unless y<sup>t</sup>: wee would dwell and Abide w<sup>th</sup> y<sup>m</sup>: none would sell us Pepper, wee told him our Aim was to settle if upon good termes, he Replied, y<sup>t</sup> wee could not be soe ready to Ask as he should be to grant.

The next day hee came to know if wee would pitch upon y<sup>e</sup> Ground wee designed to build the Fort on, soe wee went Along w<sup>th</sup>: him to view what ground would be most proper to Fortife on: wee found two places proper and Convenient Enough to build on, but ere y<sup>t</sup>: wee would pitch upon either of y<sup>m</sup>: did desire to be Ascertaind of our settlem<sup>t</sup>: for if that wee settled wee Expect to have y<sup>e</sup> Random of A Cannon shott every way, y<sup>e</sup> w<sup>ch</sup>: ground y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: HONO<sup>BLE</sup>: English

East India Comp<sup>a</sup>: must be the only Lords & sole proprietors of, and y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> whole profitts of y<sup>e</sup> Towne should be theirs, to help to defray y<sup>e</sup> Expences they would bee att, in maintaining A Garrison for their security, Trade And Defence, &c, But he would not Enter upon Articles att y<sup>t</sup>: time desiring time to consult and Advise with the old King; himselfe being young, and not soe fitt to treat Alone for giving away his Countrey to strangers, but he told us he expected y<sup>e</sup> old King to morrow, soe y<sup>n</sup>: wee desired y<sup>e</sup> Priaman Raja to goe and Acquaint him, with what hee had don, in Reference to Priaman, save only it was Injoynd him, not to discourse any thing about y<sup>e</sup> 700 Doll<sup>rs</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: soe he might bee y<sup>e</sup> more flexible, when y<sup>e</sup> Business of Treatment should be brought upon the Publique stage.

The old King y<sup>e</sup> next day Accordingly coming but being Sunday desired hee would come y<sup>e</sup> next day when wee would discourse with him, he Appeared with A pleasant Countenance, and Exprest much Satisfaction, and on y<sup>e</sup>: 30<sup>th</sup>: being desirous to come to Conclusion by reason of our vast Expences, wee sent for y<sup>e</sup> old and young King, and y<sup>e</sup> Rest of y<sup>e</sup> great men, & Acquaint y<sup>m</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: being they desired y<sup>t</sup>: wee should settle here, and Fortifie for their security, wee desired to know what quantity of Pepper wee might yearely Expect, for unless y<sup>t</sup>: they were to Lade four or five shippes yearly it would not be worth the while to settle, Considering y<sup>e</sup> great Expence y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: was like to be att, they Assured us y<sup>t</sup>: what would come downe the River & places Adjacent they could doe it, soe y<sup>n</sup>: we told y<sup>m</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: should be the sole propriators & Lords of y<sup>e</sup> Place, and y<sup>t</sup>: wee would Impose what Custome wee please and y<sup>t</sup> y<sup>e</sup>: profitts of y<sup>e</sup> Place should be y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> King altho' att first seemed soe unwilling [*sic*] to grant all our Desires, begunn to Boggle att this, touching too much upon his prerogative, w<sup>ch</sup>: would in soe great A measure, not only lessen his soveraignty, but likewise his Revenues, w<sup>ch</sup>: Indeed is all he hath, y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>n</sup>: his Condition would be worse then ever, for y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Noeha-does, or Merch<sup>ts</sup>: Allwayes Allowed him/Doller ꝑ Baharr, upon y<sup>e</sup> Expectacōn of Pepper wee being well Assured y<sup>t</sup>: this was true, wee told him wee were Contended to Allow as formerly the Merch<sup>ts</sup>: did, viz<sup>t</sup>: 11 Doll<sup>rs</sup> ꝑ Baharr they giving him, for what Pepper should be brought downe y<sup>e</sup> River of Bencoola, y<sup>e</sup> odd Doller, but what peper [should] be Imported from all places Adjacent and Remote he was not too Expect to have any Custome for, but he Replied, y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: could not bee done, for severall Rivers in his Territories, from w<sup>ch</sup>: much Pepper would come, he must likewise Receive his Doller, soe Considering y<sup>e</sup> Inconveniencys hereof wee did therefore think it convenient, for to Allow the odd Doll<sup>r</sup>: to y<sup>e</sup>: King As A Custome was but A Diminution of y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: power & Authority, soe both to prevent y<sup>e</sup> Cheats, w<sup>ch</sup> might be put upon us by y<sup>e</sup> people y<sup>t</sup> Imports pepper who undoubtedly will bring all y<sup>e</sup> pepper under y<sup>t</sup>: Notion, and allsoe to make y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> more Absolute and powerfull in this place, did Judge it better to give 12 Dollers ꝑ Baharr & to Impose a Custom of 1 Doll<sup>r</sup> ꝑ Baharr upon all pepper from what place soever it be Imported none Excepted, this Indeed tho' in itselfe is noe gain or Advantage in one Respect, y<sup>et</sup> it begets a more seeming and perfect power, in Another and may in time produce a profit if y<sup>e</sup> pepper trade is such, y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: shall think fitt not to buy up all y<sup>e</sup> pepper y<sup>e</sup> and y<sup>e</sup> places Adjacen[t] can produce soe having in vain Expostulated to gett y<sup>e</sup> pepper cheaper wee therefore sent to Acquaint him, and y<sup>e</sup> rest of y<sup>s</sup>: our Result, whereupon they sent to tell us they were contented, soe wee sent y<sup>m</sup>: word back y<sup>t</sup>: wee Expected y<sup>m</sup>: in y<sup>e</sup> Afternoon to come and make A Conclusion but y<sup>e</sup> young King yet was not Inwardly satisfied y<sup>e</sup> w<sup>ch</sup>: more plainly appeared att his coming, for when wee thought wee had made A Final end and noe need of any further Argum<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> young King still insisted upon halfe of y<sup>e</sup> Customes and used many Arguments tho' at last after A vain strugling likewise was contented, and allsoe promis'd to Assist us against those y<sup>t</sup>: should oppose us, and to Allow us the Mintage of money &c: upon which wee vested y<sup>e</sup> young King, and having past mutual promises dismiss them y<sup>t</sup>: night, untill y<sup>e</sup> Articles were drawne up by y<sup>e</sup> Worp<sup>n</sup>: Chief Ralph: Ord should be Translated into the Mallay Language.



The next day having the Articles in Mallay ready translated, wee sent for the King &c who upon hearing y<sup>m</sup>: read, disliked y<sup>e</sup> quantity of ground wee had specified, being 4000 fathams, having noe gunns Ashoar to take y<sup>e</sup> Rاندome of A Cannon shott, and Allsoe begunn to dispute y<sup>e</sup> Unreasonableness of our Demands, y<sup>t</sup>: hee who is King of y<sup>e</sup> countrey should lett A stranger Enjoy y<sup>e</sup> fruits thereof wee Answered him, y<sup>t</sup>: what wee Asked of him was soe Just & Reasonable, y<sup>t</sup>: all would think it A Crime to desire any part or portion of y<sup>e</sup> Customes, for y<sup>t</sup> the R<sup>t</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: was like to be Att vast Expences, in the securing his person and Countrey from y<sup>e</sup> Dúrch, and y<sup>t</sup>: he now Receiving as before 1 Doller  $\Psi$  Bahar, of the merchants for what pepper they sold y<sup>t</sup>: sure y<sup>t</sup>: was sufficient for him w<sup>ch</sup>: now he might sitt still and Receive w<sup>th</sup>: peace and contentedness, without fear of Either of this certaine profit or any of his Countrey being taken from him, but notwithstanding all this he att last went away without signing the Articles, soe seeing he was so obstinate still; the worsp<sup>n</sup>: Chief sent him word y<sup>t</sup> being y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: was att vast Expences Every day, and he yett Refusing to come to any Agreement, y<sup>t</sup>: Hee Intended to morrow to goe aboard and y<sup>e</sup> Rest to follow, but the Hill Rajas came, & understanding this Immediately desired us to stay, and y<sup>t</sup> they would make y<sup>e</sup> young King to Comply, soe the next day the Hill Rajas came, who had soe managed y<sup>e</sup> young King, y<sup>t</sup>: they told us y<sup>t</sup>: he was now ready with y<sup>m</sup>: to signe y<sup>e</sup> Articles y<sup>e</sup> w<sup>ch</sup>: was once more Read, for y<sup>e</sup> greater satisfaction of y<sup>e</sup> young King y<sup>t</sup>: he should not pretend Ignorance in any on[e] Article see after having signed them, Coppie whereof is here Inclosed, they were presented, and on the 12<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Kings Flagg was Hoisted, where were present y<sup>e</sup> old King and y<sup>e</sup> rest of the Hill Rajas, who Lent their helping hand in y<sup>e</sup> raising thereof but y<sup>e</sup> young King tho' had signed yet was not (for what Reason I cannot tell) satisfied and therefore was not present, but sent word hee desired to be Excused, for y<sup>t</sup> [ . . . ] people could not be gott in A Readiness to come against the [ . . . ] prefixed, but A few dayes after he came, and seemed better satisfied, when hee saw y<sup>e</sup> Gunns Firing and the Flagg Flying.

Now wee shall most humbly Acquaint yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: why wee before wee had view'd either Indrapoura or Priaman settled here, 1<sup>st</sup>: because, y<sup>t</sup>: before y<sup>t</sup>: wee had well come to An Anchor wee Espied 3 Shippes the one being in Syllabar Road, and y<sup>e</sup> other two making in there, upon w<sup>ch</sup>: wee sent y<sup>e</sup> Captains Boats aboard the Countrey vessell w<sup>ch</sup>: y<sup>n</sup>: lay under A small Island w<sup>ch</sup>: makes y<sup>e</sup> Road, w<sup>ch</sup>: brought one or two of y<sup>e</sup> people aboard our shipp of whome wee diligently enquired what those shippes were, and how long they had been there, who att first (for what cause I cannot tell) seemed somewhat cautious, and unwilling to tell us, but att last told us they supposed y<sup>t</sup>: they were Dutch shippes, and y<sup>t</sup>: they had not been there not a Day, for y<sup>t</sup>: as wee came In here, soe they Arrived there, but what y<sup>e</sup> Intent of their coming was they could not tell, unless it was to settle in these parts, soe y<sup>t</sup> wee may say wee Arrived Luckely or otherwise  $\Psi$ haps wee had not obtained A Settlement here att soe Easy a Rate, in one Respect, tho' it is with the Loss of A great many men, of w<sup>ch</sup>: wee shall here following more largely Acquaint yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: but sure it is, had wee not Arrived in this Crittically minute, y<sup>e</sup> Dutch well knowing our designe in settling on the Coast, wee had not had this footing wee now have, w<sup>ch</sup>: God knowes is but slippery, but of this by & by wee shall more fully discourse of.

2<sup>dly</sup>: Well knowing y<sup>e</sup>: R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup> designes to settle on this Coast, was to Regain y<sup>e</sup> pepper Trade, w<sup>ch</sup>: they have lost by Bantam, being taken, and there Considering y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Intent of our coming, was to gett what [pepper] wee could, and being well sattesfied y<sup>t</sup>: this was the place that furnished, Cap<sup>t</sup>: Andrews and y<sup>e</sup> Amoy Merch<sup>ts</sup>: w<sup>th</sup>: what pepper they had, wee might Reasonably conclude y<sup>t</sup>: what they before promised, they might in some measure performe but certainly this is the only place upon y<sup>e</sup> coast for Pepper, for by all people wee are Informed, y<sup>t</sup>: from y<sup>s</sup>: and y<sup>e</sup>: Adjacent places, Bantam was supplied w<sup>th</sup>: most of y<sup>e</sup> Pepper y<sup>t</sup>: went from thence, and y<sup>n</sup>: this being the front place, and highest to the Dutch, and being A good Road for Shippes to Ride in, (about w<sup>ch</sup>: wee most

humbly Desire you will please to be Referred to the Cap<sup>t</sup>: it was thought y<sup>e</sup>: most fitt place, to settle and fortifie on.

Thus having given yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c An Acco<sup>t</sup>: of our Discoverie &c<sup>t</sup>., wee shall now proceed to Acquaint yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: noe sooner had wee mutually signed and Agreed, for our Settlement, but pepper for two or three dayes came soe pouring upon us y<sup>t</sup>: wee thought them men better then their words, and y<sup>t</sup>: they were soe fair dealing men, y<sup>t</sup>: they would not promise soe much as they were Able to P<sup>r</sup>form, least any Accident should happen y<sup>t</sup>: should cause us to look upon y<sup>m</sup>: with An Ill Eye, but noe sooner was y<sup>e</sup> pepper weighed off, but they begunn to slacken their hands, and soe have continued till now off late, that Friendship was made with one Nagarakiddall A great man as wee hereafter shall more Enlarge upon, and have often told y<sup>m</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: this their dealing was not according to what they promis'd att our Arrivall, w<sup>ch</sup>: was, y<sup>t</sup>: they would in A month or two time Lade one of y<sup>e</sup> shipp, w<sup>ch</sup>: was noe small satisfaction to us, but now wee plainly see y<sup>t</sup>: their end was only to gett us ashoar, thou[g]h att our Arrivall wee could not see well soe this their designe wee coming Just about y<sup>e</sup> time of their Rammazau or time of fasting w<sup>ch</sup>: continued about A month or six weeks soe y<sup>t</sup>: during y<sup>t</sup>: time, they told us wee could not Expect any pepper, and being well Informed y<sup>t</sup>: in y<sup>t</sup>: time y<sup>e</sup> Countrey people would not bring downe their peper wee Rested finding it in vain to [use] Arguments to P<sup>r</sup>swaid them, contented till the time was Expired which noe sooner being Ended but wee desired the King and y<sup>e</sup> Rest of y<sup>e</sup> Hill Rajas, y<sup>t</sup>: now the Rammazan being over [y<sup>t</sup>] they would forthwith bring downe [their] pepper for y<sup>t</sup>: wee now Expected it According to their promises which wee hoped they would performe, for y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> shipp had layn a great while here att vast Expences, and noe pepper still coming, the shipp could not stay any longer, & y<sup>t</sup>: now wee doubted whether there was any pepp<sup>r</sup>: in their Countrey or noe, but what was brought from other parts; for this dealing was not According to their promises and y<sup>t</sup>: if they already begunn to falsifie their word, being but Just come, what was to be Expected hereafter they could not give any satisfactory Answer, but save only they told us, y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> pep<sup>r</sup>: was stopt by A great man namely Patte Nagarakiddul, y<sup>e</sup> w<sup>ch</sup>: finding true, M<sup>r</sup>: Benj<sup>r</sup>: Bloome sent up A Couple of Malder Peons to Invite him down for to Contract A ffrien[d]shipp with him y<sup>e</sup> w<sup>ch</sup> he readily Accepted, and on the [lacuna in the original] he came here and with whome having some discourse, told him y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Intent of his sending for him, was to have A firm League and friendship with him, and doubted not but y<sup>t</sup>: he was as much desirous thereunto, as himselfe, and therefore being hee had formerly served the Dutch, and now becoming A ffriend & Allie to the English, he must therefore as the rest had done, swear upon the Alcoran to be true and faithfull to y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>s</sup>: and to Assist and help us against all our Adversaries, y<sup>e</sup> w<sup>ch</sup>: was Accordingly done with another great man, namely Patte Rangaitta, soe after having thus sworne them, he tachereeft y<sup>m</sup>: and soe they went away Contentedly and since this friendship made with y<sup>m</sup>: is come all the pep<sup>r</sup>: now in the Resolution, and if had been made sooner, noe doubt but the Defence w<sup>ch</sup>: Carryed M<sup>r</sup>: Ord from Indrapoura might have carryed more pepp<sup>r</sup>: from hence, and although there may be more pep<sup>r</sup>: in the Countrey, yett not that quantity as they told us, att our Arrivall, for y<sup>e</sup> Trees y<sup>n</sup>: were only Blossomed, and the pepper still green on their Trees, for y<sup>e</sup> time of gathering is in November and December, soe y<sup>t</sup>: what pepp<sup>r</sup>: is now ready is of y<sup>e</sup> Last cropp, not [but] y<sup>t</sup>: there is A good quantity, but the time being short y<sup>t</sup>: wee are by An Order of Consultacon to dispatch the Resolution by the 5<sup>th</sup>: of Octob<sup>r</sup>: or else could in A very short time [Pan?] A good quantity, for pepper now dayly comes downe, on y<sup>e</sup> 4<sup>th</sup>: past the Charles Cap<sup>t</sup>: Jn<sup>r</sup>: Preston Command<sup>r</sup>: Arrived here in this Road, from England directly, being by Charterparty bound to touch att Syllabar &c places and soe for Surratt if he could not procure pepp<sup>r</sup>: Enough to fill his Shipp, the Cargo he hath is only 2 Chest of Treasure, Dungarees Bales, and y<sup>e</sup> w<sup>ch</sup>: is Consigned to himselfe for to dispose thereof as he shall think Convenient, the goods he will not be Able to dispose of here, soe y<sup>t</sup>: he cannot with his quick stock fill

this shipp with peper but however wee shall According to an order of Consultaçon before M<sup>r</sup>: Ords Departure Lade aboard of him all y<sup>e</sup> pepp<sup>r</sup>: wee shall Receive, and altho' our Cash is Low by Reason of our great Expences, and dayly Decreases yett shée will undoubtedly be Dispatched from hence directly for England for w<sup>t</sup>: wee shall fall short off their own stock will supply, for they have liberty to buy w<sup>t</sup> pepp<sup>r</sup>: they will, being obliged to give it to the Comp<sup>a</sup>: upon their Return att 3<sup>d</sup>: 4<sup>p</sup> pound, and now the time for geathering the pepp<sup>r</sup>: being nigh att hand shée will be Dispatcht in seasonable time.

On the 3<sup>d</sup>: the Wospū: Ralph Ord Chief, Embargu'd aboard the shipp Resolution in order to proceed for Indrapoura &c places for to settle att y<sup>t</sup>: place, and not being able to reach y<sup>e</sup>: Port after severall dayes absence, returned back again whereupon M<sup>r</sup>: Ord &c went aboard the Defence once again to try if he could obtain y<sup>e</sup>: Port.

And on the 19<sup>th</sup>: day Arrived in this Road y<sup>e</sup> Charles after having been att Batavia &c places from whence he brings us this newes, y<sup>t</sup> there lay ready in y<sup>e</sup> Road of Batavia 3 shippes one whereof mounted w<sup>th</sup>: sixty Gunns, for to bring an Army of Dutch and Javas for Syllabar for to demand in the King of Bantams name satisfaction of these people, for their disobedience and by force of Armes to make y<sup>m</sup>: become more Loyall to their Prince from whom they say these people have Revolted & alsoe to know how they Dared to Trade with any Nation or suffer any to settle in his Countrey without first Acquainting their King therewith and having his [order] soe to doe, & he certainly tells us they will be here in six weekes time y<sup>e</sup> Consideration of the great raines, y<sup>t</sup>: wee this and the next month may Expect being the only Hindrance, why they are not allready with us, and for their Genū: they have Elected Kare y<sup>e</sup> Embassad<sup>r</sup>: which [was] sent by the Young King into England, althouh these people (who have no reason to Revolt from us to serve the Dutch,) will stand by and Assist us when their Enemy comes, yett shall not wee of our selves be able to doe any thing as hereafter yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: &c<sup>a</sup>: shall be made Acquainted with.

Wee have had noe small trouble in the settling the Baharr every man y<sup>t</sup>: brought A Bahar of pepp<sup>r</sup>: would make A dotcheen or otherwise would not weigh of his pepp<sup>r</sup>:; soe Dayly finding y<sup>e</sup>: trouble wee sent for y<sup>e</sup> King &c, and having y<sup>m</sup>: all together, acquainted y<sup>m</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Dotcheen or Bahar must be Certain, or otherwise, would not Receive their pepp<sup>r</sup>: soe they desired to have y<sup>e</sup> quantity of A Bahar measured, y<sup>e</sup> which being done, it was weighed, and held out 500 pound, altho' the Bahar before, wee had Agreed for 470<sup>lb</sup>: soe y<sup>m</sup>: wee told y<sup>m</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: now wee hoped they would be content, seeing us in all things ready to Comply with them, but y<sup>e</sup> next day pep<sup>r</sup>: coming to y<sup>e</sup> scale to be weighed off, they quickly found out their Errour, and y<sup>m</sup>: would by noe meanes bring one again, for they said y<sup>e</sup> measure or Bamboe was falce, wee told y<sup>m</sup>: it was of their own procuring, not ours, and therefore had Resolved not to Abate an Ounce soe after a few dayes they brought there pepp<sup>r</sup>: to y<sup>e</sup> scale, and now hope wee may be able to keep y<sup>m</sup>: to it.

Our Expences are very great by reason of y<sup>e</sup> number of people wee have here, y<sup>e</sup>: w<sup>ch</sup> is Augmented by the dearness of all things in Generall, wee have had dayly att worke about y<sup>e</sup> Fortifications a great number of Mallays, and not one person great or small y<sup>t</sup>: will worke under a quarter of A Doller.

Notwithstanding our own people y<sup>t</sup>: have alsoe worckt dayly thereon y<sup>e</sup> worke is very backward, for ever since Wee have been here wee can scarce say wee have had Eight dayes togeather without Rain, w<sup>ch</sup>: has fallen in soe violent A manner, y<sup>t</sup>: it hath soe much hindred our designe, y<sup>t</sup>: in four months time noe more then one Bastion or Bulworke, to y<sup>e</sup>: seaward is in any forwardness, w<sup>ch</sup>: long ere this might have been finisht but y<sup>e</sup> raines are soe great here y<sup>t</sup>: in one night they have lay'd even w<sup>th</sup>: the Ground, y<sup>t</sup>: which had cost A fortnights building soe finding wee have all this while been whashing A Blackmoore white have Resolved to Pallasade our selves in, for y<sup>e</sup> greater security taking in halfe of y<sup>e</sup> ground M<sup>r</sup>: Fowles hath Lay'd out for A Fort and all the mean's he could Invent was not



Enough to make his worke withstand the Raines, for Turfing w<sup>ch</sup>: was thought to stand against all Raines, hath severall times been washt away, and now at this Instant y<sup>e</sup> whole Bulworke which hath been all this time Adoing will by y<sup>e</sup> first raines, bee certainly all washt Away for it is wholly crackt, soe y<sup>t</sup> nothing can be done without Brick, w<sup>ch</sup>: our people have Endeavoured to make but y<sup>e</sup> Earth is not good for when they come to burne them they will not Abide y<sup>e</sup> fire; soe y<sup>t</sup>: Bricks and all other Materialls for y<sup>e</sup> Raising of A Building of y<sup>t</sup>: nature must be sent hither, if yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: & c<sup>a</sup>: shall think Convenient y<sup>t</sup>: wee here Remain & fortifie.

Wee humbly desire yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: & c<sup>a</sup>: will please to send us, Eight or tenn Mussoolaes with Macquaes, or boat men, for y<sup>e</sup> Carrying of Pepper, the want of Convenientcies of y<sup>t</sup>: nature has much hindred us, for here wee have only one great prow to carry off pepper, [nor] neither can they here build Boats, (and if can) not soe prop<sup>r</sup>: as Mussulaes w<sup>ch</sup>: will in the very worst of weather goe out of this River, when their Countrey boats cannot, soe y<sup>t</sup> wee have now in y<sup>e</sup>: Goedowne Aboute 70 Baharrs of Pepp<sup>r</sup>: which wee could not shipp off for the want thereof.

Wee Likewise desire yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: & c<sup>a</sup>: will please to furnish us with small money for an Eight of an Doller is y<sup>e</sup> Lowest, and but few of y<sup>m</sup>:; soe y<sup>t</sup>: what Ever we want, tho' not worth Tenn Cash wee must give soe much; and our people can't buy A Little Beetle nutt under that, wee desire it may be of a Baser Mettle, then Fanams, y<sup>t</sup>: it might be Large.

About 4 months Agoe I Rec<sup>d</sup>: A Lett<sup>r</sup> from Ahamodubeag & Calidinde Ieperaz, y<sup>t</sup>: one of y<sup>e</sup> King of Syams serv<sup>ts</sup>: was come to Madapolam, to whom I

gave Answer y<sup>t</sup>: he was A Treacherous man, and could not be suffered to stay any time there, but must be Immediately turned away and sent out of town, and they Returned me this Answer again, y<sup>t</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Wales sent his braminy to them, and told y<sup>m</sup>: y<sup>t</sup>: because he was at some Difference with y<sup>e</sup> Metchlepatam Govern<sup>r</sup>: he came thither, and if any trouble should arise by his being there you will answer for it.

A Copie of Jenkin Watsons Narrative how he was Treated by the Dutch upon y<sup>e</sup> West Coast of Sumatra,

APRILL 17<sup>th</sup>: 1685.

I Arrived at Polycinqua by force of bad weather, S<sup>r</sup>: I have as you Ordered me, I have deliv<sup>d</sup>: yo<sup>r</sup>: Lfe to y<sup>e</sup> Accomodore, and he Answers me, that 'tis fitter for A fool then A man of his Acco<sup>t</sup>: whereupon I demanded the Reason why, y<sup>n</sup>: he told me y<sup>t</sup>: he must Dispute the business with the Presid<sup>t</sup>: of Madras, soe he Ask'd me what I had more to say, wherof I [deman]ded y<sup>e</sup>: Reason why he fired att our English fflagg, and had kill'd two of o<sup>r</sup>: black People, altho' they be black they be the King of Englands subjects, he Answer'd me again, y<sup>t</sup>: where he had kill'd one he wisht he had kill'd twenty, he asked me how it could be y<sup>e</sup> King of Englands, and y<sup>t</sup>: was given to y<sup>e</sup> state of Holland, wherupon I answered y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Emperour, and all his Kings had freely given it to the King of England, and y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>., whereupon he Answers this, you are but an Interlop<sup>r</sup>: on y<sup>e</sup> coast, if you had the King of Englands orders, and y<sup>e</sup> Comp<sup>a</sup>: why had not you shewn it mee I replied 'tis a thing of noe small vallue to be sent about y<sup>e</sup> Countrey he answer'd me again, y<sup>t</sup>: he was coming there with his ship and sloopes, I answered him altho' they be but a few, or small hand full of men they will be ready to Receive you, then he Answered me that M<sup>r</sup>: Clement Jordan had writt unto him y<sup>t</sup>: he took too much Brandy wine in the morning, y<sup>t</sup>: made him crack'd brain'd all the day after, wherupon I answered him this, y<sup>t</sup>: his worsh<sup>p</sup>: in his last Lfe did write y<sup>t</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Clement Jordan was drunk or mad when he sent y<sup>e</sup> first Lfe furthermore y<sup>t</sup>: wee did use yo<sup>r</sup>: ffolks more like Doggs then men, y<sup>n</sup>: he vowed he never wrot such words in his Lfes but I doe belive y<sup>t</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Clement Jordan, cannot write Dutch, but did say y<sup>t</sup>: y<sup>e</sup> Rogue Derick had Interp[re]ted it false, then he demanded from whence I took y<sup>e</sup> Prow, I answered him from y<sup>e</sup> main, y<sup>n</sup>: he Asked me from whence the Molayes came, I told him from Indrapore, then he told me he had nothing more to say to me, then he comitted me to the sloop as Prisoner, where I continued 4 dayes, and y<sup>e</sup> 5 day he sent for mee and told me as for y<sup>e</sup> Molayes they were his prisoners, as for my Linguister he would keep him till wee did send Derick, whereupon I answer'd y<sup>t</sup>: he could not keep a free man for a slave, y<sup>n</sup>: I told him as for Derick hee had nothing to doe with him, but was hired by the week and when his week was up hee was as free for Another as wee whereupon he answered this, y<sup>t</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Clement Jordan, hath [sent] me word y<sup>t</sup>: I should not have him therefore when you send Derick you shall have Anthony & Pasquall, J told him y<sup>t</sup>: twas very bad travelling through an Enemies countrey without



my Linguistter, therefore I desire y<sup>t</sup>: you would be pleas'd to lett me have my Linguister, y<sup>n</sup>: he told me y<sup>t</sup>: I should not have him, then I asked whether he had any service to command he answers me no but told me it was Dangerous for me too travel through an Enemies countrey, I told him I would not neglect y<sup>e</sup>: Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: buisness but first would lose my life, then I took me leave of him and went on board y<sup>e</sup>: sloop for my things, and y<sup>e</sup> men were a goeing to give me a Cast over y<sup>e</sup> River, and he sent his men to watch mee and when they saw me going, they told me y<sup>t</sup>: I must come and speak with y<sup>e</sup> Accomad<sup>r</sup>: and when I came before him he told me y<sup>t</sup>: he durst not lett me goe, for he was certain that I should be killed, I told him y<sup>t</sup>: I did not fear killing, y<sup>t</sup>: presently he comitted me on board y<sup>e</sup> ship as a prisoner, and told me y<sup>t</sup>: in 3 dayes I should be at Indrapore, and there I continued 4 dayes and y<sup>e</sup> 5<sup>th</sup>: day I desired y<sup>e</sup> Cap<sup>t</sup>: to speak to the Accomad<sup>r</sup>: whereupon he told me dars't not let me goe, and y<sup>e</sup> next day at 7 of y<sup>e</sup> clock wee weigh'd our Anchor and went away for Padang and there y<sup>e</sup> boats went ashoar, I desired the Cap<sup>t</sup>: to speak w<sup>th</sup>: y<sup>e</sup>: Accomodore, and forthwith he sent 4 souldiers on board, I Asked him why those souldiers came on board, they told me y<sup>t</sup>: 'twas an usuall thing, but I was informed better, & y<sup>t</sup>: they came to secure me and when the Cap<sup>t</sup>: came on board he told me that y<sup>e</sup> Accomod<sup>r</sup>: answered y<sup>t</sup>: I must stay till I had Answer, but from whence I knew not, but I was Inform'd it was from Batavia by one y<sup>t</sup>: did know, and as he did understand y<sup>t</sup>: I should goe likewise to Batavia, he bid the Cap<sup>t</sup>: ask me whether I wanted any Cloths, if I did he would lend me money till I came to Indrapoura, I answered him if I did: y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: had supplied me with them.

The 5<sup>th</sup>: of May the Accomod<sup>r</sup>: sent for me Ashoar and told me y<sup>t</sup>: M<sup>r</sup>: Clement Jordan and y<sup>e</sup> sloop were gon, and had left two white men and one Black and y<sup>t</sup>: the Emperour & his Lords were fallen out, and he was fled into the countrey therefore I would Advise you to send for y<sup>m</sup>: to Padang, and as for the goods if they can't gett great Prowes lett them bring it in small ones, and I will come with my sloops and fetch it, for I am certain they will be killed, wherupon I told him, If I did any such thing I should betray y<sup>e</sup> Hono<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>as</sup>: wherupon I desired y<sup>t</sup>: his Worsh<sup>p</sup>: would be pleas'd to lett me goe to bear a part with y<sup>m</sup>: he told me he could not Conveniently.

Wee are glad y<sup>e</sup> Bengall Merch<sup>t</sup>, arrivd with you in good time, and hope you dispatcht her away soon after, tho' y<sup>e</sup> [lacuna in original] of y<sup>e</sup> 3<sup>d</sup>: Sep<sup>br</sup>: mentions nothing concerning her, yett wee may conclude shee's gon, and carry'd our Advices with her, for y<sup>e</sup> forwarding which, and our former, both to y<sup>e</sup> R<sup>t</sup>: Hon<sup>ble</sup>: Comp<sup>a</sup>: and Suratt, wee give yo<sup>r</sup>: Hon<sup>r</sup>: & c<sup>a</sup>: our hearty thanks; y<sup>e</sup> Gen<sup>l</sup>: from Persia & our Acco<sup>t</sup>: Curr<sup>t</sup>: wee belived, but of noe use to us, by reason wee had before cleared it by Acco<sup>t</sup>: London.

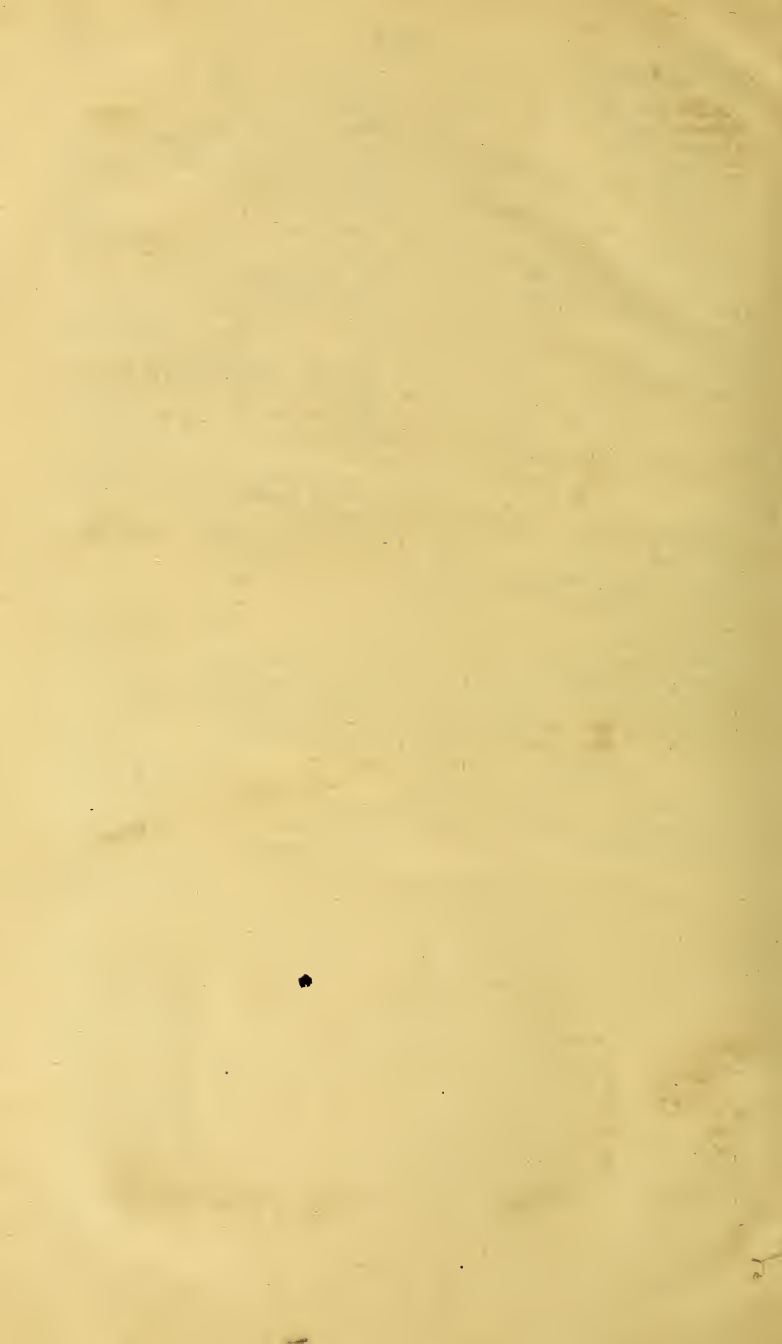

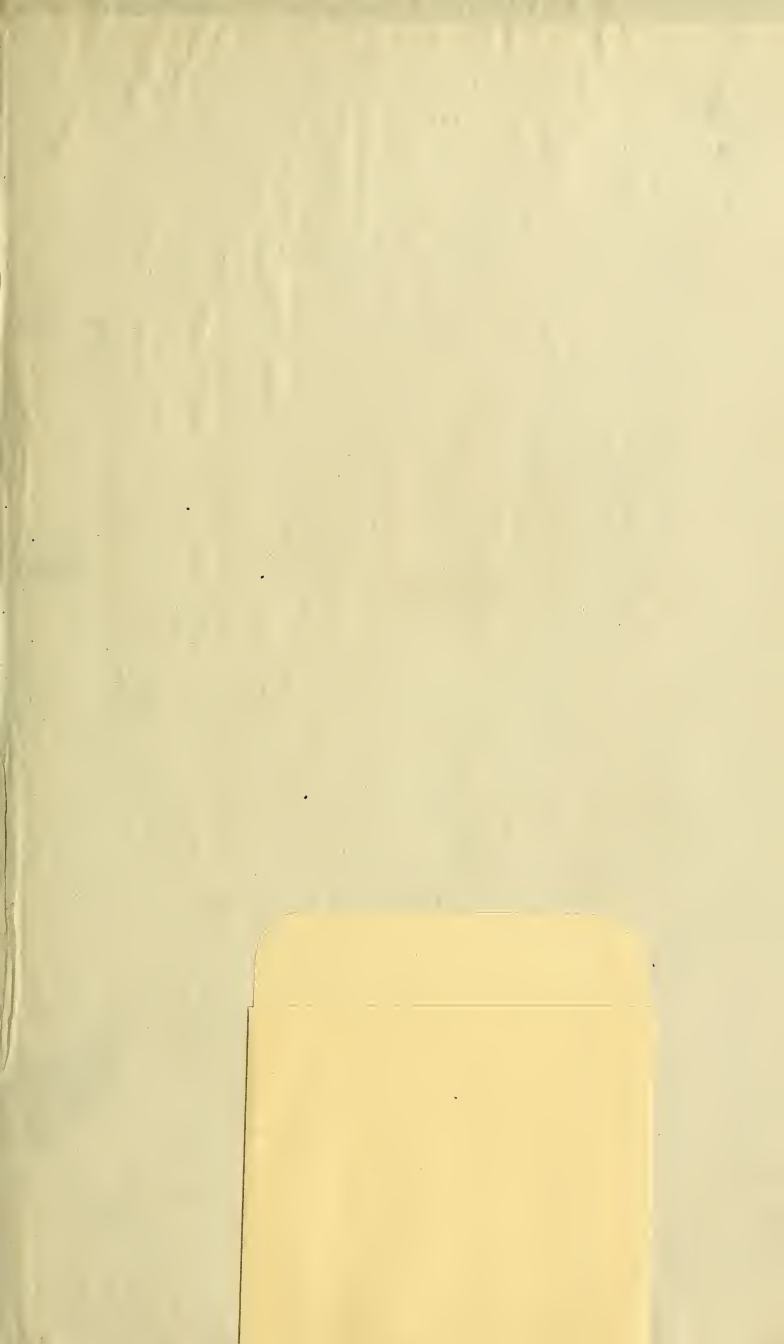
